It is our wish to tackle targets and challenges and provide a further productive public service to the Public and the country in the coming year of 2019.

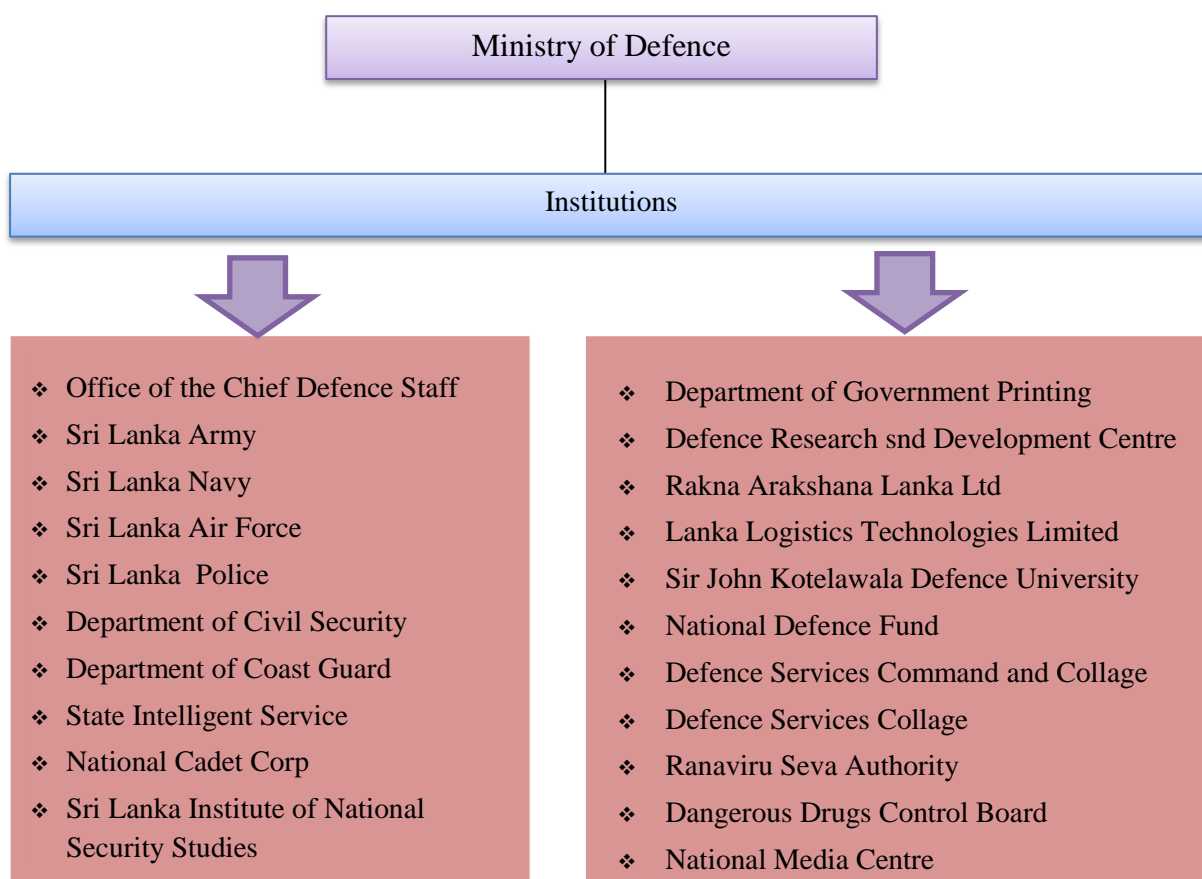

In the context of globalization, every country is essential to have concerted actions with the world community to overcome domestic and international security threats that are confronted to the national security. Therefore, Ministry of Defence always gives its maximum contribution to the Sri Lanka effort to maintain cordial international relationships with other countries while building a strong network of defence. 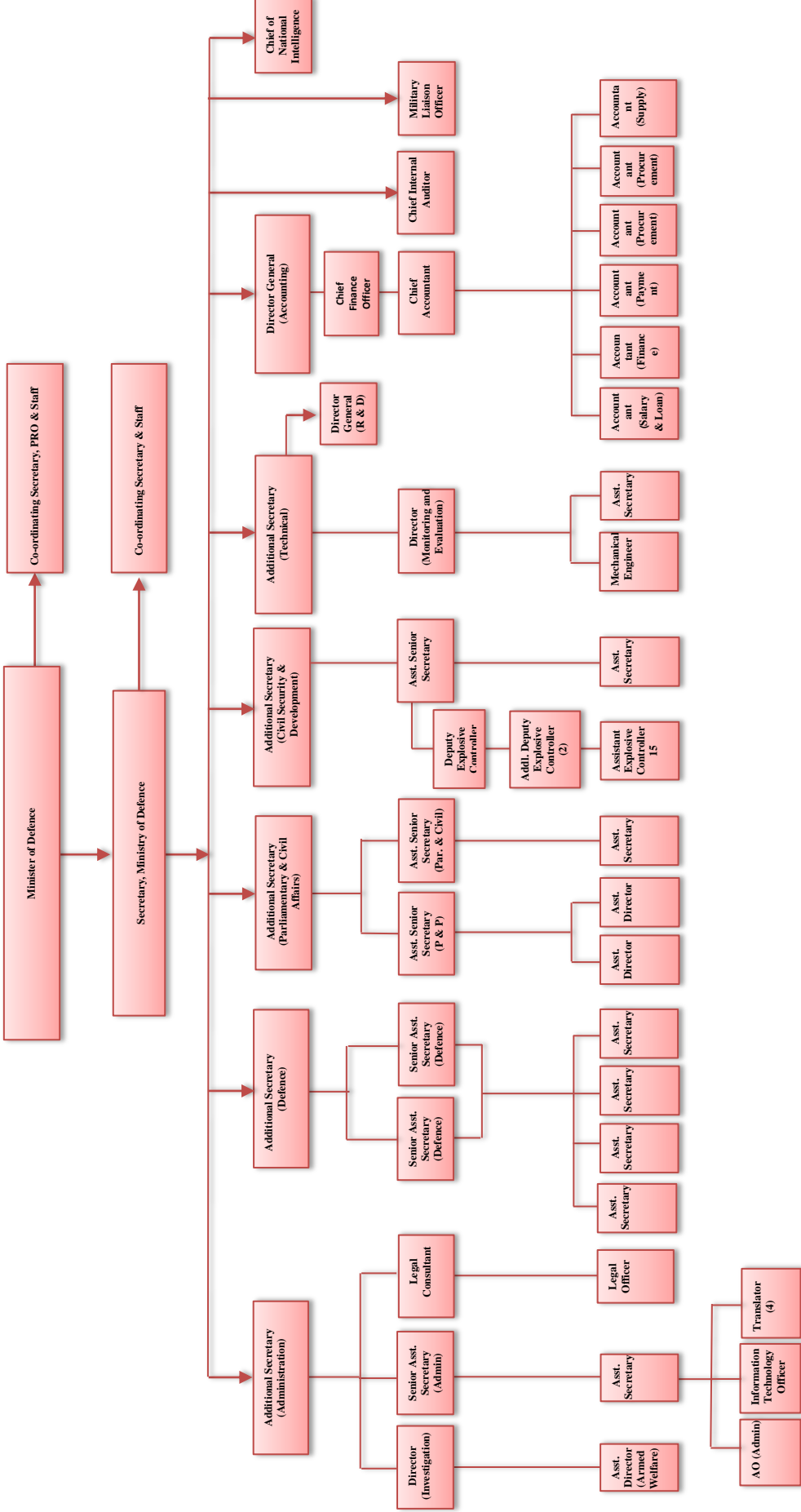

This division performs all the establishment matters such as enlistment, promotions, retirements, removal of the service of those members of the Tri – Forces, institutional matters of the Coast Guard Department (CGD) and the institute of National Security Studies – Sri Lanka (INSS) and also functions of the Lanka Logistic (Pvt) Ltd.

Duties entrusted to this Defence Division are performed under 05 main branches as follows.

(I) Human Resources Management

A main duty entrusted to this Defence Division under this branch establishment, promotions, dismissal from the service of those members of the Tri – Forces institutional matters of the CGD and some institutional matters of the INSS are performed.

(II) Human Resources Development

Under this Branch, providing Local & overseas training courses to the members of Tri – Forces, Providing Local Training opportunities for members of foreign Forces are performed. As well as referring the Tri Forces members for Local and overseas discussions, Seminars, Workshops are performed under this branch.

(III) United Nations Peace Keeping Mission

Under this branch, sending war observers to countries nominated by the United Nations Organization (UNO), marking arrangements to participate troops, providing facilities such as equipment required to the troops and medicines are performed.

(IV) Welfare Activities

Taking actions involved armed forces requests, redress of grievances of armed forces personal, providing opportunities for children of armed forces personal to admit Universities under an especial basis, granting compensations are performed under this branch.

(V) Supply goods and Services

Taking actions required to obtain goods and Services needed to the Tri- Forces and Coast Guard Department are fulfilled under this branch.

Technical Division of Ministry of Defence is entrusted to deal with communication and engineering matters in relation to national security whilst formulating strategies for the utilization and development of its applications to be used by the general public of the Country. Communication Scope covers Radio Communication, Telecommunication Services, Television Broadcasting, Data Communication and Providing observations and granting approval required by the Telecommunication Regulatory Commission of Sri Lanka for the importation, Installation and Commissioning of Communication, Navigational and Surveillance equipment which could affect the national Security.

Engineering Scope covers all civil and field engineering which requires infrastructure development Island wide as per the instruction given by the Government whilst ensuring the National Security. Technical Division coordinates and liaises with line Ministries and Institutions on communication and engineering matters with regard to national security.

Defence Head Quarters Complex Project (DHQC) and the Strategic Defence Communication Network (SDCN) project are the ongoing major projects implemented by the division, at present. In addition, research projects implemented by Center for Research and Development (CRD) are also supervised by the Technical Division.

5.2.1 Achievements and Analysis of Activities Conducted by Technical Division

5.2.1.1 Security Clearance for Tower Construction

In 2018, the division granted security clearance for Telecom Operators to construct 129 towers. Further, granted Security clearance for 104 vendor licenses of Electronic / Communication related applications.

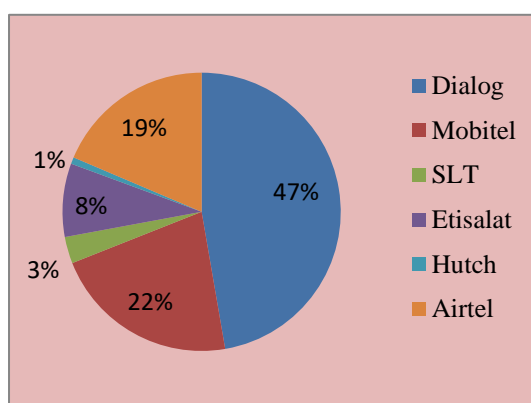


Chart 5.2.1: Progress of Security Clearance for Tower Construction

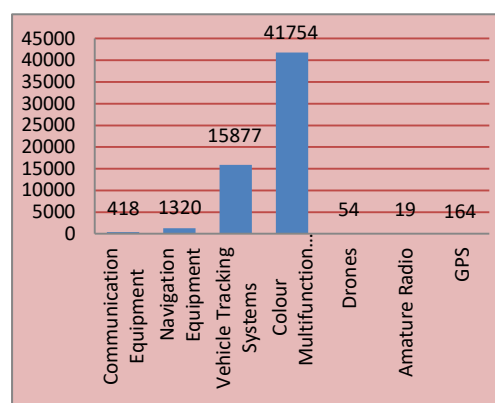


Chart 5.2.2: Progress of Security Clearance for Importation of Equipment

5.2.3.2 Strategic Defence Communication Network Project

Strategic Defence Communication Network (SDCN) Project will provide a secure common communication backbone which consists of 37 microwave links and Network Management System (NMS) connecting pre-selected terminal points of the Tri Forces, Police and STF in Island wide.

In 2016, installation of 10 electrical generators out of 22 has been completed. Construction of eleven self-supported communication towers are in progress and the construction are to be completed by end of this year and the tender for thirty seven microwave radio links has to be recalled.



During the period (January to August 2018), physical progress is 5% and financial progress is

low (0.0%) compared to annual allocation (658.74Mn).

5.2.3.3 Center for Research and Development (CRD)

Vision of the CRD is “To design, develop and lead to production of indigenous solution for defence applications by establishing a world class science and technology base and equipment for the defence forces as well as other government institutions with internationally competitive system and solutions” and the Objectives of the CRD are as follows.

- Acquire and design the best systems, based on the best practices and available resources in the defence sector.
- Design the necessary interfaces to integrate IT and Non-IT based systems operationally in the defence sector.
- Developing a full-fledged R & D organization to emulate and evaluate its effectiveness and suitability.
- Implementing a full-fledged R & D organization for the defence sector in Sri Lanka.

5.2.4 Prospect for 2019

5.2.4.1 Defence Headquarters Relocation Project

- Completion of Block No 6, 7 and 8 for Sri Lanka Army Headquarters.
- Completion of Communication Building and Signal Tower (Common facility).

- Completion of Security Building (Common facility).
- Road Network to facilitate functioning of AHQ without restricting balance construction work.
- Complete Water Sump and Pump House (Common facility).
- Temporary Accommodation for 2000 ORs at Kinhadeniya
- Complete Sewerage Treatment Plant (Common facility)

5.2.4.2 Strategic Defence Communication Network Project

To complete the construction of eleven towers by end of year 2018 and installation of Microwave Radio Links with the Network Management System within the year 2019 and monitor the system progress to review the future requirements to enhance the Network.

5.2.4.3 Center for Research and Development

- It has been planned to improve the scientific laboratory facilities and other accommodation facilities in order to fully function all research wings under the CRD with the limited available space. Planning has been made accordingly, to obtain required approval.
- To take necessary actions to obtain the approval for the research allowances for the research officers who successfully complete the projects.
- The main objective of the research and development center is to formulate a national banquet for conducting defence related research and development activities for tri services, thereby formulating effective strategies and policies for National Security. Accordingly, this center played a major role for successful research and development activities during the past 10 years. Activities were further expanded to obtain the services of other Government Institutions, which are relevant to the protection of the State as well as the Research and Development Center on the instructions of this Ministry. Accordingly, various issues have been arisen due to state rules and regulations in relation to other government agencies.
- To obtain special approval to purchase required raw materials that need to produce hi-tech war equipment and to purchase electronics equipment through procurement guidelines directly from the foreign countries in order to enhance the efficiency of the entire research process.

5.3.1 Main functions of the Division

1. Land matters relevant to the, Ministry of Defence and the Institutions coming under it including the Tri Forces.
2. Duties relating to reporting to the parliament with regard to the functions of the Ministry.
3. Submission of observations concerning the Cabinet Memorandums submitted by other Ministries to the Cabinet Office.
4. Matters pertaining to supplying uniforms and clothing material for the Tri Forces and the Civil Security Force.
5. Appeals and grievances of the general public with regard to land acquisition.

5.3.1.1 Land Matters

- One of the main functions carried out by this Division is the assigning and acquiring of land for the Three Forces and the Ministry with co-ordination with Ministry of Lands and Parliamentary Reforms, Department of Land Commissioner General, Department of Forest Conservation, Divisional Secretariats and Provincial Institutions. Following functions were performed during the year 2018.
 - Obtaining land vesting/ acquisition applications through the Three Forces.
 - Obtaining the recommendations and observations from the Divisional Secretaries and the institutions where land ownership is vested.
 - Submission of land acquisition/ vesting requests to the Land Ministry and Land Commissioner General with all required supporting documents.
 - Carrying out field inspections when uncertainty occurred in ownership of the lands.

- Coordinate surveying of lands, coordinate obtaining valuation reports of the lands.
- Obtain the approval of the Treasury to allocate the funds to pay the compensation for lands to be acquired for security forces, through the allocation of Ministry of Lands and Parliamentary Reforms.
- Obtain the approval of the Cabinet for major or complex land acquisitions.
- In addition, to support the Government's initiative in supporting the reconciliation and resettlement activities, this Division, together with the Three Armed Forces co-ordinates matters pertaining to the returning of lands to the original owners, and when required, actions are taken to re-establish the camps.
- The progress of the land release in the North and the East during the time period of 01.01.2018 to 31.08.2018 is as follows.

5.3.1.2. Duties in respect of reporting to the Parliament

Coordinating with relevant institutions/Divisions of the Ministry, answers for 13 queries have been prepared in trilingual and submitted to the parliament in time.

▪ **Committee on Public Petition**

In the event of providing the answers which were forwarded by the general public to the Committee on Public Petitions regarding the Three Forces and the other Institutions coming under this Ministry, necessary actions were taken to forward the answers to the Committee on Public Petition by preparing the relevant answers through obtaining the necessary facts from the respective Divisions / Institutions. In the year 2018, four (04) petitions were directly provided to the Committee on Public Petition through this Division, while the other petitions were forwarded to the relevant Divisions to obtain the answers.

▪ **Sectoral Oversight Committee meetings**

In the event of holding the Sectoral Oversight Committee Meetings at the Parliament which relevant for the Ministry of Defence, the respective Officers were participated. Requested information and reports were also being forwarded. In addition to that, the relevant Officers have been participated with necessary information for the Sectoral Oversight Committee on other Ministries when called for.

▪ **Questions forwarded under the Standing Orders at the adjournment of the parliament and the questions forwarded to the Hon. Prime Minister at the Parliament.**

During the period of review, answers have been provided to 03 adjournment motions and 02 standing orders which relevant for this Ministry

▪ **Preparation of Cabinet Memoranda and providing observations of the Minister of Defence**

Five (05) Cabinet Memorandums were prepared and forwarded to obtain the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers. The observations of the Minister of Defence were prepared and forwarded for 26 Cabinet Memorandums submitted by other Ministries.

5.3.1.3 Provision of uniforms and textile materials to the Three Forces and the Department of Civil Security – Domestic Textile Allocation Committee (DTAC)

As per the instruction of the Secretary to the President in respect of the procurement of uniforms in due course for instructions inclusive of the Tri-Forces and Department of Civil Security affiliated to the Ministry of Defence, a Cabinet Memorandum has been submitted. After receiving the decision for that purpose, it is anticipated to take future actions according to the said decision.

5.3.1.4 Appeals and Grievances of the general Public.

Necessary actions were taken to provide the reliefs to the appeals and grievances made by the general public directly to this Ministry and also through the Presidential Secretariat, Office of the Prime Minister and other Government Institutions. 85 appeals and grievances of the general public have been received by this division from January to August 31st 2018.

- As a contribution to uplift the skills of youths freshly entering into job market, this ministry has taken measures to provide 06 months training based on computer technology and

office matters for 42 trainees directed intermittently throughout the year by Public Institutions such as National Apprentice Board, National youth service council and Technical Colleges.

- Further, as per requests submitted In the “Declaring and Implementing an Employees day in public institutions 2017” program, final stage in activities concerned are being implemented to conduct training courses for subjects such as office systems, accounts and computer to Development Officers, Public Management Assistants and officers in the similar capacity and Drivers, KKS in the ministry with the contribution of the National Institute of Labour Studies.

6. Assisting to get transfers to spouses of war heroes in the public service.
7. Assisting to solve problematic situations relevant to lands of war heroes.
8. Implementation of welfare programmes for war heroes.

“Api Wenuwen Api” Welfare Project.

Through the utilization of “Api Wenuwen Api” fund which was established under the “Api Wenuwen Api” Parliamentary Act No 06 of 2008, implementation of 2 housing projects for war heroes of tri-forces.

(1) “Api Wenuwen Api” Full Housing Project.

Under the project, construction of a fully-fledged house deploying tri forces working teams spending value of Rs. 1,500,000 for constructing raw materials for families of war heroes who are serving/retired, disabled or died and who deprived a house of their own.

(2) “Api Wenuwen Api” partially constructed housing scheme.

Under this project, financial aid in three (03) installments subject to a maximum of Rs 750,000,00/- required to complete houses of war heroes partially constructed will be awarded under this project.

Following apportioned rates will be selected having checked the qualifications concerned to each project when selecting as beneficiaries of tri forces war heroes.

- From army - 60%
- From navy - 25%
- From air force - 15%

It has been planned to award benefits after selecting a number of 40 beneficiaries for partially built houses and 50 for completing houses during the year 2018 under the above two projects and progress of those both projects are as follows at present.

5.5.1 Civil Security Division

The following main objectives are expected to be fulfilled through the execution of the tasks assigned to this Division.

Objectives of the Division

1. Building a secure civil society.
2. Ensure safety in the utilization of explosives in the commercial field.
3. Provision of regulated Private Security Services and authentication of maritime security service agencies.
4. Provision of opportunities for academic and professional development to member of the Armed Forces, Police and Civil Security Force as well as to their children.

5.5.2 Progress of the Division

With the intention of fulfilling the above objectives, the following tasks have been completed by this division from 01.01.2018 to 31.08.2018.

1. The drafts (including revision of fees) for amending the Firearms Ordinance to correspond with timely requirements have been prepared and forwarded to the Department of Legal Draftsman.
2. Timely revision of the fees charged under the Regulation of Private Security Agencies Act No. 45, 1998.
3. Measures were taken to amend the Firing Ranges and Military Training Act and until such time said Act is amended, provide a training opportunity at a firing range for local security officers and foreign sea marshals
4. Decision to charge a Government of Rs. 12,500/= for reserving firing ranges for 25 security officers per a day and an additional fee of Rs. 500/= for each person over when reserving the firing ranges of the Tri Forces, Police and the Civil Security Force.
5. Inspection of the offices of Assistant Controllers of Explosives.
6. Carry out transfers of officers who have completed a period of service of over 03 years after being attached to the Civil Security Department for administrative affairs by the Tri Forces and the Department of Police and provide successors in this lieu.
7. Call the Staff Officers and Management Assistants who are responsible for the subject at all the District Secretariats to the Ministerial Auditorium on 30.08.2018 and educate them concerning the issues of the subject of firearms, explosives and collection of arrears in revenue and accounting.

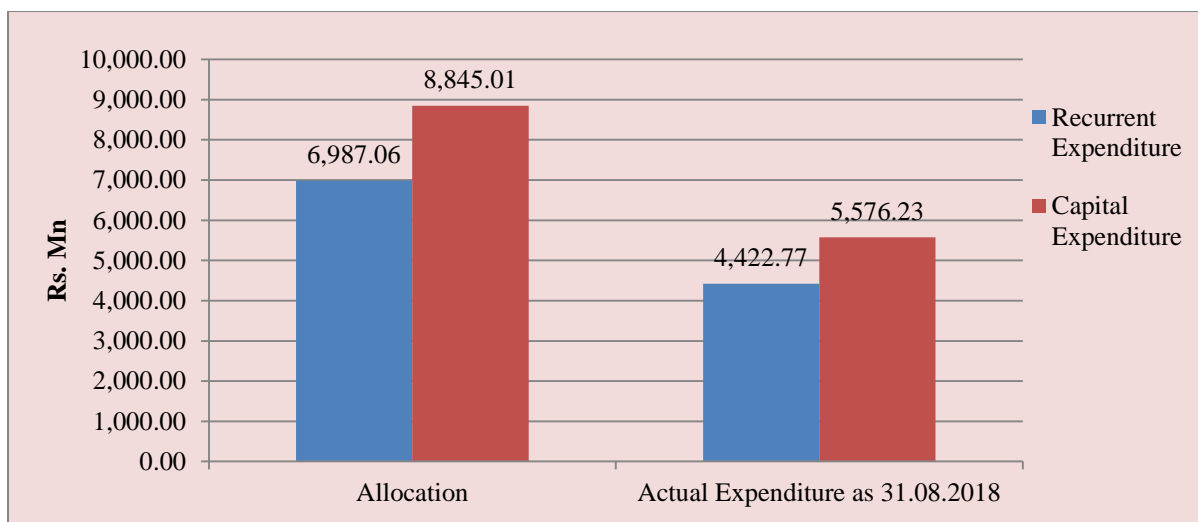


Chart 5.6.1: Financial Progress of the Ministry as at 31.08.2018

- This fund was established by the “Api Wenuwen Api” Fund Act No 6, 2008.

Objectives of this fund

- To create schemes to provide financial support to members of the Armed Forces to build houses.
- To provide assistance to members of the Armed Forces to obtain housing facilities.
- To make arrangements to provide support to members of the Armed Forces to obtain loans from financial institutions and to pay them.
- To prepare a scheme to confirm the payment of loans in the event of the death of a member or an injury.

The administration, management and governance of the fund are assigned to a Board of Management consisting of the Secretary of the Minister in charge of the subject of Defence as the chairperson, persons holding positions nominated by the Act and persons with qualifications, experience and expertise in the fields of law and finance.

- The main objectives of the “Api Wenuwen Api” fund are providing housing facilities to personnel

of the Armed Forces and providing support under which, a project was initiated and implemented to construct houses Island wide for the next of kin of Warheroes killed in action and Warheroes who were disabled in action and are engaged in duty.

Accordingly, provisions have been released in the following manner for the construction of Ranaviru complete and partially completed houses island wide so far in 2018.(capital expenditure) Further, operational expenses incurred in implementing said projects are separately given.

The origins of the Office of the Chief of Defence Staff could be traced back to the Joint Operations

Command (JOC) established in 1985 to coordinate all operational aspects of the Tri-Services and Police. Thereafter the Joint Operations Bureau was created on 04 January 1999 replacing the Joint Operations Command and the Joint Operations Headquarters (JOH) replaced the Joint Operations Bureau in year 2000, which existed only for a short period. With the termination of the Humanitarian Operation, the duties of the Joint Operation Headquarters was expanded by the Chief of Defence Staff Act No. 35 of 2009, thereby the Office of the Chief of Defence Staff was established to address the post conflict challenges on 15 July 2009. The Chief of the Defence Staff (CDS) is the highest ranking military officer in the Sri Lankan Armed Forces and His Excellency the President shall appoint from among the persons presently serving as Commander of the Army, the Commander of the Navy or the Commander of the Air Force as the case may be, an officer to be the Chief of Defence Staff to function under the direction, supervision and control of the Secretary to the Ministry of Defence.

The mission of the OCDS is to provide strategic directions and develop joint doctrine for the Armed Forces in Sri Lanka.

- (1) Conducting three-wheeler repairing vocational training courses for members of the Tri-Forces personnel with the collaboration of David Pieris Motor Company.

5.10.1 Role of Office of the Military Liaison Officer

- (1) Proper execution of all the subjects within the scope of Military Liaison Officer's Office.
- (2) Notification of the orders and decisions made by the Minister of Defence, State Minister of Defence, Secretary of Defence to the Office of the Chief of Defence Staff, Army, Navy, Air Force and the Civil Security Department and coordination, collaboration with Government and other agencies and taking action in order to achieve the objectives of the Ministry.
- (3) Implementation and supervision of policies taken by the State and Defence Ministry.



5.10.2 Duties and Responsibilities

- (1) Co-ordination of the functions of the Tri Forces and provide relevant instructions and approval.
- (2) Acting as the Ministry coordinator with regard to State functions.
- (3) Coordination of domestic tours of foreign dignitaries, diplomats and high ranking officers of the Tri Forces and providing assistance.
- (4) Liaise with the Ministries / Institutions to fulfill various requirements of the Tri Forces.
- (5) Providing assistance and coordination through expertise and resources of the Tri Forces regarding requirements of various Ministries/ Departments/ Institutions.
- (6) Conduct Military Assistance Programs with foreign Defence Attaches/ Coordinators (about 15 personnel representing 11 countries) in the Sri Lankan embassy. Conduct Defence Attaches/ Coordinators' conferences presided by the Defence Secretary.
- (7) Granting approval for local and foreign visitors to enter the headquarters and camps of the Tri Forces and granting permission to meet / confer with the Chief of Defence Staff / Commanders of the Tri Forces and senior officers.
- (8) Granting approval to the Chief of Defense Staff, Commanders of the Tri Forces as well as senior officers to attend various functions and gatherings/ celebrations hosted by foreign delegates. Also, granting approval to each of the Tri Forces upon request to attend non-military functions clad in uniform besides attending such functions as the chief guest. Taking steps to grant approval when officers and other rankers of the Tri Forces connected with electronic and printed media.
- (9) Organization and coordination of meetings/ discussions and lectures held at the Ministry.
- (10) Providing diplomatic clearance to foreign naval vessels/ aircrafts which do not run on schedule subject to recommendation by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
- (11) Release goods imported for the Armed Forces from customs and grant approval to requests for the release of goods such as all equipment, air crafts, air craft equipment and boat engines, imported on behalf of other individuals/ agencies, which could pose a threat to State security from Customs.
- (12) Providing air travel facilities to diplomatic dignitaries, facilitate travel through daily scheduled air crafts of the Air Force in addition to taking necessary actions as per requests for the use of helicopters according to requirement.
- (13) Granting of permission to visitors/vehicles arriving to the Ministry in accordance with requests made by the relevant divisions.

- (14) Liaise with the Surveyor General in order to obtain maps/ aerial maps per requests made for requirements of the Tri Forces and other.
- (15) Providing direction and supervision for the construction of the "Sandahiru Seya".
- (16) Carry out administrative functions of all officers/ other rankers of the Tri Forces attached to the Ministry. Carry out supply and transfers upon requests for Tri Forces professionals for various sections of this Ministry and the SMOD.
- (17) Granting of approval for civilians to visit Military establishments especially Abimansala, Ranaviru Sevana, Mihindu Seth Medura and grant permission to them to offer inmates refreshments and donations.
- (18) The CCSCBU has been separately established. Thus, supervise the measures taken by this unit.
- (19) Nominate an ADC for His Excellency the President during state ceremonies- Such requests made by the Presidential Secretariat will be communicated to relevant Service Headquarters which in turn will submit the nominations to the Presidential Secretariat. Obtain security clearance for these Tri Forces' officers.



- (20) Provide the assistance of the Tri Forces and the Civil Security Department, subject to the approval of the Defence Secretary for maintenance of religious places/ important government buildings/ construction of new buildings.
- (21) Render the assistance of the Navy for water sports/ travel and other activities conducted by the Government or other agencies.
- (22) Provide advisory services to state schools (band / scouts / lectures etc.)
- (23) Coordinate Sri Lankan tours of foreign senior Tri Forces' officers. When foreign armies visit Sri Lanka for training, methodically assign the coordination of their tours to headquarters of the Tri Forces and carry out administrative assistance and supervision.
- (24) Providing the assistance of the Tri Forces and the CSD to eradicate the epidemic of Dengue (as per the request of the Ministry of Health, covering island wide on school level/ regional level/ district level).
- (25) Facilitate the provision of the service of Tri Forces' bands for all functions as required.
- (26) Granting approval for providing security for all events conducted at the Galle Face approved by the Sri Lanka Ports Authority.
- (27) Make available Tri Forces assistance for state functions (Independence Day/ Ranaviru Commemorative Day) and provide approval, support and troops for Provincial level Ranaviru Commemorative Ceremonies and coordination. Render assistance and provide bugle players as per requests made for ceremonies of birthday/ commemoration (memorial ceremonies) of late Heads of State.

- (28) Granting permission for the exportation of modernized boats and fishing boats (after verification of the necessary documents).
- (29) Granting approval for photography and filming films and Tele dramas at Gall Face and Lighthouse premises. (Permission for aerial photography is granted by the Office of the Chief of Defence Staff).
- (30) Concerning requests for filming – granting approval after obtaining views and observations from relevant Heads of Services or Media director with regard to shooting inside army camps if there are scenes which contain particulars of the Tri Forces and scenes which include Tri Forces' attire/ vehicles.
- (31) Notify the Ministry of Foreign Affairs about arrests of Sri Lankan fishermen in Indian waters by Indian authorities, once it is communicated by the defence attaché of the Indian High Commission to the Ministry and copied to the Sri Lanka Navy.
- (32) Communicate with the Ministry of Public Administration, Management and Law and Order in connection with providing police protection as per requests for Tri Forces' security for numerous functions.
- (33) Granting the required approval as is appropriate when approval is requested regarding providing media publicity by the Media Centre.
- (34) Make necessary arrangements regarding requests made to obtain exhibition stalls of the Tri Forces.
- (35) Granting approval subjected to the conditions stipulated for conducting Carnivals/ Lotteries/ Motor Cars racing events for the purpose of accruing income for welfare of the Tri Forces.
- (36) Referring requests made from many individuals/ business entities for promotions of their products among Tri Forces personnel to Tri Forces Commanders.
- (37) Providing humanitarian assistance of members of Security Personnel for the people who effected to natural mishaps and human disasters in the Island.

- (38) Providing assistance immensely of the security personnel for religious events such as Vesak Festival and National Functions organized by the Government.
- (39) Providing assistance in maximal to Reconciliation Mechanism launched by the present government

(c) The Sandahiru Seya Project

The Sandahiru Seya (Stupa) consists with 285ft in height and 255ft in diameter. This Stupa being constructed in heredity to the art of Stupa has already been completed up to 68ft in height. 1779 personnel of the Civil Security Department and Three Forces are deployed in construction work of this Stupa.



(d). Colombo City Beautification Unit

- (2) At present, operational preventive units round-the-clock has already been established to prevent unauthorized garbage disposals in urban & suburban areas under the Ministry of Local Government and Provincial Councils and necessary measures have been taken to attach a team consists with 30 members (per 10 men in each services) from Tri Forces for observation duties under the said unit in keeping with Cabinet decision.
- (3) Two awards namely "Colombo City Beautification Awards 2017" and "Mihisaru Awards 2017" were conferred to the Colombo City Beautification Unit by Hon. Patali Champika Ranawaka, Minister of Megapolis and Hon. Isuru Devapriya, the Chief Minister of Western Province in appreciation of commendable service rendered through the knowledge & labour in accomplishment of the solid garbage management system in Colombo District with the firm determination for the future generation in having as citizens with dignity in a salubrious healthy city.

(e) **Providing Labour Contribution for the development process of religious Places**

Labour contribution of about 475 personnel in the Tri Forces and Civil Security Department for the development work of 234 religious places in Sri Lanka during the period of 01st January up to 31st August.

- b. **Military Personnel:** Director Media Centre is responsible for the discipline and routine administration of all military personnel posted / attached to the Media Centre. The Director discharges this responsibility under the guidance of the Military Liaison Officer (MLO).
- c. **Logistic:** Logistic support for the Media Centre is provided under the supervision of Additional Secretary Administration. Appropriate financial allocations are made from the funds allocated to the Ministry of Defence considering functional needs.
- d. **Civilian Staff:** Director Media Centre is responsible for the supervision of all functions and administration of any

civil staff posted to / attached to work on contract basis in the Media Centre. The Director discharges the responsibilities under the guidance and supervision of the Additional Secretary Administration / Military Liaison Officer.

5.11.3 Roles and Tasks

- i. Monitoring/recording and categorizing defence related news items telecasted/broadcasted in local/foreign TV channels and local radio channels.
- ii. Monitoring and categorizing the defence related news articles published in the newspapers.

- ix. Scrutinizing films/tele-dramas/documentary scripts for any dialogue/acts of security concern that could affect the good image of armed forces.
- x. To liaise, coordinate and assist the Information Department on matters related to Armed Forces news.
- xi. To liaise and coordinate with President Media on the events of the Armed forces and the national events that HE the president participates.
- xii. Apprising the Secretary/ Additional Secretaries to the Ministry of Defence/MLO with the summery of defence related news via email/ a hand delivered folder on daily basis.

- xiii. Providing preserved information when requested.
- xiv. Writing articles related to defence/national interest.
- xv. Preparing press releases/monthly reports.
- xvi. Coordinating all administrative matters in liaison with MOD and ensuring the security of the Media Centre.
- xvii. Maintaining/updating the MOD Website effectively.
- xviii. Providing photography and video coverage for the events organized by the MOD and SMOD.
- xix. Preparing documentaries on the requests made by the MOD and the affiliated institutions.
- xx. Analyzing and maintaining records on criminal cases/road traffic accidents involving the service personnel.

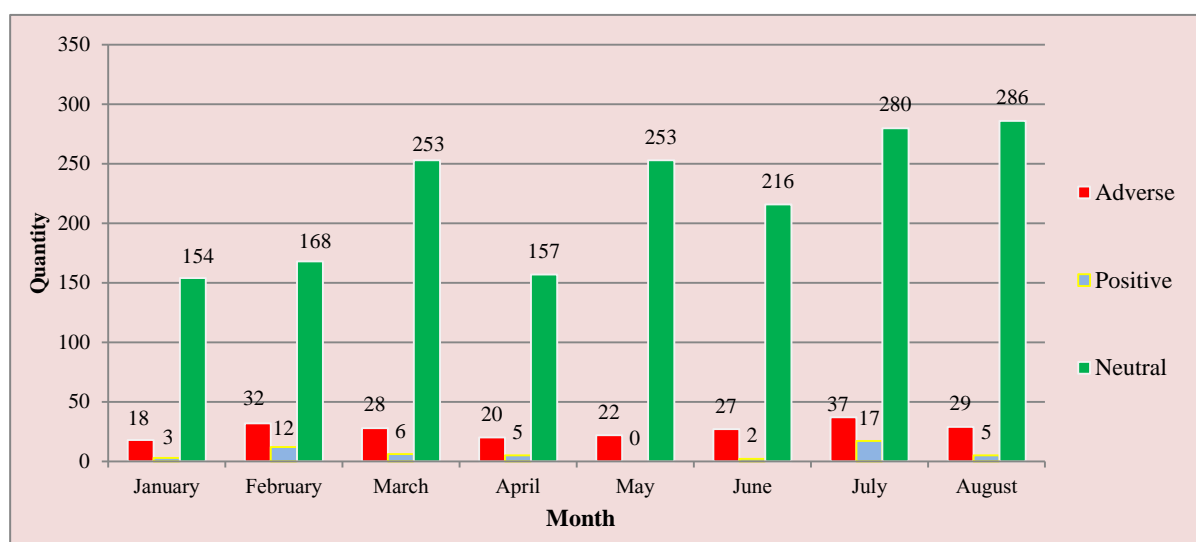


Chart 5.11.1: Classification of related TV news

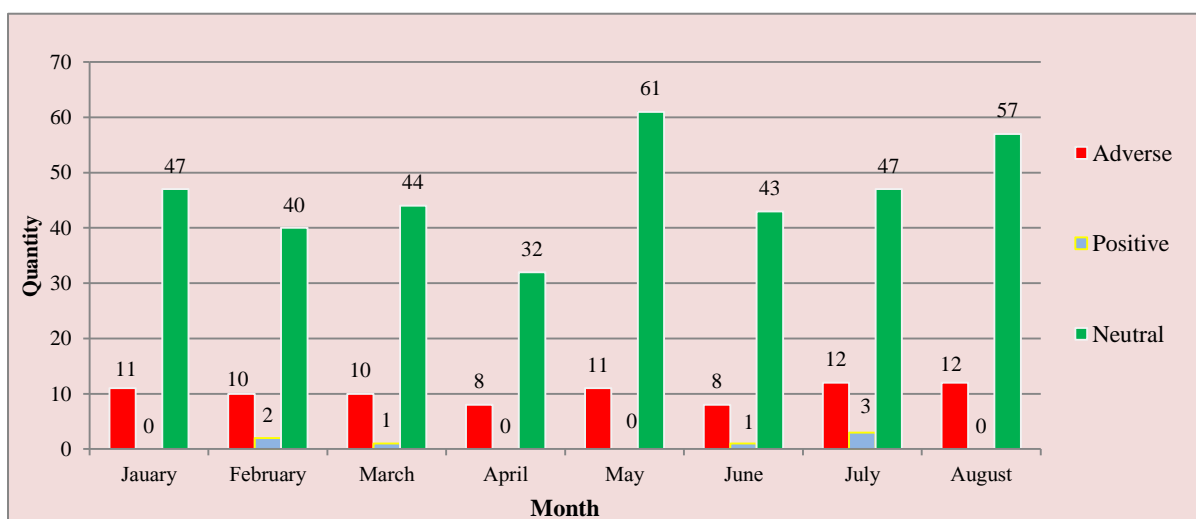


Chart 5.11.2: Classification of related radio news

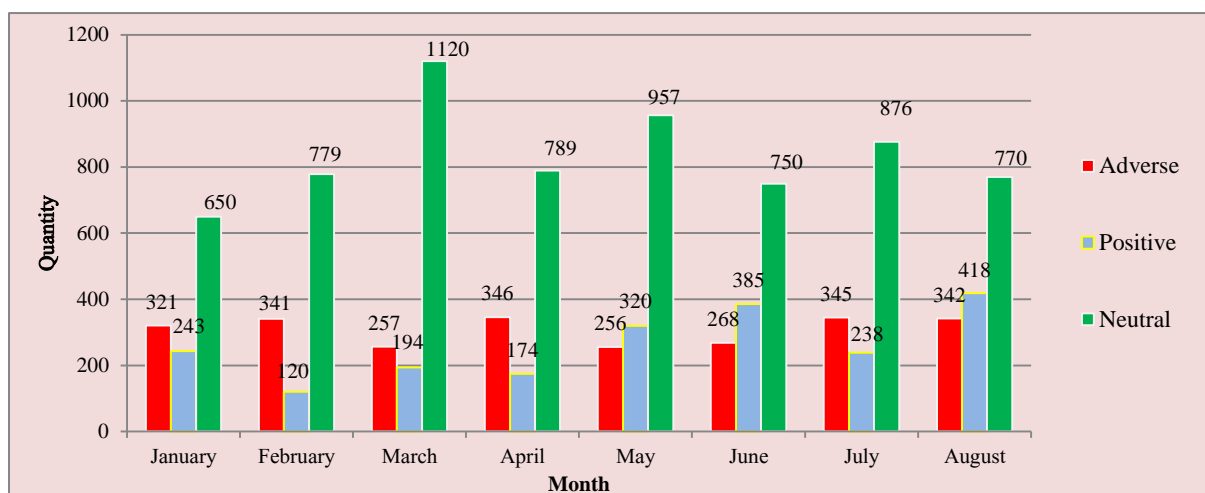


Chart 5.11.3: Classification of related newspaper articles

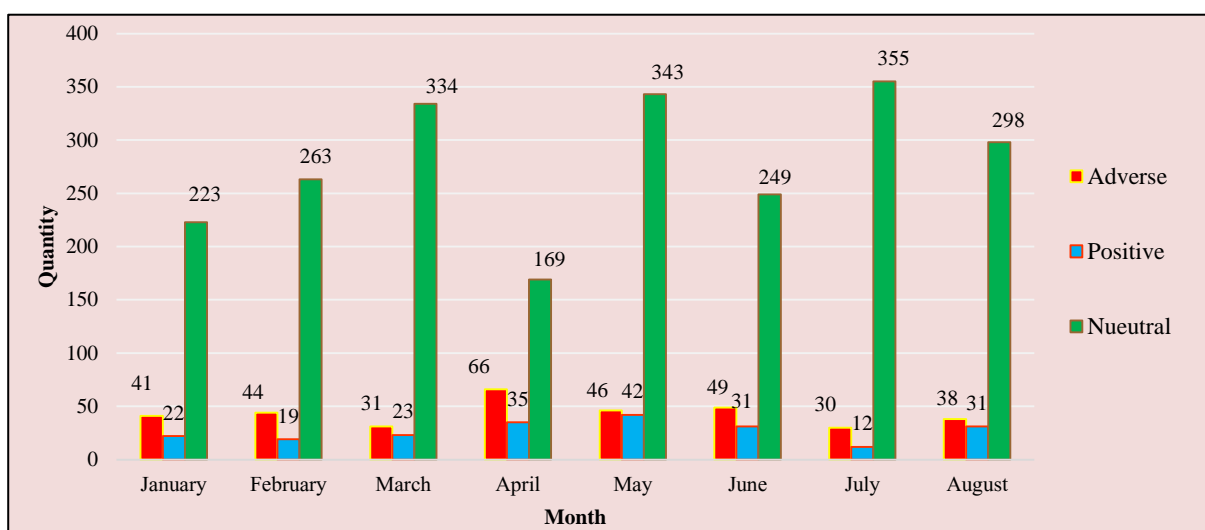


Chart 5.11.4: Classification of related Web news

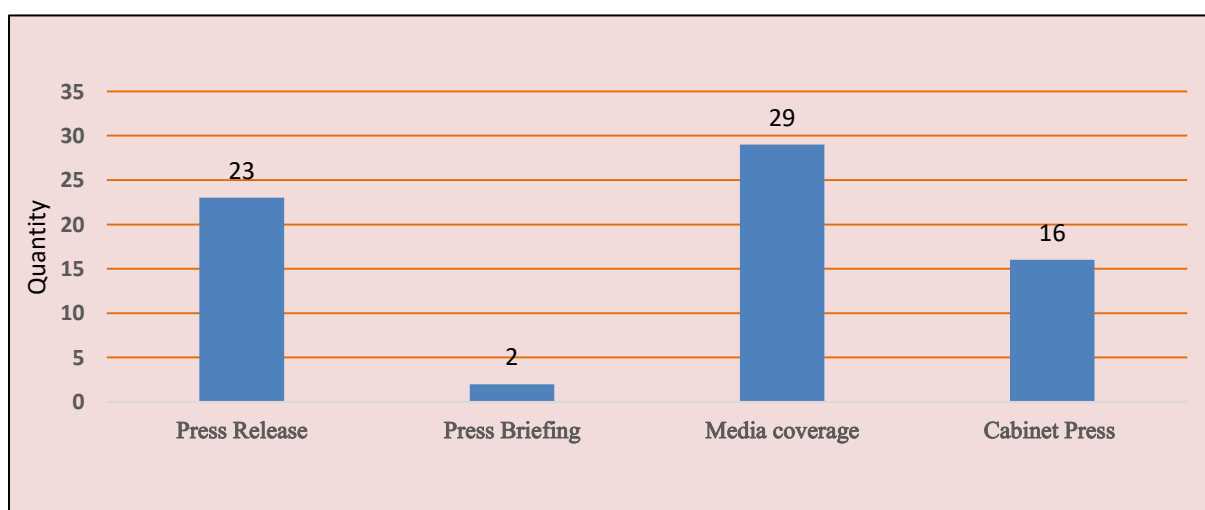


Chart 5.11.5: Progress of routine image building and miscellaneous projects

5.11.5 Aspirations of 2019

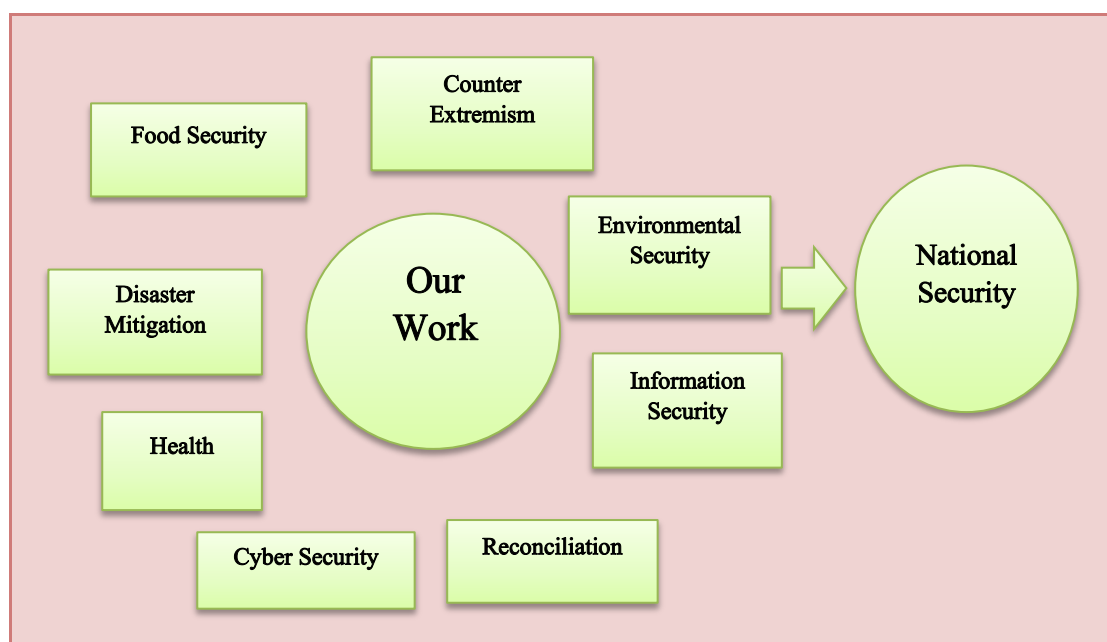
5.12.4 Prospects for 2019

- a. We are planning to improve the scientific laboratory facilities and other accommodations facilities in order to fully function all research wings under the CRD with the limited available space. Plans have been made accordingly to obtain required approval.
 - b. To take necessary action to obtain the approval for research allowances for the research officers who successfully complete projects.
 - d. The main objective of the research and development center was to formulate a national banquet for conducting defence related research and development activities for the three forces, thereby formulating effective strategies and policies for national security. Accordingly, this center played a major role in the successful research and development activities during the past 10 years. Further, activities were further
- expanded to obtain the services of other Government Institutions, which are relevant to the protection of the State as well as the Research and Development Center on the instructions of this Ministry. Accordingly, various issues have arisen due to state rules and regulations in relation to other government agencies. Therefore, taking into consideration these facts, we will endeavor to obtain required approval in the year 2019 to expedite the measures taken to install a “Research and Development Authority” instead of a Research and Development Center, which is an independent element under the Ministry of Defence.
- e. To obtain proper procurement guideline and special approval to purchase hi-tech war like equipment directly from the foreign suppliers in order to enhance the efficiency of the entire research process.

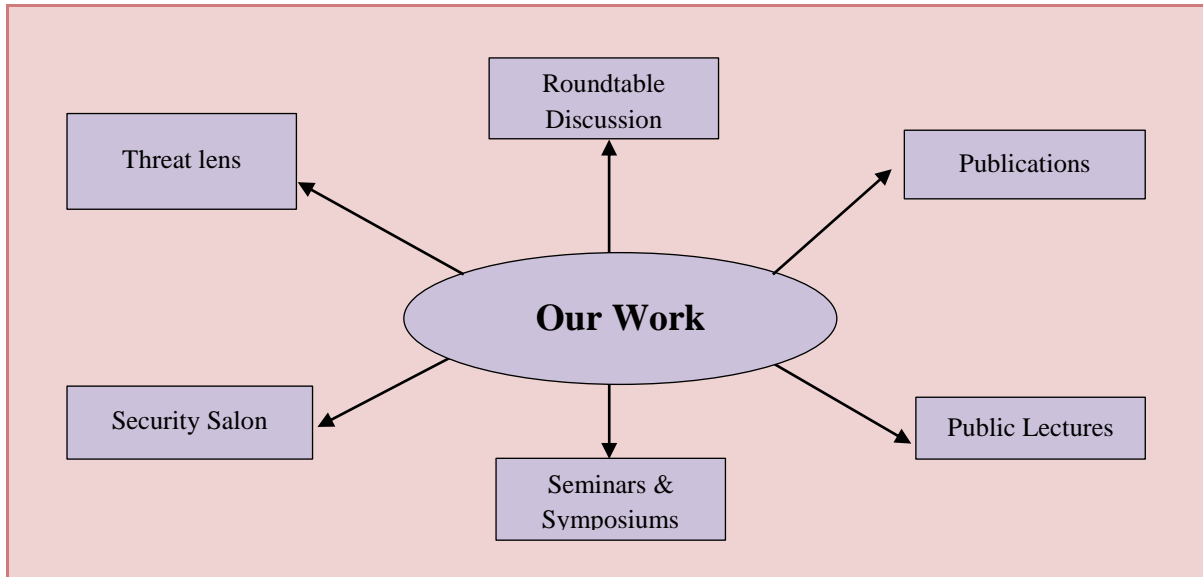

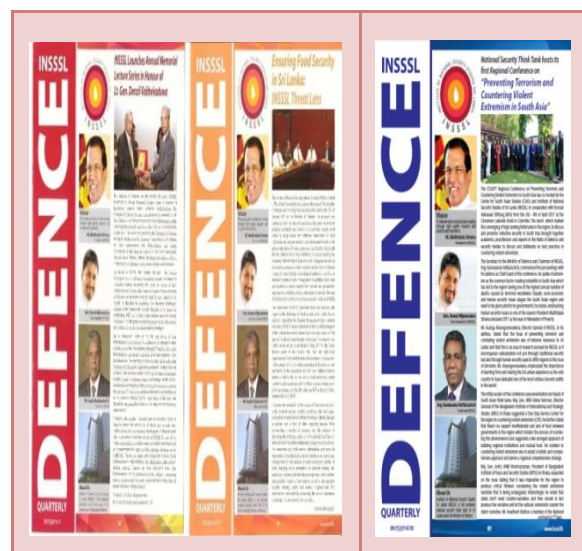

“Home Guard Force” which was established under Section 52 of Mobilization And Supplementary Forces Act (No. 40 of 1985) with the objective of assisting and supporting Sri Lanka Police Service, was established as a new department under the name “Civil Security Department” in line with the cabinet decision (CP/06/135/206/052) dated 02.08.2006. 23 Force Headquarters and 05 Training Schools have been established under this Department which is comprised of a labour force of about 38,000.

As per the Gazette Extraordinary dated 12th June 2015, the posts of District Officer, Warden, Sub Warden, Home Guard/ Civil Guard have been declared as pensionable posts. Further, the role of the department was broadened in line with the cabinet decision dated 05th March 2015, considering the capability of using the human resource of the institution productively for the development activities in rural areas, provincial and local government institutions and the ability to convert the department into an income generating institution

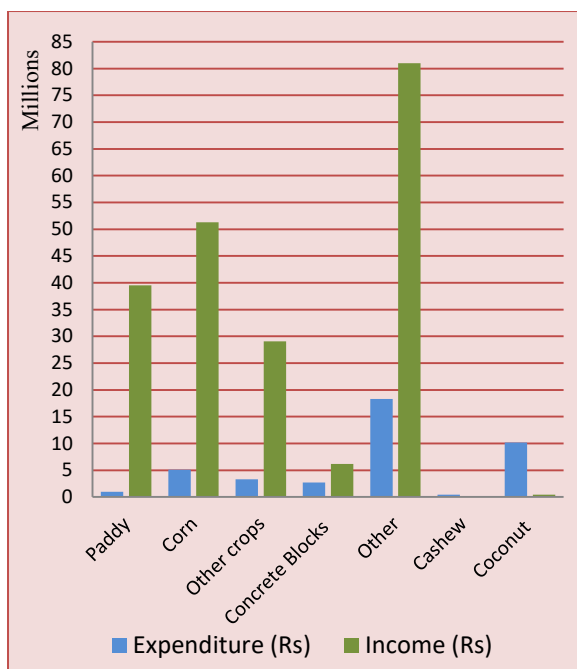


Chart 6.4.1: Income earned from various Projects

The Department of Sri Lanka Coast Guard (SLCG) was established after enacting the Coast Guard Act No. 41 of 2009 enacted by the Sri Lanka Parliament on 09th December 2009 in order to ensure the protection of life and property at sea, enforcement of national jurisdiction in the maritime zones and awareness towards dangers to ocean resources from marine pollution round the clock, round the year ensuring the mission and vision of safe, secure and serene maritime environment. SLCG being a law enforcement agency at sea has been empowered with legal authority to search and arrest ships, craft and personnel engaged in illegal activities in all maritime zones of Sri Lanka and in the high seas.

In order to constitute legal proceedings against the offenders, every officers of SLCG shall deem to be a Peace Officer within the meaning for the purposes of the Code of Criminal Procedure Act No. 15 of 1979. SLCG ceremonially established on 03rd March 2010 and rapid progress was made during the past years. Today, SLCG performing duties with Offshore Patrol Vessels (OPV), Fast Patrol Vessels (FPV), Fast Patrol Crafts (FPC) and Inshore Patrol Crafts (IPC) as surface platforms and Shore Stations including Fishing Monitoring and Lifesaving Points.

6.5.1.5 Operations Department

Following operations were conducted by Operations Department from 01st January to 31st August 2018.

a. Lifesaving Operations.

- (1) SLCG is manning 13 Life Saving points around the country. All these lifesaving points are manned by qualified SLCG lifesavers throughout the year.
- (2) It is significant to note that, in the year 2018, 146 lives including 66 foreigners have been rescued by SLCG lifeguards.

b. Coastal Surveillance to Deny Illicit Activities.

SLCG fleet consists with 01 x OPV, 02 x FPVs, 10 x FPC and 10 x IPC, and they are being utilized to deny illicit activities in territorial waters around the country. Two 30 meter long steel hull Fast Patrol Vessels (FPV) donated by the government of Japan under the project for Maritime Safety Capability Improvement in Sri Lanka, joined the fleet after commissioning as SLCG Samaraksha and SLCG Samudra Raksha on 29th August 2018. 10 x FPC and 03 x IPC have been deployed in Northern region and remaining IPC have been deployed at selected fishery harbours in western and southern regions. In addition to aforesaid tasks, some of the IPC are utilized for lifesaving duties and whale watching monitoring duties at the coastal area off Mirissa.

c. Monitoring of Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated (IUU) fishing.

18 fishing monitoring points have been established around the country in order to support the national plan of action to deter IUU fishing in Sri Lankan waters and high seas. All fishing vessels will be checked before they are proceeding to high sea fishing to ensure the legality of fishing gears and equipment on-board, and also on arrival, same will be done to check the legality of fish catch. The fishing monitoring points are established in following fishery harbours.

d. Community Awareness and Social Service Activities.

Community awareness programmes on following subjects have been conducted for the civilians living along the coastal belt.

- (1) Safety of life at sea.
- (2) Marine pollution prevention & Maritime environment protection.
- (3) Coastal protection.
- (4) Lifesaving.
- (5) Beach cleaning programmes.
- (6) Fishing community awareness programmes to prevent illegal fishing activities.
- (7) Tree planting (Mangrove).

e. Search and Rescue (SAR) Operations.

Assistance rendered to SLN and Sri Lanka Police to carryout SAR operations in coastal areas and at sea using available resources when requirement arises.

f. Law Enforcement Operations.

Law enforcement operations have been carried out in territorial waters and rendered necessary assistances to other national law enforcement agencies and government authorities to perform their respective duties. Eg Sri Lanka Police, Department of Fisheries, and Department of Wildlife Conservation etc. SLCG Fleet units executed three repatriation operations in collaboration with SLN and Indian Coast Guard (ICG). Details of the repatriated fishermen in year 2017 are as follows:

- (a) Total Sri Lankan Fishermen repatriated by ICG to Sri Lanka - 11
- (b) Total Indian Fishermen repatriated by SLCG to India – 139

g. Maritime Environment Protection.

SLCG Oil Spill Response team will act as the first respondent to any oil spill incident in the country and have successfully responded to the oil spill occurred in Kolonnawa heenela on 16th January 2018. Further under Turtle Conservation Project, preservation of turtle eggs and release of baby turtles to the sea is continuing and under Echo friendly Project, planting of Mangrove trees along the coast lines is continuing adjacent to CG stations and bases.

- a. As SLCG has to vacate its Headquarter(HG) and the Advanced Training Centre (ATC) from Mirissa, these two; HQ & ATC need to be relocated at suitable places. The HQ is planned to be shifted to Wellawatta whilst ATC is planned to be shifted to a suitable location in south to facilitate establishment of SLCG specific training activities
- b. A High-Rise building of eleven storeys is planned in Wellawatta to collocate HQ, Regional HQ & SLCG Waruna at an estimated cost of 925 million.
- c. The lifesaving Training school is planning to construct a 35m swimming pool in Balapitiya to facilitate hygienic training environment and safety for the lifesavers.

General Sir John Kotelawala Defence University (KDU) was established under the Sir John Kotelawala Defence Academy Act No. 68 of 1981 and its scope of operation has been enhanced by several subsequent amendments. The University is a state university that operates as an independent institution governed by a Board of Management under the Ministry of Defence, and it provides higher educational opportunities for Tri-service personnel, deserving youths in the country, foreign students and private and public sector personnel in respective subject disciplines at Bachelor's and Post-graduate levels.

6.6.3 Financial and Physical Progress of Main Capital Projects.

There are three projects which can be identified as main capital projects undertaken by KDU. Those are;

6.6.3.1 Establishment of Southern Campus at Sooriyawewa.

Establishment of Southern Campus was progressed by KDU with the contribution of the Sri Lanka Navy for construction works and the Sri Lanka Army for construction of Road Network. By end of 2015, construction works of Phase (I) was completed (more than 90%). The academic activities of Faculty of Build Environment and Spatial Sciences and Faculty of Computing were commenced in February 2015 after the ceremonial opening of the campus by His Excellency the President on 05th of May 2015.

6.6.3.2 Construction of University Hospital, Kotelawala Defence University. (UHKDU)

The University Hospital, Kotelawala Defence University construction project divided in to following main areas.

- 9 storied main hospital building which houses 706 patient's beds, 70 critical care beds and 38 accident and emergency beds.
- Admin Building which houses outpatient unit, clinical theatre units, accident and emergency units and other ancillary

services such as laundry, kitchen, pharmacy, retail area, etc.

- There are 09 peripheral accommodation buildings have been built to accommodate various professions.

The construction of the main hospital building is being done under accelerated process and approximately 90% of the construction works had been completed by the contractor Poly Technologies Inc.

6.6.3.3 Construction of Engineering Faculty Building.

The construction of a new building for Faculty of Engineering at a cost of LKR 500 million was commenced in 2013 and budgetary allocations have been granted annually for the construction. The Phase I of the building was completed in March 2015. The new building complex accomplishes and contributes to ergonomics, economy, energy, environmental sustainability and capacity enhancement of the faculty of Engineering to accommodate the increasing student strength in the future.

Rakna Arakshaka Lanka Limited was established in 2007, under the Ministry of Defense, incorporated as a

limited liability company to provide security to places of national importance and capable in contributing uninterrupted towards the economy. As a self sustainable enterprise, it is not an enterprise funded by the Treasury.

All the personnel in employment at Rakna Arakshaka Lanka limited, serving the company are ex-servicemen, retired and officially discharged from the Tri Forces, Special Task Force, Sri Lanka Police, Civil Defense Department, and are engaged in providing security services to Strategic Economic Centres of the State Sector as well as the Private Sector, throughout all the regions of the island; and by doing so, the company has ensured employment to a large number of war heroes, and a secured future for their families.

Inaugerated as the Land Operations Division which started with a small number of personnel, by deploying just 87 ex-servicemen, to provide security services to some strategically important places in the city, by now have a strength of over 1,500 employees.

In addition to that, in order to provide security cover to Merchant Vessels, the Maritime Division was established in March 2011 and by 31st August 2018, 533 Sea Marshals have been registered while 08 Maritime Security Companies under agreements signed with the company.

The Fire and Emergency Response Training School was inaugurated in the year 2012, under Rakna Arakshaka Lanka Limited, at Nedungolla. There, Basic Training is provided for Security Officers, Fire and Emergency Response Training, Sea Marshals Training as well as the Training of Private Security personnel from Private Security Companies and of the State Sector Establishments.

Thalapathpitiya Restaurant of Rakna Arakshaka Lanka Limited was commenced in the year 2014 and although the restaurants which commenced under "Api Wenuwen Api" the restaurant at Kimbulawela, and Navam Mawatha have been managed by Rakna Arakshaka Lanka, the profits earned are credited to the "Api Wenuwen Api" Fund.

6.8.1 Financial Progress of the Company.

Rakna Arakshaka Lanka Limited is a self financing company and the Turn Over From 01.01.2018 to 31.08.2018 has been Rs.493.9, while the Profit before Tax was Rs.58.29 Million.

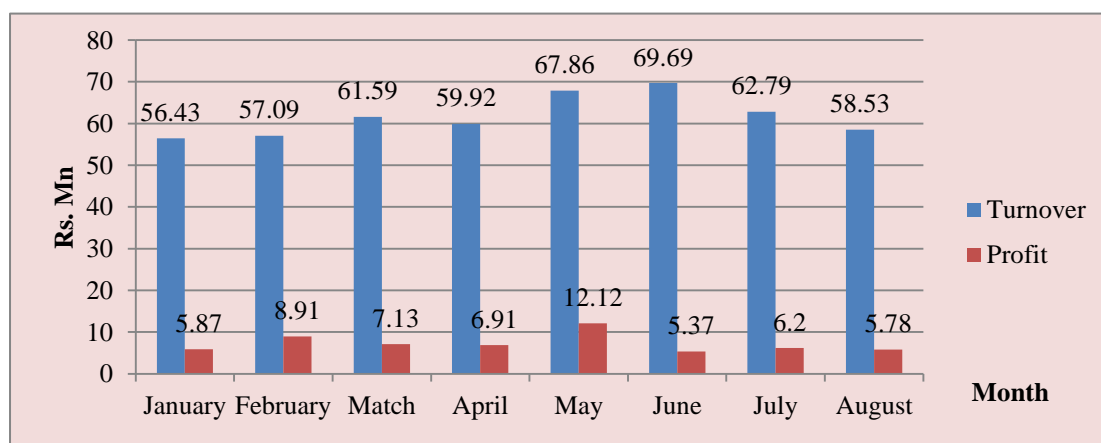


Chart 6.8.1: Turnover and Profit of Rakna Arakshaka Lanka Limited

6.8.2 Progress of the Company

a. Land Operations Division

In consequence with the policy related developments, in the years of 2015 and 2016, the instability caused to Rakna Arakshaka Lanka , the company lost seventeen (17) clients from state as well as private sector establishments , and 1,370 security servicemen and women left us. However, with the policy decision by the Government to stabilise and continue the Company again, it has succeeded in increasing the number of clients to a satisfactory level with fifty three (53) and the number of security servicemen and women to nine hundred and fifty (950) .

Also, as it has been compelled to provide the Security Services in a highly competitive environment, although the numbers of personnel reduced occasionally, the Company has been successful in maintaining a stabilised level.

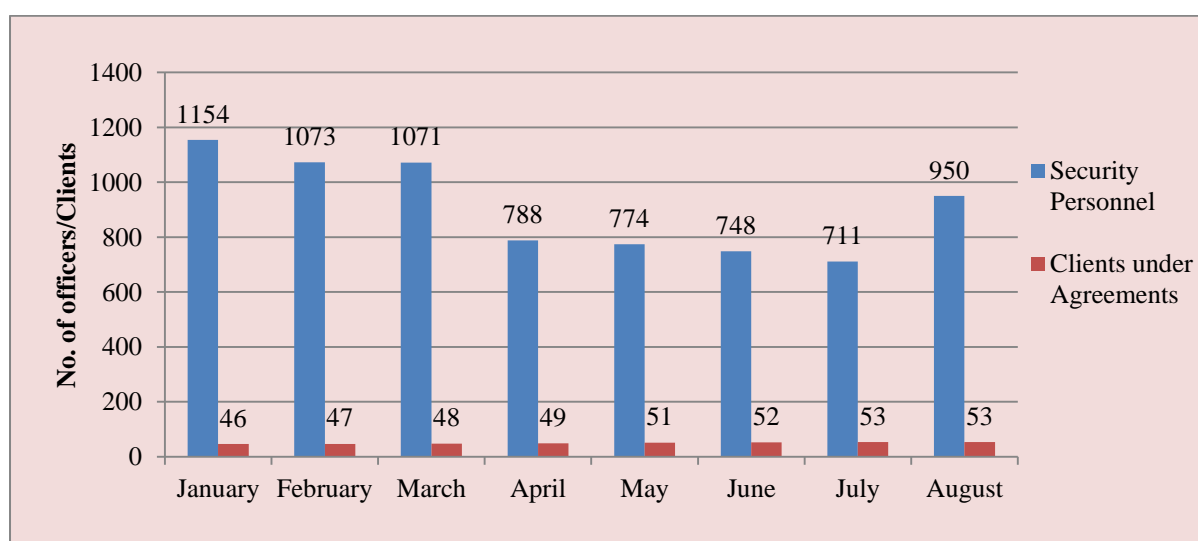


Chart 6.8.2: Security Personnel and Clients Agreements

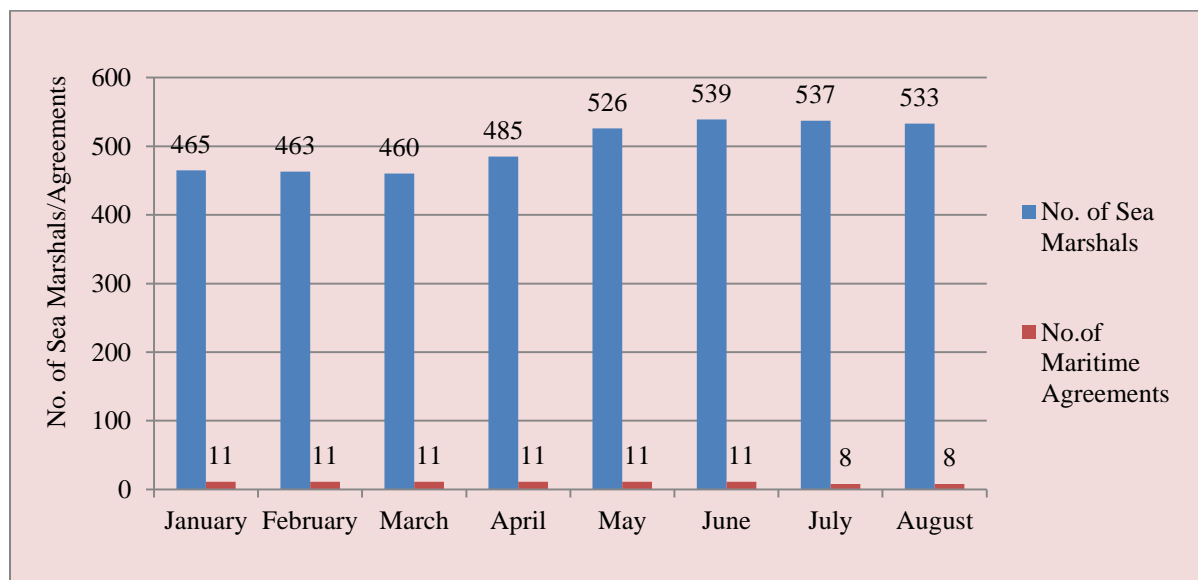


Chart 6.8.3: No of Sea Marshals and Maritime Served under Agreements

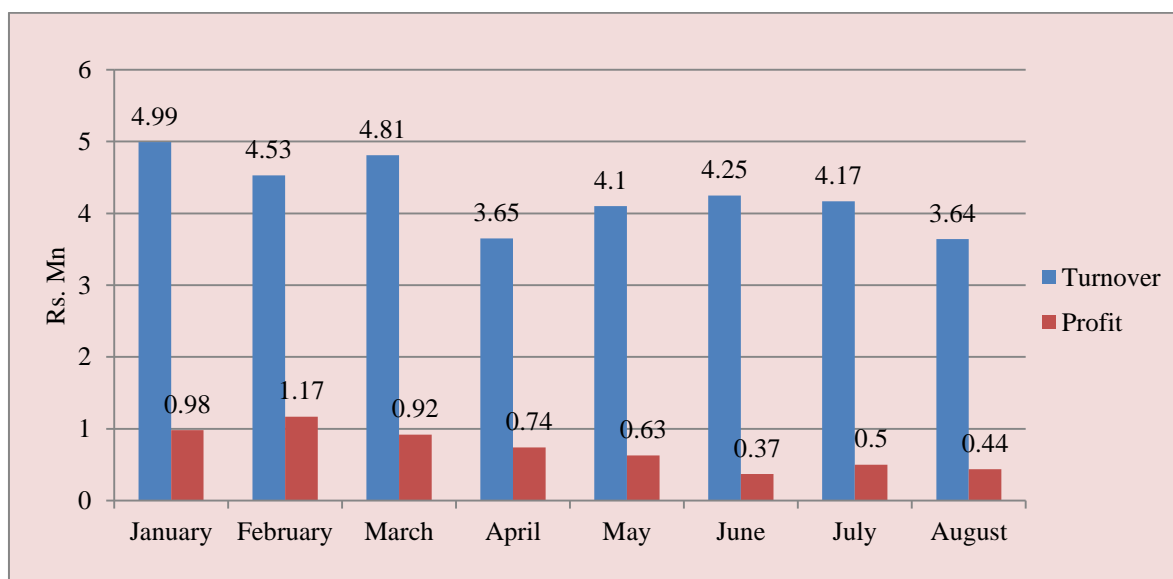


Chart 6.8.4: Turnover and Profit of the Catering Division

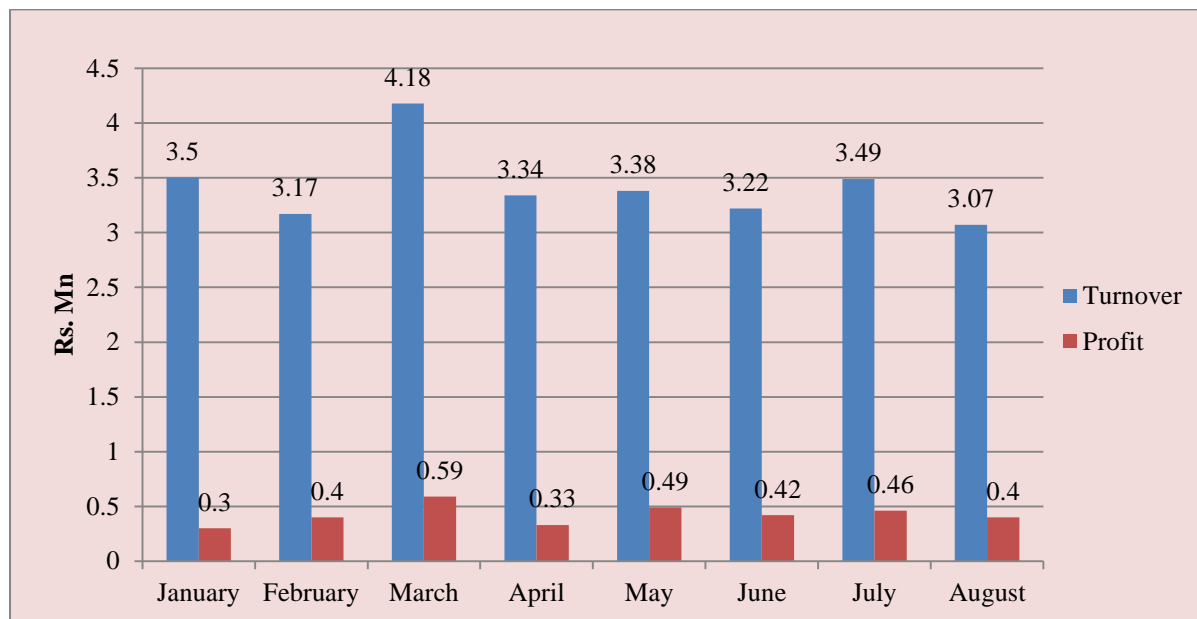


Chart 6.8.5: Nawam Mawatha and Kimbulawela ‘Api Wenuwen Api’ Turnover and Profit

7.1 Objectives

- Providing guidance to prepare policies projects and programmes relevant to the subjects of the Statutory bodies coming under the purview of the State Ministry of Defence.
- Providing legal support for all the other functions entrusted to the institutions under the purview of the State Ministry of Defence.
- Organizing programmes relevant to obtaining the contribution of retired Warheroes towards national development.
- Conducting matters pertaining to the professional development of the staff members of the institution.

7.2 Special projects supervised and implemented by the State Ministry of Defence

7.2.1 Virusumithuru Housing Project

The “ Virusumithuru ” housing project was initiated targeting the housing requirement of the next of kin of Warheroes killed in action during the days of war and of disabled Warheroes and their families. This housing project is implemented in collaboration by the Ranaviru Seva Authority with the National Housing Development Authority of the Ministry of Housing and Construction, under the complete supervision of the State Ministry of Defence.

Under this project, 1950 fully – built houses suitable for the occupancy of Warheroes are to be constructed island wide whilst 1700 partially – built houses not yet completed for occupancy are to be constructed, bringing the total number of houses to 3650. The duration of the project is 04 years from 2017 and the annual target is 913 houses.

Accordingly, 488 fully – built houses and 425 partially – built houses are to be completed and provisions have been allocated as Rs. 798 Mn for year 2017 and Rs. 2394 Mn for 2018-2019 and 2020.

192 fully – built houses and 52 partially – built houses were set to be constructed in 2017. 151 fully – built houses and 24 partially – built houses have been completed. 6 fully – built houses 36 partially – built houses are being constructed in this year.

7.2.2 Virusara Privilege Card

The Virusara privilege card of the State Ministry of Defence was introduced as an act of gratitude towards the unparalleled contribution and immense sacrifice of the valiant Warheroes who gave their lives and limbs during the war and were missing in action during the humanitarian operations and with the objective of promoting the Warhero community within the society. The Virusara privilege card, carrying the theme of ‘‘Sudu Paraviyanta Mul Thena Denna (Give Priority to the White Pigeons)’ , has now approached its second phase. This project is directed by the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

69 Government and Private Institutions have contributed toward actively empowering the Virusara concept. Accordingly the Virusara beneficiaries are entitled to receive special benefits, significant discounts as well as priority in serving when purchasing goods and services from a host of institutions including consumer products, banking, finance and leasing, insurance, communication, education and vocational training, health and

transportation. As of 31.07.2018, 40, 686 Virusara privilege cards have been issued.

7.2.3 The Retired Warheroes ‘Agriculture Project’

All officers and other rankers of the Tri Forces, Police and the Civil Security Department who are engaged in active service retire after an excellent service period of 22 years. The majorities of the retired Warheroes are 42 - 45 years old and possess maturity and youthful energy whilst about 90% are Warheroes who joined the Armed Forces from a rural, agricultural family background. Therefore, the State Ministry of Defence which recognized the effective contribution of their youthful energy and skills towards the economy of the country to be a national requirement, introduced the Retried Warheroes agricultural project in order to integrate the Warheroes in to the civil society by attaching them to an honourable profession suitable to the civil society as well as to their own goals after retirement.

Thus, a leading project for drawing in retired Warheroes towards the rapid development of the country in the capacity of agricultural entrepreneurs was commenced. At present, the Ministry has taken steps to provide the necessary training through the conclusion of 09 programmes. Further, a fair for Ranaviru agricultural products was successfully held at the Ministerial premises on 27.08.2018.

National Cadet Corps (NCC) is an organization that train school senior and junior cadets (males and females) and presently there are 3,563 Cadet Platoons (89,075 x cadets) available all-over the island within 9 x Provinces and 38 x Battalions. This includes Army, Navy, Air Force and Police platoons.

“To groom youth to be a dynamic, disciplined citizens with extra-ordinary leadership qualities in order to face utmost challenges in the society”.

MISSION

To train school cadets and inspire cadets using effective training curriculums in order to develop Character, Sportsmanship, Self-Reliance, Discipline, Civil mindedness, Spirit Of Adventure, Responsibility, Comradeship to be a valuable human resource of well-trained youth, capable of providing leadership in all aspects of life

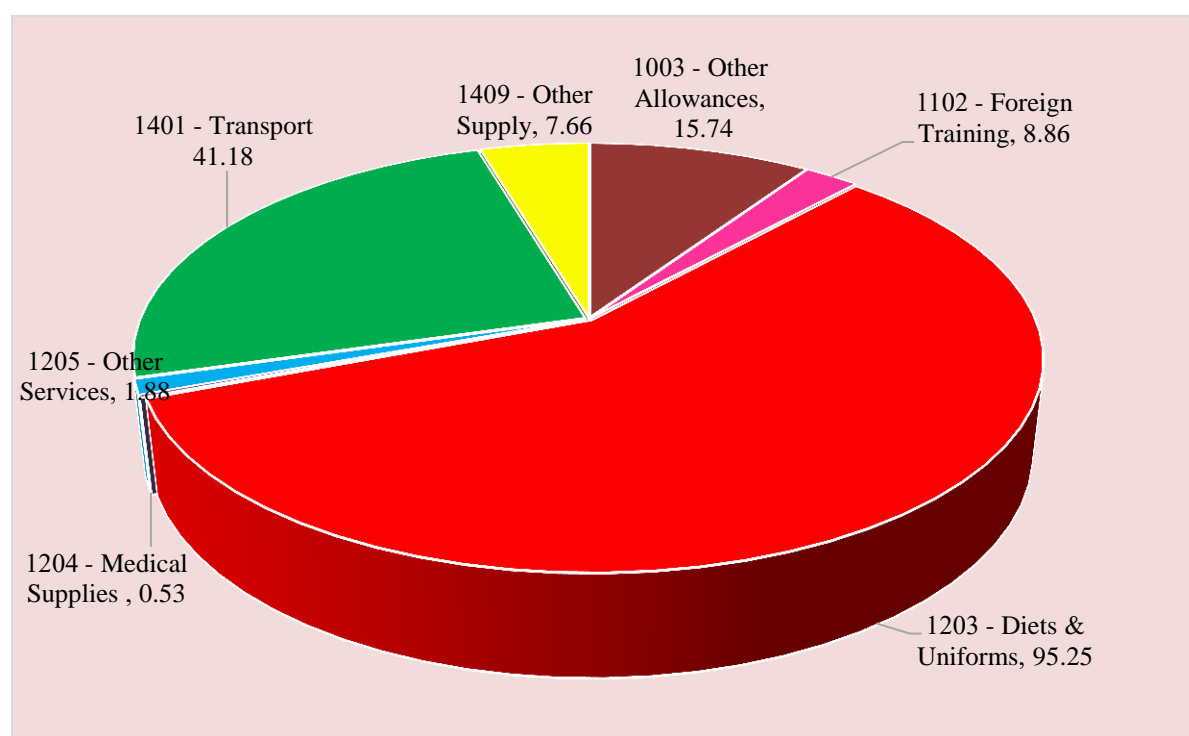
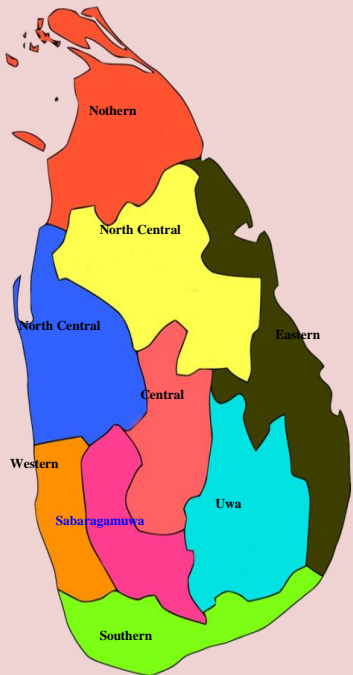


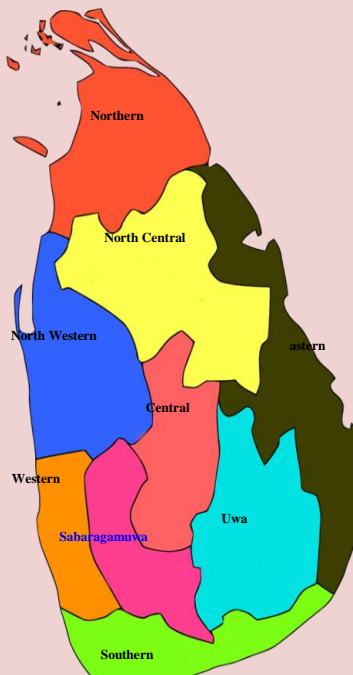
Chart 8.1.1: Composition of expenditure

Defence Services Command and Staff College (DSCSC) is an institute that provides military education to the officers of the tri services. The DSCSC was initially established as Army Command and Staff College with the aim of imparting knowledge on Command, Staff aspects for selected officers from the tri services and it was officially inaugurated on 28 August 1998. College offered the first learning experience of joint operations in a joint environment as was transformed into DSCSC on 22 January 2007 considering the security situation of the country and the requirement of joint nature in military operations due to the security situation prevailed at the time. Moreover, the efforts of all military arms was felt imperative to be joint, in order to enhance the national security as military operations in isolation could never gain the required results. Furthermore, changing tactics of the adversaries who fought the armed forces of Sri Lanka compelled to review the military doctrines in war fighting, thus setting conditions for the sound “Joint Environment”. Moreover, it was an important milestone in the history of the Sri Lankan armed forces, all military doctrines, strategic level planning and teachings were brought under one entity, as practice by many other armed forces of the world. At present, Course No 12- (2018) of the DSCSC under progress and 126 officers from Sri Lankan Armed Forces and 14 foreign officers from tri forces are following the Staff Course successfully.

DSCSC functions directly under the State Ministry of Defence and is governed by a Board of Management (BOM). The BOM consist of the Secretary of State Ministry, Chief of Defence Staff and the three Service Commanders headed by the Secretary to the Ministry of Defence. DSCSC is staffed by service personnel from the Tri services, and civilian staff employed by Ministry of Defence. The Chief Executive Officer of DSCSC is the Commandant.

The Course Number 12 of the year 2018 commenced in the month of January and will terminate in December. The Course consisted with the following local and foreign student officers:

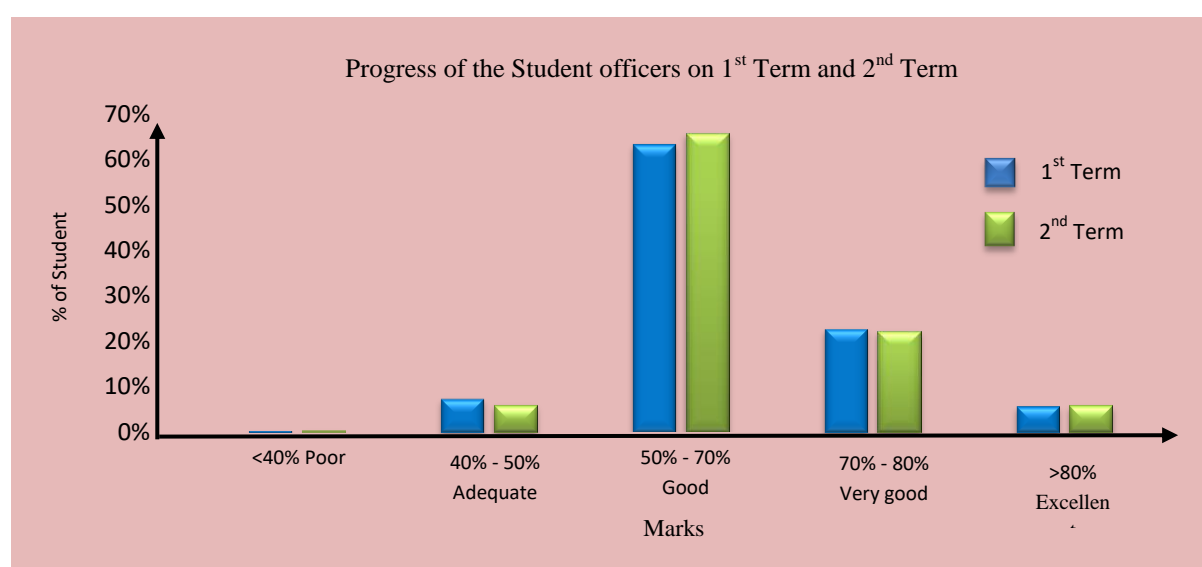


Chart 8.2.1: Progress of the Student officers on 1st Term and 2nd Term

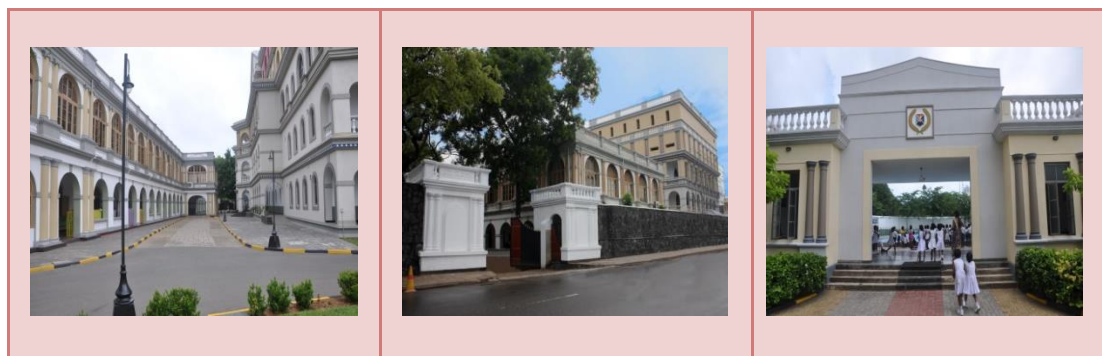

Defence Services College (DSC) was established in January 2007 at Malay Street in Colombo 02 mainly to ease the challenges currently encountered by the members of the Armed Services and the Police, pertaining to admission of their children to popular schools. Later a cabinet approval has been granted to develop DSC concept as a special educational project to establish the Defence Services Colleges in each district and the DSC Colombo as the centralized hub of the system. Accordingly there are two schools (DSC Colombo and DSC Kurunegala) function at present.

8.3.1 Defence Services College – Colombo

DSC – Colombo, which was established on 17 June 2007 and function as a National School and the students' population is over 3116 up to Grade 12 at present. The college is committed to a rigorous, comprehensive approach to promote all academic and extracurricular activities and is regarded as the supreme resource to be utilized in accordance with the guidance of Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Defence.



8.3.2 Defence Services Viru Daru Vidu Piyasa - Kurunegala

Defence Services College, Kurunegala was established on 29 January 2009 and DSC functions as a mixed school and the student population is over 1283 up to Grade 9 at present.

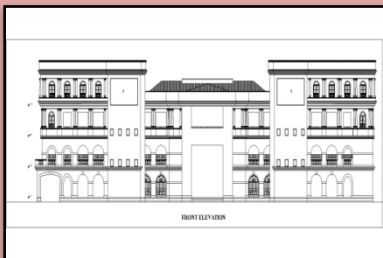

8.3.4 Physical Progress of the Institute

Administration of the both DSC Colombo and Kurunegala, Development and maintaining works of infrastructure facilities are coordinated by Administrative wing. Accordingly, following development projects are conducted as described below

8.3.4.1 Construction of Hostel Building for DSC Colombo

The main objective of constructing a hostel complex is to provide accommodation and mess facilities to the students coming from the distant areas and more specifically to enable them to excel in their studies, maintain good health, safe and secure life while enjoying modern facilities and participation in extra-curricular activities essential for personality development. In order to provide the hostel facilities, a cabinet approval (14/1078/503/098 dated 2014.07.28) has been granted to construct a four-storied Hostel block with the total allocation of Rs. 448.1 Mn (Excluding Labour). Accordingly, nearly 65% of the total project had been completed by spending Rs. 287.41 up to end of the year 2017. Sum of Rs. 199 Mn allocation has been received for the year 2018 and the physical and financial progress up to 31 August 2018 is as follows.

8.3.4.2 Establishing Solar Powered Electricity System for the DSC Colombo

In order to minimize the expenditure for monthly electricity bills of DSC Colombo and obtain an alternative power project with long-term economic benefits and positive environmental implications a cabinet approval has been given by CP16/1993/703/080 dated 19 October 2016 to establish Solar Powered Electricity System for DSC Colombo and sum of Rs. 30 Mn has been allocated for this project. The paper advertisement has already been published for selecting a supplier and the project is expected to be completed before end of the year 2018.

8.3.4.3 A new class room building, Boundary Wall

Internal Roads and new water project have been completed by spending Rs. 215 Mn and entrusted to the possession of students by the His Excellency the President on 29 March 2017. Further, A cabinet approval has been granted (CP/17/1118/703/048 and dated 21 June 2017) to construct a Common Facilities building and sum of Rs. 170 Mn (Including taxes) allocation has been received for the year 2018. Accordingly, the project has been commenced and expected to be completed before end of the year 2019. The financial and physical progress of the project is as follows

“Despite the change of scope of this Ministry as the Ministry of Defence by the Extraordinary Gazette Notification No 2096/17 of 05th of November 2018 this report reflects the progress of the Law and Order Division of the Ministry of Public Administration, Management and Law & Order up to 30th of September 2018 and development targets of the year 2019.”

9.1. Law & Order Division

9.1.1 Introduction

Ministry of Law & Order and Southern Development established by Gazette Extraordinary No.1942 /10 of 24.11.2015 rendered its services up to 27.03.2018 in terms of the scope of Law & Order and Southern Development until the Ministry of Law & Order is established by Gazette Extraordinary No.2064/26 of 28.03.2018. Subsequently it was functioned as the Ministry of Law & Order up to 11.05.2018 and thereafter in keeping with the state policies it is functioning through the scopes entrusted to the Law & Order division to ensure law & order of the Island as per Gazette Extraordinary No.2070/56 of 12.05.2018.

Accordingly, Sri Lanka Police and the Special Task Force are functioning to ensure law and order, overcome crime, violence and offences, to prevent crime and anti-social activities as well as to establish social discipline thus shouldering a major responsibility entrusted to the division. The National Police Commission also provides a sterling assistance in that connection. Furthermore Sri Lanka Police, Special Task Force and National Dangerous Drugs Control Board are joining hands to control and prevent dangerous drugs which have become a menace to the country.

The Law & Order division is shouldering its massive task of ensuring social co-existence by creating a conducive environment in terms of state policies to safe guard freedom and peace among all segments of the society and to ensure reliability on it.

All in all this division is giving its assistance by performing functions such as safeguarding law and order, taking appropriate measures for safety in vehicular transportation and highways, designing and implementing effective plans for prevention and control of the use and circulation of dangerous drugs. Also, it supports to create a developed country through social development by formulating policies, providing guidance and supervision, performance evaluation and follow up activities.

Vision

“A law abiding and disciplined country”

Mission

“To maintain a peaceful ambience in the country through establishment of law & order, control and prevention of the use of dangerous drugs”

Objectives

- To formulate policies and provide guidance required to maintain a peaceful social environment whereby every person living in the country can lead a life free of fear and doubt.
- To formulate rules and regulations for traffic control and for minimizing traffic congestion for a convenient transportation.
- To take measures necessary to improve efficiency of Police Service in collaboration with the National Police Commission.
- To formulate policies to prevent use and circulation of dangerous drugs and to rehabilitate and socialize users of such drugs.

- Formulation of policies, programs and projects pertaining to subjects of the law & order as well as the subjects of Departments and statutory bodies vested to the Ministry, follow-up and evaluation.
- Giving directions for maintenance of law and order.

- Taking necessary steps to improve efficiency of Police Service under instructions of the Police Commission.
- Providing guidance to prevent various types of crimes and anti-social activities that have turned out to be a disaster.
- Providing directions required to control traffic movement.
- Assistance for prevention of the use of dangerous drugs.
- Providing guidance for all other institutions pertaining to law & order and which are coming under purview of the Ministry.
- Supervision of institutions with relevant to subject of law & order under the Ministry.

9.1.2 Quarterly Progress of the Law & Order Division

9.1.2.1 Human Resources Development

The staff according to cadre approved by the Department of Management Services at the beginning of year 2018, as classified under 24 types of posts, amounts to 124 personnel. Recruitment and attachment of 92 out of that number was completed by 30.09.2018. Accordingly, it was able to fulfil 74% of the total cadre requirement by the end of the third quarter of year 2018. The Director post (SLAS) approved for Southern Development was removed

from the approved cadre on 28.03.2018 with the combining of the subject with another Ministry. Action is being taken to recruit a suitable officer to the post of Legal officer. In addition there is also a post of Director Media (non SLAS) approved on a cabinet decision.

9.1.2.2 Training of officers for higher performance

▪ Local trainings

Fifty two officers were trained within the first 03 quarters in view of enhancing the efficiency of the staff. That is one officer on Government Procurement, two officers on computerized payment system, three officers on English Language Certificate Courses for job requirements while 46 officers in several grades for second language Courses.

▪ Foreign trainings

Three officers in the division were participated in foreign training by September 30, 2018.

9.1.2.3 Towards systematic beginning of the specific tasks

In order to carry out the tasks associated with the division and under the purview of the division in a streamlined and transparent manner within a legal

framework, 53 Cabinet memoranda based on various subjects have been submitted to the Cabinet of Ministers during the period under review. Necessary measures are being taken to execute the tasks in the division and its institutions in pursuance of approvals and recommendations issued.

9.1.2.4 Reformation of Sri Lanka Police in a new way

A committee comprising of experts in the field was established in the year 2016 in order to reform 'Sri Lanka Police' in line with future requirements. Recommendations of the committee in relation to properly updated short comings and thereby to establish a better and efficient police service in future were submitted to Hon. Minister last year.

Two workshops have been conducted on 11.05.2018 and 04.09.2018 with the chairmanship of Hon. Minister and participation of officials in the Ministry, Sri Lanka Police and other stakeholders. Action is being taken to submit a Cabinet Memorandum seeking the approval to initiate Action Plan on Police Reforms.

9.1.2.5 University for Sri Lanka Police

It was proposed in the year 2015 to establish a special University named National Police University for Sri Lanka Police. Plans in relation to this proposal are being designed by a committee established by the Ministry. Approval of the Cabinet was requested to seek the instructions of the Legal Draftsman to draft the bill. Action is being taken by the Department of External Resources to find out the possibility to obtain donations from Australian Government.

9.1.2.6 Relief for politically victimized officers

Three hundred and seventy nine officers were called for the interview before the three member committee appointed to look into this matter and recommendations were issued to the effect that 129 of them have been politically victimized. Relief measures were recommended for the said 129 officers and Cabinet approval was also obtained for the purpose. Action in relation to that is in the final stage.

9.1.2.7 Actively contributing to eliminate drug menace

- **Taking necessary steps to control drug peddling**

Approval of the Cabinet was obtained to draft a special provisions bill on drug control in order to prepare a formal process to control drug peddling with the support of three forces as well. Objective of this exercise is to initiate attempt to eliminate drug menace.

- **Strengthening regional cooperation to minimize circulation of drugs**

With the approval of the Cabinet action has been initiated to sign a memorandum of understanding among Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal and Sri Lanka the member countries of coordinating center of project on "strengthening of possibility for law enforcing on south Asian Drugs" in order to prevent drug circulation.

9.1.2.8 Towards rapidly addressing public grievances

- **Conducting public day of the Law and Order Division**

Seven public days have been conducted during this year under the patronage of Hon. Minister and with the participation of Secretary, officers of the Ministry and Sri Lanka Police as well as senior officials of the institutions coming under the law and order division. Action has been finalized for 476 out of 1,070 appeals and 326 appeals are in operation. Also it is found that 268 appeals are difficult to solve.



- **Tell President**

"Tell President" Project is functioning under the direct supervision of H.E. the President as a mechanism for solving various unsolved problems of people. Under this project operating in the

Presidential Secretariat measures are taken to refer the hitherto unresolved issues of the people pertaining to Sri Lanka Police, Special Task Force, National Dangerous Drugs Control Board, through chamber set up in the division. 2,818 complaints have been received during the past 9 month period. Steps have been taken to solve 2,184 of them while 627 are at investigation level. There are seven complaints with no sufficient information for investigation.

▪ 118 Emergency Call Service

A 24 hour emergency call service is operated in the division enabling submission of complains, proposals, charges, grievances made by public by 118 telephone number. Call back message is given for those complaints within 24 hours and 29,506 complaints were solved during the past months.

9.1.2.9 Setting up an automatic fine payment system

This proposal was submitted to automatically pay fines for offences which are not brought before the court pertaining to matters of violating traffic rules with a view to speeding up charging fines, making convenient payment system for the public to pay fines. A feasibility study is being carried out at present in order to obtain instructions from National representative for public private cooperation established under the Ministry of Finance and Media and thereafter to consider the methodology for initiation of the project.

9.1.2.10 Enhancing Police Information and Communication System

This project was initiated with a view to improving efficiency through enhancement of capacity for command, control, communications, computers, intelligence surveillance and reconnaissance.

It is anticipated to initiate basic step covering Western Province while the second continues as an Island wide project. Approval of the Cabinet was requested to select a suitable institution and to appoint a project committee and discussion committee following proposals from institutions to

initiate the project on donation or concessionary rates.

9.1.2.11 Obtaining international cooperation for maintenance of law and order

Two memorandums of understanding with Indonesia and Iran were signed in 2018 in order to enhance efficiency of Sri Lanka Police and thereby to maintain law and order. In addition to that actions in relation to submission of proposals signing of agreements required for memorandums of understanding are being carried out with Qatar, Turkey, United Arab Emirates, Australia, Vietnam, South Africa, Russia and Thajikistan.



9.1.2.12 First step for Sustainable Development Goals

A workshop on identification of duty assigned with this division for the initiation of Sustainable Development Goals as per the Sustainable Development agenda and awareness of institutions coming under it was held on 26.03.2018 at Auditorium with the corporation of “Swiss Asia” programme in the Ministry of Mahaweli Development and Environment. Fifty officers from this division including Sri Lanka Police, Special Task Force and National Dangerous Drugs Control Board were participated at this workshop and Sri Lanka’s responsibility in relation to Sustainable Development Goals and duty of this division were discussed at the workshop.

9.1.2.13 Working hand in hand with the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs.

With the financial sponsorship of this Division and the Ministry of Women and Child affairs a musical

programme was conducted for the mental relief of pregnant mothers. Eighty one officers were participated at this programme.

9.1.2.14 Conducting Progress Review meetings

Eight monthly and quarterly progress review meetings were conducted in 2018 with the participation of this division and the institutions. It was able to identify issues connected with those institutions and to find out immediate solutions as well as to prepare plans require to initiate them.

9.1.2.15 Holding Audit and Management Committee Meetings

As per the Audit plan in 2018 Audit and Management Committee Meetings were held for the first, second and third quarters. Eight Internal Audit Queries were made out during the year while three questionnaires were forwarded to several institutions. Two petitions forwarded in relation to institutions under the division were cleared. Financial and physical performance of institutions that has to be referred to Public Accounts Committee for 2017 as well as information that have to be submitted to Public Accounts Committee and Public Committee on Public Enterprises in relation to 2015 and 2016 was also duly forwarded.

9.2.1 Sri Lanka Police

9.2.1.1 Introduction

The Police Department was established on the 3rd of September 1866 with a view to providing an organized service to the general public during the era of British rule in compliance with the Police Ordinance No. 16 of 1865. From that day to the present nearly 153 years Sri Lanka Police is contributing its prime responsibility of establishing law and order in the Island.

The Sri Lanka Police has been entrusted with an exclusively huge onus towards preserving the safety of the community throughout 24 hours. Among them elimination and prevention of crime, elimination of drug menace, vehicular management, conservation of environment, providing relief for the public at disasters, VVIP security are in the forefront.

Over 84,000 Police Officers in Supervision Grade, Inspector Grade and Primary Grades are in service to perform this task. Preparing of background required to create law abiding citizens, stepping up of the trend of bringing criminals before law and converting the police into a people's friendly police service are carried out by Sri Lanka Police. It has set up number of divisions including Administration, Support services, Headquarters, Criminal, Training,

Welfare, Transport, Logistic, Information & Technology, Personnel & Admin, Investigations and Civil administration under direct supervision of senior staff officers.

According to the table above solving of the grave crimes means the number of arrests in relation to reported grave crimes. Minor complaints or minor offences which have been finalized after giving solutions by Sri Lanka Police or by reference to the Mediation Board or by filing Court cases have been represented as solutions given under that segment.

According to table – 03 above, in view of the rate of reporting and solved crimes, a slight increase of reported crimes may be observed during initial three quarters of year 2018 in comparison with the initial three quarters in year 2017. Minor Offences against persons and Minor Complaints have contributed to the rise of reported crimes. Percentage of solving reported crimes as at the end of first 03 quarters in 2018 is 90%.

▪ **Crimes against women and minors**

Women and children play a significant role in a society. Prevention of crimes against women and minors therefore takes a special significance in building up a society free of crime and violence. ▪ Relief for Police Security Assistants

In terms of the conditions and decisions entered in relation to the case filed in the Supreme Court under FR Application No.441/2015 posts 1,731 out of 1,789 Police Security Assistants posts approved to absorb for Police Constable Posts in Sri Lanka Police were suppressed. Instead of that 1,731 new Police Constable Posts were approved to the Regular Police Service under FR71 with the approval of the Management Services Department. Action is being taken to absorb Police Security Assistants to the posts of Police Constable.

In the meantime a Cabinet Memorandum was submitted on 15.08.2018 to obtain approval to grant pensionable status for the Police Security Assistants who have already re-instated and to be re-instate in the future at the grant of pensionable status for Sri Lanka Police Security Assistants.

▪ Recruitments

The approved Uniform Staff of Sri Lanka Police by 30th September 2018 is 83,872 and the actually serving Uniform Staff by that date is 75,359. Also 1,215 officers were recruited based on the number of available vacancies in each rank during the year. Table 10 below shows the number of officers so recruited with a rank-wise categorization.

Action is being taken to amend procedures of recruitment, promotion, training and pension for the posts in Regular service in Sri Lanka Police. Also necessary action is being taken to obtain Cabinet approval to recruit Police Constables, Police Constable Drivers and Police Security Officers for Support Service.

Approved cadre for the support service in Sri Lanka Police as at on 30th September 2018 is 7,615 and the actual cadre as at on is 1,281. In view of strengthen the duty of Police approval of the National Police Commission was granted to procedure of recruitment and promotion for support service. Action is being taken to refer those to the Secretary, National Police Commission.

As per the hierarchy of Sri Lanka Police promotions have been granted for 716 officers during initial three quarters of 2018. Out of them most of the officers were promoted from the post of Sub Inspector of Police. The numbers of such officers are 509. The Table 11 shows the number of officers promoted in each ranks.

▪ **Trainings**

With a view to promoting new knowledge, skills and attitudes for an efficient and standard Police Service, measures have been taken to provide training by Police Training College, Kalutara and Police Academy, Katana to 23,628 officers covering all ranks in Police Service. Training has been provided respectively to 3,777 and 19,851 officers by Police Training College, Kalutara and Police Academy, Katana.

Action has been taken to provide theoretical as well as practical training by reference of officers for local as well as overseas training and 257 officers of various ranks have participated overseas trainings during the first three quarters of year 2018.

▪ **New establishment of Police Section, Divisions, Stations and Posts**

Approval has been granted to set up four new Police Section & Divisions, to establish 14 Police Stations and Posts and to create one Special Division for the Sri Lanka Police in view of providing an efficient police service.

▪ **Progress in Development Projects**

1. Prefabricated buildings project stage III was initiated in view of providing residential facilities for the officers in Sri Lanka Police and construction of 346 buildings out of 375 was finalized at present. A sum of Rs.75 million out of Rs.125 million which was allocated in the year 2018 was transferred in terms of FR 66 and thereafter Rs.48.06 million was spent within the first 03 quarters.

2. Development work is in progress in Katana Police Academy and Kalutara Police Training College under infrastructure development for professional quality improvement of Police Officers.

Provision of Rs.300 million was allocated for year 2018 for development of Katana Police Academy and 11 projects were due to commence work thereunder. However, due to initiation of other projects 08 projects were initiated in the year and Rs.57 million of the provision was transferred to other votes in keeping with FR 66 and finalized one project spending Rs.71.09 million at the end of first three quarters.

Six projects were scheduled to be implemented during year 2018 under development of Police Training College, Kalutara and provision of Rs.100 million was received for the purpose. Due to amendments done to the initial plan towards mid part of the year, an amount of Rs.15 million was transferred to other votes in keeping with FR 66. Two projects have been finalized during the initial three quarters of year 2018 while 04 projects are in operation. An amount of Rs.43.19 million has been spent so far for that purpose.

3. Public buildings such as Police Stations, Police Offices, Troop Houses, and Training Centers are constructed to develop infrastructure facilities in Sri Lanka Police. Rs.1,286 million has been allocated for this purpose for year 2018. On the requirement of more provision in the mid-year Rs.147 million was transferred from other votes in keeping with FR66. Accordingly the amount incurred out of the provision of Rs.1,433 million is Rs. 977.87 million. Fifteen constructions have already been fully completed out of 48 constructions.

4. Provision of Rs.69 million were allocated to purchase 18 horses to facilitate traffic control which is a duty entrusted to Sri Lanka Police. Horses were purchased and the amount incurred was Rs.60.13 million.
5. A sum of Rs.59 million was allocated to purchase dogs to Sri Lanka Police with a view to facilitating Criminal Investigation work. As such 45 dogs were purchased incurring Rs.20.62 million. Also Rs.6 million was allocated to purchase dogs and procurement process in that connection is in progress. It is anticipated to finalize the relevant purchase at the end of the year 2018.

6. A sum of Rs.745 million was allocated by Budget proposals 2018 for 06 fields in Sri Lanka Police such as construction of Tourism Police Units, Introduction of community police concept, Enhancing of Police Information and Communication System in line with present requirements, strengthening of Internet Criminal Investigation Unit, Police reforms, Establishment of Police University. Procurement in relation with activities so far planned are in progress and the expenditure incurred amounts to Rs.16.13 million.

▪ Appreciation of service of Police Officers

Thousand three hundred and fifty two Police Officers have been commended by presenting various awards and medals during initial three quarters of the year 2018 based on the factors of excellent service and special evaluations. Hundred and forty five Poorna Bhoomi awards and 13 Deshaputhra awards were awarded to 158 Police Officers.

9.2.1.3 Financial Progress

According to the table below, the progress of Recurrent and Capital expenditure of Sri Lanka Police are 69% and 46% respectively.

9.2.2 Special Task Force

9.2.2.1 Introduction

With the growth of terrorist activities during the initial part of 1980 decade, first of all a team of 60 Police Officers who were given a special arms training by Sri Lanka Army were attached to Police Stations in Northern area for the purpose of overcoming those terrorist activities and giving protection to Police Stations in that area.

This team system was successful and therefore it was further expanded and training was provided by overseas consultants and the so trained personnel were directly deployed for terrorist elimination activities in North-Eastern areas which were established as a Force under the Sri Lanka Police by the name of "Special Task Force". Special Task Force rendered an immense contribution to bring about a peaceful situation in the Country by eliminating terrorism and some 8,000 officers in 64 camps spread out island wide are actively engaged at present in enforcing the law against various crimes. Law is directly enforced by Special Task Force on offences such as large scale destructions, unlawful gem mining, drugs trafficking and destruction of environment etc, and provides required assistance to the Police to enforce law against other crimes and offences.

Additionally, ensuring protection of H.E. the President, Hon. Prime Minister and other VIPs, and important persons visiting this country from overseas including state leaders is a foremost duty of the Special Task Force.

"We, as a great ancillary force attached to Sri Lanka Police, are committed with responsibility to provide a noble service to our motherland and its citizens and

We strive to select excellent personnel and inculcate their minds sets with aspects of skillfulness, personality and leadership qualities through robust training"

9.2.2.2 Quarterly Progress of the Special Task Force

▪ Recruitments

Approved cadre of the Special Task Force amounts to 11,450 whereas the actual cadre is 8,406. Action was taken to recruit 51 Sub-Inspectors and 185 Police Constables, 41 Women Police Constable and 40 drivers. It has been planned to recruit 600 officers during year 2018 for the posts of Police Constable and 600 for in 2019.



▪ Training & Development

In keeping with duties entrusted to officers of the Special Task Force, 1,673 officers have been trained by conducting 24 local training courses and 48 officers have been trained by 10 foreign training courses.



▪ United Nations Peacekeeping Duties

The process of procurement work for collecting required vehicles and equipment for deployment of 198 officers of the Special Task Force on duties of the Peacekeeping Force of the United Nations Organization for officers is at its final stage. A sum of Rs.250.6 million was spent out of provision allocated in this regard.

This deployment would upgrade contribution of Sri Lanka for world peace while adding respect to the country also bringing about opportunities of increasing annual foreign exchange income.

▪ Special Achievements

Chief Inspector of STF Sanjaya Artigala including 05 other officers showed special skills of STF on 152nd Police Day celebration with sky driving from 6000ft with the aid of a parachute holding the police flag in his hands.



▪ 34th Ranaviru Celebration of the Special Task Force

The 34th Ranaviru war hero Celebration of the Special Task Force was conducted by offering flowers to the War Heroes' Monument on 01.09.2018 in the Special Task Force Training School, Katukurunda headed by the Hon. Ranjith Madduma Bandara, Minister of Public Administration, Management and Law & Order with attendance of officers including Secretary to the Ministry, Inspector General of Police and Commandant of the Special Task Force.

▪ Success in Raids

The 64 camps of Special Task Force established covering all 25 Administrative Districts in the island are engaged in operations of protecting natural heritages, conducting raids on intelligence information received from officers of Intelligence Units of camps in order to minimize crimes and anti-social, unlawful activities and taking the offenders into custody.

This year indicates an increase in 130% of the narcotic raids as against 997 raids conducted during the first three quarters of last year and most of them were conducted against illegal drugs.



During the initial three quarters in year 2018, Special Task Force officers have conducted 3,897 raids Island wide on damages caused to the environment out of which the highest number is reported against sand mining. ■ Infrastructure Development

1. Prefabricated Building Project

By the end of the first three quarters of this year, construction works were fully completed in 177 buildings prefabricated building project which was initiated as a remedial measure to the building requirement of the Special Task Force, as a backup unit for Sri Lanka Police and for Island wide deployment of the Special Task Force. Works of the remaining 19 buildings are in progress and a sum of Rs.62.6 million has been spent so far on the project for which a sum of Rs.90 million was allocated during this year.

2. Development of Barracks

Renovation of Barracks in Galle, Dambulla, Hambantota, Aluthgama, Kegalle, Deniyaya and Kurunegala are carried out utilizing provision of Rs.110 million allocated for prefabricated housing project for STF. These barracks are constructed with prefabricated model with the consultancy of Buildings Department and construction work of two camps have already been finalized at the end of first three quarters in 2018 and the rest are ongoing projects. It is anticipated to achieve the progress at the end of the year 2018.

3. Development of Buildings

Buildings that were planned for construction under construction and development of buildings for Special Task Force for the year 2018 are 33 in number. A sum of Rs.435 million was allocated for the year 2018 in respect of proposed constructions. A sum of Rs.165.5 million was incurred out of Rs.427 million of balance after transferring of provision in terms of FR 66. Fifteen projects out of the proposed projects were finalized and the rest are in progress

4. Vehicle requirement achieved

Twenty five 250cc bicycles and an ambulance were purchased for STF during the first three quarters in the year incurring Rs.45.9 million. It is anticipated to obtain 150 jeeps within the next quarter under the Indian loan scheme.

9.2.3 National Dangerous Drugs Control Board

9.2.3.1 Introduction

The National Dangerous Drugs Control Board (NDDCB) is a Statutory Board established in terms of the National Dangerous Drugs Control Board Act No. 11 of 1984, it came into operation on 09th April 1984.

The NDDCB reviews national policy on drug abuse prevention and control, assists various departments and institutions in achieving their targets related to drug abuse prevention and control, engages in preventive action, promotes treatment and rehabilitation activities, conducts epidemiological studies and maintain databases. Further, it monitors and helps relevant agencies to fulfil obligations under the United Nations (UN) and South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) Conventions ratified by the government.

To achieve these targets and goals, NDDCB formulates their programmes under eight separate units and made its cooperation bearing the agency with the Commission of the Narcotic Drugs and act as an integrated agency between the Government and International Narcotic Control Authority. Therewith, NDDCB provides technical assistance and support for other relevant agencies.

Vision

“To lead Sri Lanka to become the pioneer in managing the outcomes and impact of drug related issues in South Asia moving towards a drug abuse free Sri Lanka.”

Mission

- *To create an environment where all sectors of the society and the public at large participate and contribute effectively together with all concerned agencies, towards eliminating the drug menace and related issues from the society.*

- *To create social ethos conducive to eradicating the drug dependence, illicit trafficking and peddling.*
- *To encourage the national political commitment and international co-operation towards creating a drug free society.*
- *To provide leadership in implementing the national drug policy while securing the information and resource base for its effective functioning, monitoring, evaluation and review where necessary.*
- *To work with International Narcotic Control Authority.*

Objectives

- Controlling every type of substances in Sri Lanka and assist and coordinate to policy making and law enforcement activities.
- Provide education and knowledge about substance use, abuse and its eventual harmfulness for general public.
- Provide treatment and rehabilitation facilities for drug dependence or adductors and encourage to treatment and rehabilitation facilities for drug dependence or adductors.
- Scientific and sociological research and analysis on drugs.
- Coordination and integrated with regional and international cooperation.

Functions

- Formulate and review a national policy relating to the prevention and control of the abuse of dangerous drugs and make recommendations to the Minister on such policy.
- Call for such information and particulars from individuals, organizations, government Departments and public corporation as may

reasonable be necessary to exercise the powers of the Board.

- Receive donations and grants from local and foreign sources for the purpose of exercising the powers of the Board.
- Co-ordinate the activities of agencies engaged in the prevention and control of dangerous drugs.
- Promote treatment and rehabilitation measures for drug dependent persons and conduct national drug abuse and preventive educational programmes for children and adults.
- Conduct and undertake researches studies into the prevalence, etiology and legal, medical, social, cultural and economic implications of the abuse of dangerous drugs.
- Maintain liaison with national, regional and international organizations and agencies involved in drug control activities.
- To provide leadership for non-government and private institutions engaged in the subject of treatment and rehabilitation of drugs in effective functioning, monitoring, evaluation and review where necessary.
- Monitor and supervise issuance of certificates and authorizations for the import and export of precursor chemicals regulating the use of precursors, storing, import export and transportation of precursor chemicals.
- Discharge its functions as an information center established with the hot line 1984 collecting coordinating relevant authorities to strengthen and improve the efficiency of law enforcement agencies.

- Protecting the Sri Lankan youth from drug menace.
- Taking measures for drug demand reduction.
- Strengthening cooperative agencies.

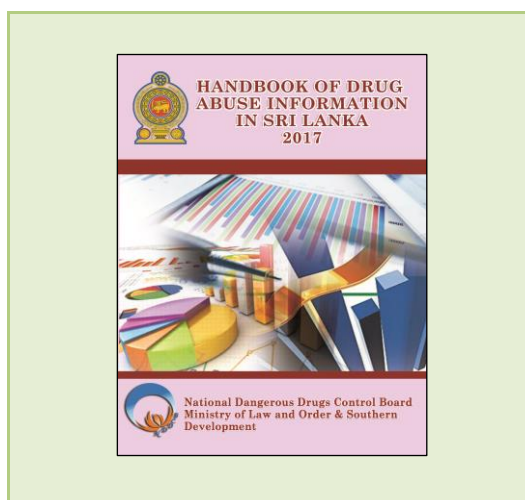
- Implementing capacity building measures for awareness, education and preventive initiatives for staff of the other organizations.

9.2.3.2 Quarterly Progress of the Institution

- Thousand five hundred and one awareness programmes were conducted by Preventive Education Training Unit for persons in several fields such as school and Dhamma School children, parents, university students and public officers.
- Thirteen Exhibitions on Drug Prevention were conducted during the first 03 quarters of the year 2018.
- Four certificate courses on Drug counseling were finalized with the participation of 176 students.



- Distribution of Hand Book of Drug Abuse Information in Sri Lanka 2017 and initial steps are being taken to publish the volume for 2018.



- Statistical Report in relation to drugs – 2018 was compiled with the information gathered on drug related arrests and treatments from law enforcement institutions in Sri Lanka and treatment centers.
- Three reports on persons who are under treatment and 02 reports on persons arrested were published by the drug abuse data evaluation system.
- Nine Workshops were conducted by research unit for 272 officers in order to train police officers in Uva, Central and North Western Provinces in order to obtain information to drug abuse data evaluation system through internet.
- A workshop was conducted to train 40 officers in treatment centers in view of training them to send data on drug abused persons.



- Three workshops were held for three days to train all the officers of National Dangerous Drugs Control Board on board responsibilities and functions.



- Collection of data in relation to researches on study on drug usage of school children, tendency for using Heroin among women in Sri Lanka,

Drug usage among working community were finalized and reports are compiling.

- Plans in relation to the study and national research on drug usage of university students are underway.
- As per international conventions such as Convention on Narcotic drugs 1961, Convention on precursors 1971 and Convention on Narcotic drugs and precursors 1988, statistical reports were compiled under various themes in relation to drug abuse in Sri Lanka and forwarded to International Narcotic Control Board, other organizations and institutions. Six quarterly and annual reports from January – September 2018 were forwarded to International Narcotic Control Board.
- Volumes of first two quarters of quarterly magazine compiled by the Research division were published and the report in relation to the 3rd volume is under printing.



- International Day on drug usage and Prevention of illicit drug trafficking was held on 02.08.2018 at BMICH with the collaboration of stakeholders of National Dangerous Drugs Control Board including Government and NGO personnel towards a drug free international society.
- Drug prevention mobile programmes were initiated in Borella Thotalanga, Galle and Moneragala in line with International Day on

Drugs which was held in June 26. A drug Prevention National Week starting from 26th June to 2nd July was named with the join collaboration of Presidential Task Force on Drug Prevention and initiated number of programmes with paying attention on family counseling.

- Personal Counseling services were given to 2,562 drug addicts during first three quarters in 2018.
- Residential treatments were given for 916 drug addicts through four treatment centers. Counseling Sessions, Psycho Study Services, Indoor and Outdoor sports, Vocational training services and recreational rehabilitation programmes were initiated during this period.



- Post care meetings were conducted for 1,580 clients as family centered meetings
- Programmes initiated for identification of drug users and identification of risk areas were 2,335. Post care services initiated for such identified drug users and family members were 4,714 in

number. Awareness programmes on drug prevention were held for 138,619 persons.

- Thirty five samples obtained by Police Narcotics Bureau were analyzed by the research project which is carried out to identify new delusions and to reveal price and cleanliness of heroin at streets by National Narcotics Laboratory.
- Two day training programmes were organized by the National Narcotics Laboratory on enhancing of ways to identify illicit medicine in Sri Lanka and laws to control of precursor chemicals. Thirty five training programmes were conducted within the first three quarters.
- Ten computer training programmes were conducted to strengthen law enforcement capacities under the assistance of National Dangerous Drugs Control Board and United Nations office on drugs and crime prevention.
- Hundred licenses were examined by the Precursor Chemicals Authority at the end of September 2018 and five licenses were cancelled in order to regularize misuse, control and formal use of precursor chemicals. Six hundred and six new licenses were issued by the Authority during the period.
- The division of Designated and Private treatment center has conducted 4,391 counseling programs, 10 treatment programmes, 33 education and awareness programmes and training programmes for 370 officers.
- Two new licenses have been issued by the Designated and Private Treatment centre Division for other private treatment centres who have met with minimum standards and renewal of eight licenses of registered private treatment centres also made. Investigations have been made for 25 private treatment centres that were obtained and not obtained licenses so far.

9.2.3.3 Financial Progress

Progress of the Recurrent and the Capital Budget of the National Dangerous Drugs Control Board is 77% and 58% respectively.

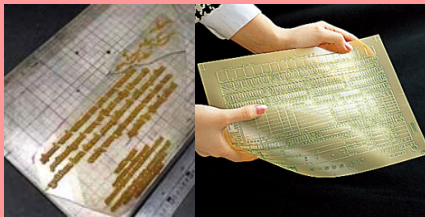

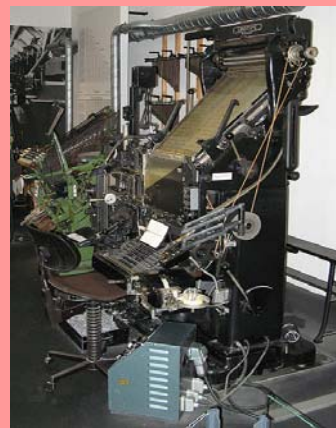

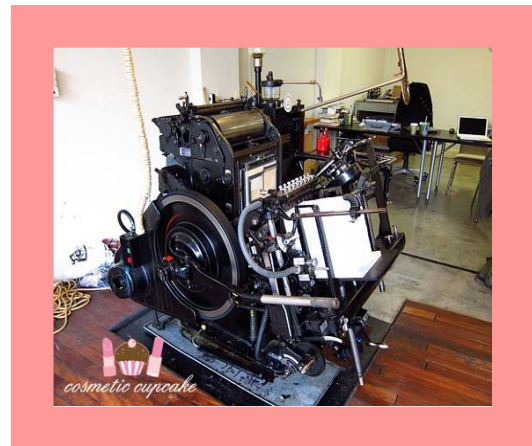
