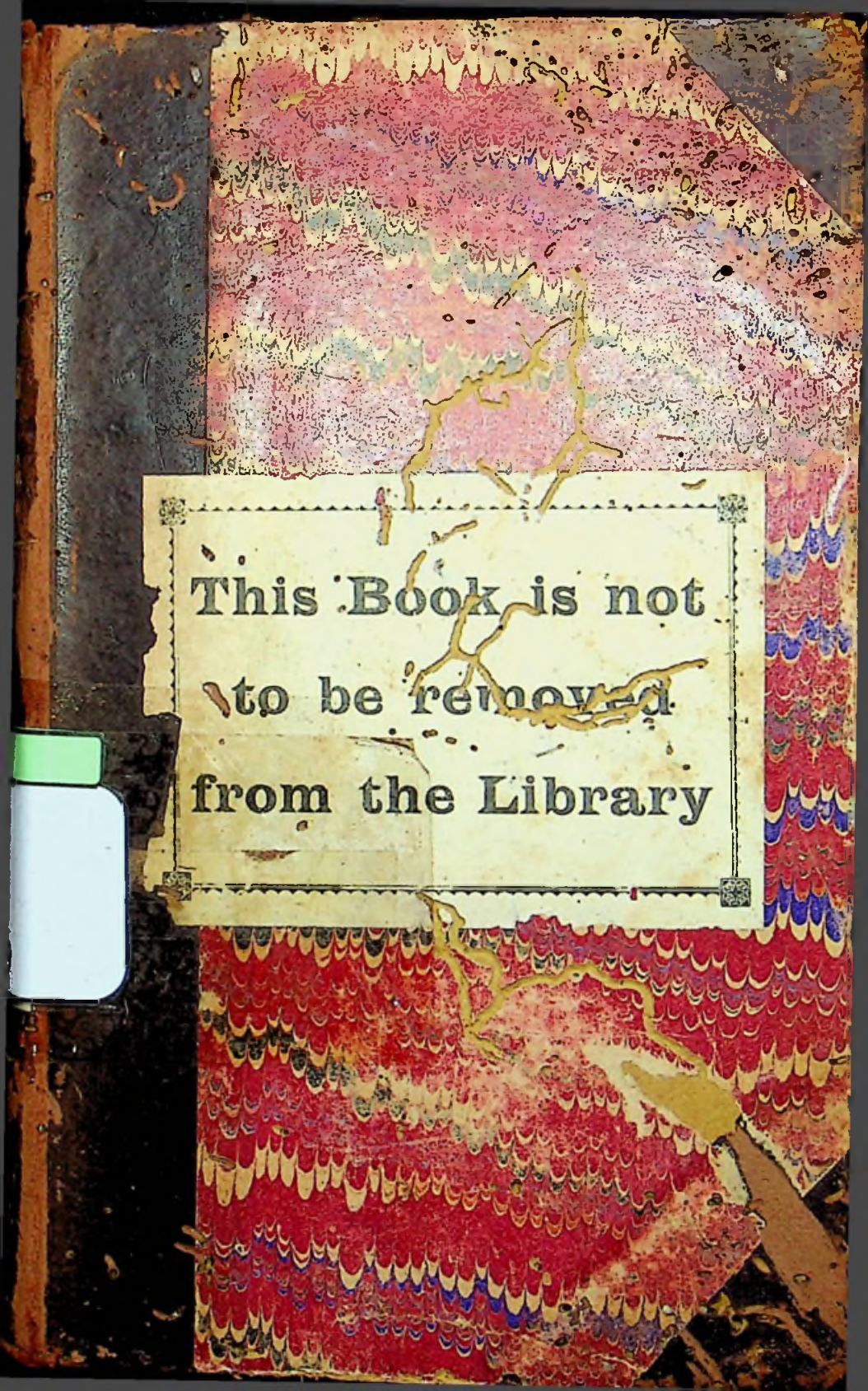

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NOTICE.

In the Calendar for this year the Table for regulating a Time piece has been extended so as to suit Galle and Jaffna, and Colpetty and Mutwal as well as the Fort of Colombo. Colombo is however to be considered as the standard so that when it is said in the Galle or Jaffna column "add one minute" &c. the meaning is that this addition is to be made to the time as given at Colombo. The hours are marked in Roman characters thus VI, V, &c. the minutes in common numerals beneath 59, 58. &c.—These tables give the mean Solar time (the equation of time having been already applied to the moment of the Sun's visible contact with the horizon) that is, the time by which all common clocks and watches are regulated.

In the Moon column the time is given when she is in mid-heaven at Colombo by which that of rising and setting can always be found near enough for any practical purpose viz. by subtracting or adding between five and six hours, more or less, according as the horizon of the observer is more or less level or mountainous.

The longitude of Madras new Light House is increased by a small quantity from that given in former Calendars in consequence of information transmitted by Major SKINNER.

To assist the construction of native Calendars for next year the principal memoranda of 1850 are given.

PHENOMENA.

ECLIPSES.

There will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

The first Eclipse of the Sun occurs on the 22d and 23d of February. It is annular and will be visible all over Eastern Asia and its Islands but not in Ceylon.

The second Eclipse of the Sun occurs August 18th. It begins on the earth generally at 8h. 35m. 5s. A. M. and ends at 1h. 23m. 6s. P. M. No more than the simple contact is visible here and that and in the Southern half of the Island.

ii.

Both Eclipses of the Moon are partial. The first is on March 9th of which the beginning only is visible here viz. at 3h. 31m. 8s. A. M. daylight having arrived even before the middle of it which is at 6h. 14m. 6s.

The second Eclipse of the Moon occurs on the 2d and 3d September and is visible throughout.

SATURN'S RING will be visible all the year after January 19th.

VENUS will be an evening star during the early months of the year attaining her greatest brilliancy in April.

COLONBO TIME.

Ceylon being so far towards the East or Sun-rising, it is already mid-day here when it is morning in England. The day here is farther advanced than at Greenwich 5 hours 19 minutes and 33 seconds, which must therefore be added to the time in England to give the time here.

THE WEATHER.

COLOMBO—The rains which accompany the setting in of the N. E. monsoon are usually over, the soil is still moist, the sky is clear and the nights cold, with an along-shore or land wind blowing, which must be guarded against. Therm. Max. 83 Min. 76 Mean 80.3.

TRINCOMALIE—The rains of the N. E. monsoon are now generally over. Strong winds from N. E. Fine weather throughout and most pleasant. Therm: Max. 82 Min 71 Mean. 78.

It carries off the moisture of the ground and the skin rapidly and gives rheumatism &c. to those who expose themselves incautiously to it. Therm: Max. 81.75. Min. 77.75. Mean 80.8

TRINCOMALEE—Fine weather throughout, wind N. E. but more moderate. Occasional land wind after midnight and very cold. Therm: Max. 83. Min. 72. Mean. 79.

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THE WEATHER.

COTONBO—The dry earth now receives far more heat from the sun than it parts with by evaporation or terrestrial radiation. The weather is becoming very warm. The calmness of the ocean however, and the alternate sea breezes by day and land winds by night give a pleasing variety. But the heat is oppressive compared with that of the rest of the Year. Therm: Max. 85 Min. 78 Mean 81.6.

TRINCONALIE—Fine weather throughout, wind more moderate and veers round to E. N.E and East with morning land wind. Towards the end of the month the weather becomes warm Therm: Max. 86 Min. 72 Mean. 81.

THE WEATHER.

Colombo—Indications of the approach of the S. W. monsoon are to be observed in a ground swell in the sea and S. W. breeze more steady than the sea breeze of last month. The temperature however continues to rise and all who can obtain leave or escape are among the mountains, some time ago. Therm: Max. 89 Min. 79 Mean 81.6.

TRINCOMALEE—This is the most oppressive month in the year. The sea breeze light from the Eastward which dies away soon after sun set, and remains calm all night with the Therm: seldom lower than 86. Therm: Max. 90 Min. 77 Mean 84.

THE WEATHER.

Colombo—By the middle of this month, genial showers usually begin to fall. The wind is steadily in the S. W. and towards the close of the month there are usually thunder and lightning in the afternoons in the S. W. with heavy showers, each preceded by a squall. Therm: Max. 88 Min. 79 Mean 81.9.

Tuincowale—A few showers generally precede the S. W. Monsoon, which generally sets in about the 2nd week, with very strong winds, fine dry, but hot weather to the end, the breeze extremely refreshing as soon as the Sun sets. Therm: Max. 90 Min. 79 Mean 84.

VARIATIONS OF TEMPERATURE CORRESPONDING TO ALTITUDE.

As we ascend, the air becomes thin or rare, and as it becomes rare it also grows cold. No fact is better established than this, though, the rate of this cooling of the air as we ascend in it does not appear to be uniform, but to vary in different countries and even in the same country at different seasons. Were we to go by local data we might calculate it thus. The mean annual temperature of Colombo is probably about $80^{\circ} 5$; that of Kandy is about $74^{\circ} 5$; and that of Nuwera-Ellia at an elevation of 6210 ft: is about 59° ; giving a fall of one degree for every 280 ft: in the former case, and for every 295° in the latter results which accord very well with observations made elsewhere, and particularly with those which may be deduced from the other sanatoria of India.

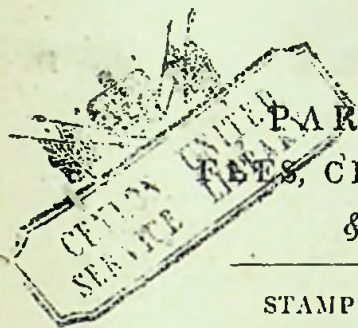

But if separate parts or parcels of such lands or other property shall be conveyed to, or to the use of, or in trust for different persons, in and by one and the same deed or instrument, then such *duplicate* deed or instrument shall be charged with the said *ad valorem* duty, in respect of the aggregate amount of the purchase or consideration monies therein mentioned to be paid or agreed to be paid, for the lands or property thereby conveyed.

And where any person, having contracted for the purchase of any lands or other property, but not having obtained a conveyance thereof, shall contract to sell to any other person, and the same shall in consequence be conveyed immediately to the sub-purchaser; the *duplicate* of the prin-

principal or only deed or instrument of conveyance shall be charged with the said *ad valorem* duty, in respect of the purchase or consideration money therein mentioned to be paid, or agreed to be paid by the sub-purchaser.

And where any person having contracted for the purchase of any lands or other property, but not having obtained a conveyance thereof shall contract to sell the whole or any part or parts thereof, to any other person or persons, and the same shall in consequence be conveyed by the original seller, to different persons, in parts or parcels; the *duplicate* of the principal or only deed or instrument of conveyance, of each part or parcel thereof, shall be charged with the said *ad valorem* duty, in respect only of the purchase or consideration money which shall be therein mentioned to be paid, or agreed to be paid for the same by the person or persons to whom or to whose use or in trust for whom the conveyance shall be made, without regard to the amount of the original purchase money.

And in all cases of such sub-sales as aforesaid, the sub-purchasers, and the person immediately selling to them, shall be deemed and taken to be the purchasers and sellers, within the intent and meaning of the provisions and regulations of this Ordinance relating to the *ad valorem* duties, on conveyances on the sale of property hereby imposed.

But where any such sub-purchaser shall take an actual conveyance of the interest of the person immediately selling to him, which shall be chargeable with the said *ad valorem* duty in respect of the purchase or consideration money paid or agreed to be paid by him, and shall be duly stamped accordingly; the *duplicate* of any deed or instrument of conveyance to be afterwards made to him, of the property in question, by the original seller, shall be exempted from the said *ad valorem* duty, and be charged only with the ordinary duty on notarial deeds or instruments of the same kind not upon a sale.

And where any lands or other property, separately, contracted to be purchased of different persons, at separate and distinct prices, shall be conveyed to the purchaser, or as he shall direct in and by one and the same deed or instrument; the *duplicate* of such deed or instrument shall be charged with the said *ad valorem* duty, in respect of the aggregate amount of the purchase or consideration monies therein mentioned to be paid or agreed to be paid for the same.

And where any lands or other property, shall be sold and conveyed in consideration wholly or in part of any sum of money charged thereon by way of mortgage or otherwise, and then due and owing to the purchaser, or shall be sold and conveyed, subject to any mortgage, bond or other debt, or to any gross or entire sum of money, to be afterwards paid by the purchaser, such sum of money or debt shall be deemed the purchase or consideration

PORT OF COLOMBO.

The Port of Colombo extends from that of Caltura on the one hand to that of Negombo on the other, but it is only to the outer and the inner harbour at Colombo itself that shipping resort at present. The harbours are separated by a bar formed by the River Calany which lies across the Bay and has only about 12 feet of water over it.

The outer harbour is a safe anchorage at all seasons. But from the middle of May till the middle of July when the S.W. monsoon is most violent and again from the first December till the end of January when the long shore wind prevails transport of goods between the shipping and the shore is sometimes liable to be interrupted for several days at a time. The most suitable season for delivering and taking in cargo is from the first of February till the end of April, which is happily also the season when the greatest quantity of Coffee arrives from the interior. The inner harbour is chiefly the resort of native craft and small country brigs, the former from October till April only, the latter all the year. It is safe all the year round although during the long shore-wind care must be taken to prevent getting foul or ashore.

THE HARBOUR OF TRINCOMALIE.

TRINCOMALIE, situated on the east side of the Island of Ceylon, contains a most spacious safe harbour, with its small bays and coves is perhaps superior to any in India. Every part of the harbour is land-locked, the anchorage good for any number of Ships and of any burthen.

Back Bay from the 1st of April to the 25th October is also an excellent anchorage with from 10 to 5 fathoms water good holding ground, sea quite smooth, so that the smallest boats may land. Fort Frederick forms the S. E. point of the bay, the Flag-staff there is in latitude $6^{\circ} 35' 35''$ N. and long. $81^{\circ} 14' 52''$ E., a good light which can be seen 15 miles off is exhibited at the Flag-staff every night soon after sun set, it is 206 feet above the level of the sea, and serves to guide Ships by night clear of the rocks off Pigeon Island to the north and the shoals off Foul Point to the S. E., as well as to lead them to an anchorage in Back Bay. Pilots for the inner harbour are necessary, as there are dangerous shoals outside and inside; but Back Bay is quite safe. Vessels may lie within 1-3d of a mile from the Custom House in 5 fathoms water. The Custom House is opened for business on the 1st of April and continues until the 25th October when all is changed to the Custom House in the Inner harbour.

A New Light was exhibited at Flag-staff Point Trincomalie on the night of the 1st of October 1843 and is continued every night from sunset until day light.

The Lantern having a fixed light with two powerful reflectors, when hoisted, is 26 feet above the level of the sea. The Light can be seen 15 miles off from any bearing between Pigeon Island and Foul Point comprehending an angle of 140 degrees.

Foul Point bears from the Light S. 55° E. distant 5½ miles, and the extreme of the reef off that point S. 60° E. nearly 5 miles.

Ships coming from the S. E. with a fair wind at night and having made the Light should on no account in passing Foul Point bring the Light to bear to the northward of W. N. W., that bearing will take a Ship more than half a mile to the northward of the reef and in not less than 14 fathoms water. If it is intended to anchor in Back Bay (which Ships may safely do between the middle of March and 25th October) and having brought the Light to bear W. N. W. they may steer directly for it rounding Flag-staff point close (the point being steep too) and anchor in 10 fathoms water with the Light bearing about S. b. E., small Vessels may anchor in 6 or 7 fathoms water with the Light bearing S. E. b. E.

From the Light the outside visible Rock off Pigeon Island distant about 9 miles is in a direct line with Elizabeth point bearing N. 15° W. Ships coming from the northward and wishing to anchor in Back Bay should be cautious not to bring the Light to bear to the eastward of south, that bearing will lead 2 miles to the eastward of Pigeon Island and nearly a mile to the eastward of the Lively Rocks. These Rocks lie half a mile to the eastward of Elizabeth point having 4 fathoms water close too. When quite sure of being to the southward of the Lively Rocks Ships may bring the Light to bear S. by E. and anchor in Back Bay as before directed.

After the 25th October the anchorage in Back Bay is not safe until the middle of March as there is frequently towards the end of October before the N. E. monsoon sets in a heavy swell with variable winds. Ships should not attempt the Inner Harbour during the night except under most favorable circumstances, such as good moon light and having a person on board possessing local knowledge of the Harbour and the entrance to it. In such a case and being abreast of Flag-staff point the Light kept N. N. W. ½ W. will lead clear of Chapel Rocks. The extreme Rock which is under water bears from the Light S. 18° E. distant 2 miles.

PORT DUES.

An Ordinance to amend the Law relating to the Post Office and for revising the rates of Postage.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Ordinance No. 8 of 1836, entitled "For protecting the Revenue derived from the Post Office and for revising the rates of Postage" and the Ordinance No. 10 of 1841, entitled "To provide for the transmission of Letters to and from this Island by Extraordinary Express," should be repealed;

1. IT IS THEREFORE HEREBY ENACTED BY THE GOVERNOR OF CEYLON, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof that the said Ordinances No. 8 of 1836 and No. 10 of 1841 be repealed, except so far as the said Ordinance No. 8 of 1836 repeals any Regulations and Orders of this Government and except so far as the Ordinance No. 10 of 1841 indemnifies the Postmaster General for charges made previously to the passing of that Ordinance.

2. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall not be lawful for any person to transmit or convey any Letter or Letters from any part of these settlements to any other part thereof by any other means than by or through the Post Office Establishment, with the following exceptions that is to say, Letters from or to any place not being in the line of Road along which the Post travels. Letters concerning Goods or other Property to be delivered, such Letters being sent with or for the purpose of being delivered at the same time as the Property they concern, without hire or reward for receiving or delivering the same. Letters to be sent by any private friend or friends in their way, journey or travel, so as such Letters shall be delivered by such friend to the party to whom they may be directed, or by any Messenger sent on purpose for or concerning the private affairs of the sender or receiver thereof. And no person shall make a collection of such Letters hereby excepted, for the purpose of sending them in the manner hereby authorised. And the following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a Letter, or to receive or collect or deliver a Letter, although they shall not receive hire or reward for the same, that is to say,

Common known Coach proprietors, their drivers, servants or agents, except Letters sent by persons on any public line or road from one station to another where no Post Office is established between such two stations.

Owners, Masters or Commanders of Ships or Boats employed by Government for the conveyance of the public mails.

And every person transmitting conveying collecting carrying receiving or delivering any letter contrary to the provisions of this clause shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction to any fine not exceeding One Pound for every letter in respect of which any such offence shall have been committed. And it shall be lawful to include any number of offences against this clause committed by the same person in one and the same information or complaint and it shall be competent to any Police Court to take cognizance of any number of offences so included as aforesaid and to award in respect hereof the full amount of punishment to which the offender is herein declared to be liable on conviction.

3. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that upon all Letters and Packets to be transmitted by or through the Post Office Establishment to or from any place within these settlements, there shall be levied the rates of Postage, according to distance, specified in the Schedule A to this Ordinance, annexed:

4. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that Letters transmitted by the Post shall be charged by weight according to the following scale, and that

the several numbers of Rates of Postage hereinafter set forth shall be thereon charged by and be paid to the Postmaster General for the use of Her Majesty that is to say,

On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, one rate of Postage:

On every Letter exceeding half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of Postage:

On every Letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounce in weight, four rates of Postage:

On every Letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of Postage:

On every Letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of Postage:

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounce there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of Postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce.

And all letters transmitted from one part of these settlements to another not exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight shall be charged as one half a rate.

5. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that His Excellency the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of these Settlements for the time being and the Honble the Colonial Secretary shall be entitled to send and receive all Letters and Packets free of Postage except as is hereinafter excepted.

6. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the following persons not residing in Ceylon shall be permitted to send and receive all Letters through the Post Office of this Island free of Postage. The Governor General and Governors of the Presidencies of British India. The Commanders in Chief in British India and the Naval Commander in Chief, the Metropolitan Bishop of Calcutta, the Secretaries to the Supreme Government and the Secretaries to Government at the several Presidencies of British India, and the Governors and Colonial Secretaries of any of Her Majesty's Colonies within the limits of the Charter of the East India Company.

7. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that One Penny only shall be charged on every Printed Newspaper transmitted by or through the Post Office Establishment of this Colony, such Penny to be paid on putting the same into the Post Office when such Newspapers are sent to any place within or beyond these settlements, and such Penny to be paid on delivery when such Newspapers are received from places beyond these settlements.

8. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that no Newspaper shall be sent by Post at the above rate of one Penny, unless the following conditions shall be observed:

First, It shall be sent without a cover or in a cover open at the sides.

Second, there shall be no word or communication printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon it or upon the cover of it except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

Third, there shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such paper.

AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the Postmaster General may examine and authorize to be examined any Printed Newspaper or Official Gazette sent by Post and if any other paper or writing whatsoever be enclosed or concealed in any such Printed Newspaper, or there shall be any communication or writing thereon or on the cover thereof, except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, or any other necessary direction as to its delivery or transmission, it shall be charged with treble the Duty of Letter Postage which the person to whom the same is sent, receiving the same after notice thereof, shall be obliged to pay, or in case he refuses to receive it, shall be paid by the person sending, if he can be ascertained and be residing within these Settlements. PROVIDED ALWAYS, that all Official Gazettes shall pass free of Postage within these Settlements.

10. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all periodical Magazines and Printed periodical Pamphlets, whether issuing from the Press of this Island or elsewhere, shall if sent without a cover or in a cover open at the sides, be charged with a Postage of One Penny. PROVIDED such Magazine or Periodical Pamphlet shall not exceed the weight of one ounce and if the same shall exceed the weight of one Ounce then at the rate of One Penny for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce but no fractional parts of One Penny shall be charged, and the Postmaster General or person by him authorized shall at all times have the liberty of inspecting such Magazines and Pamphlets, to ascertain whether any other paper or communication be concealed or inserted therein not belonging thereto, and in case any other paper or communication be found therein or it be not sent open at both ends as aforesaid, full Postage shall be chargeable on such Magazine or Pamphlet as on a Letter of the same weight. PROVIDED ALWAYS, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to oblige any Person to send any Printed Newspaper, Magazine or Pamphlet through the Post Office, but that it shall be lawful for all Persons to send the same in any manner most practicable or convenient. AND PROVIDED FURTHER that the privilege of frankings shall not extend to any Printed Newspapers, Magazine or Pamphlet transmitted through the Post Office.

11. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the transmission of Parcels by the Post shall only take place at such period or periods and to and from such parts of these Settlements, and at such rates or charges, and with such limitations as to their weight size and the nature of their contents, as shall from time to time be previous Advertisement in the Gazette, be directed by the Governor or Lieutenant Governor for the time being.

12. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies to detain any Post Letter or Parcel suspected to contain any contraband goods, and to forward the same to the nearest Collector or Sub-Collector of Customs that he may ascertain whether the contents thereof are liable to duty. And the Postmaster General or one of his deputies shall give notice to the party to whom such parcels sent to the Custom House may be addressed of their having been so sent and of the rate of Postage due on the same which Postage shall be collected by the Custom House Officers and sent to the Post Office.

13. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Letters received or sent by mail by way of Red Sea whether the same shall be received or sent by way of Bombay or Point de Galle or shall be brought to Ceylon by private Ships, shall be charged with the Postage duty of one shilling each single rate, at whatever place they may be delivered or from whatever place they may be sent within this Colony and that no additional inland Postage shall be charged on the same—and no privilege of franking

shall extend to Letters transmitted or received by way of the Red Sea, the public Despatches and Letters being bona fide on the public service only excepted.

14. AND WHEREAS the Postmaster General may already have been, or may hereafter be, directed to levy certain charges on behalf of Her Majesty's General Post Office in London under the denomination of Red Sea Postage, Foreign Europe Postage, prepaid British Postage, intercolonial Postage, or similar charge, it is hereby enacted that on such directions being published in the Government Gazette of this colony, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to levy such extra charges in addition to the colonial rates in the foregoing clause laid down.

15. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that on every Letter which shall be brought to Ceylon by any Vessel not sent by the way of the Red Sea from any Port or Place beyond Sea, there shall be a Sea Postage of Four Pence, and on every Letter which shall be sent through the Post Office to any part beyond Sea, a Sea Postage of Two Pence, besides any Postage chargeable thereon for previous or subsequent transmission inland. And for the encouragement of the Masters or Commanders of Vessels, to deliver to the Post Office any loose Letters or Packets brought by any such Vessel it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to allow to the Commander or Master of every Vessel arriving as aforesaid the sum of Two Pence for each Letter or Packet and One Penny for each Newspaper not being enclosed in the Ship Mails of the General Post Office of the United Kingdom by him delivered or caused to be delivered, at the Post Office of the first port he may arrive at in these settlements.

16. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the Master or other Person in Command of every Vessel sailing from any Port of these settlements shall receive on board and convey all Mails and Bags of Letters which shall be delivered or caused to be delivered to him by the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies, and every Master or other Person in Command of any Vessel about to proceed to sea shall be and he is hereby required either by himself or his Agent to give notice thereof in writing to the Master Attendant and to hoist a Blue Peter at least 24 hours before the time of departure and every such Master or other person acting contrary to the provisions of this clause shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Fifty Pounds.

17. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that on the arrival of any Vessel off the Coast of Ceylon, the Master or person in chief Command thereof shall cause all letters on board to be collected and the first Port send the same on shore by his own Boat or by the Pilot Boat, or any other safe and convenient opportunity, in order that the same may be delivered at the first regular Post Office which can be communicated with and shall at such Port sign a Declaration in the presence of the person authorized by the Postmaster General at such port who shall also sign the same, and the Declaration shall be in the form or to the effect following that is to say,

" I A. B. Commander of the (state the name of the Ship or Vessel) arrived from (state the place) do, as required by Law, declare, that " I have to the best of my knowledge and belief, delivered, or caused " to be delivered to the Post Office, every Letter, Bag, Package or Parcel of letters that were on board the (state the name of the Ship)" And until such Declaration shall be made and produced, no Collector, Comptroller or Principal Officer of the Customs shall permit such Ship or Vessel to report, or to break bulk or to make entry in any port; and in case such Declaration shall be false, the person making the same shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine of Ten Pounds.

18. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for any Officer of Customs at any Port or place in these Settlements who, in the due execution of his duty as a Revenue Officer shall discover any letters or packets on board any Vessel in any Port or place whatsoever contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, to seize and take all such letters and packets, and to forward the same to the Postmaster General or his Deputy at such Port or place; and that the Officer seizing and sending the same shall be entitled to one moiety of any penalty which may be imposed and be recovered for any such offence.

19. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all letters or parcels directed to any place in India and transmitted by land shall be charged as far as the boundary of this Island, and that all letters or packets coming from India by land shall be charged as from the boundary of this Island.

20. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that Money, Jewels, Ornaments, or other valuable Articles sent by Post, shall be received and forwarded at the entire risk of the persons sending the same, and the letter or packet containing the same shall be charged with the letter postage according to the weight thereof.

21. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Letters which the persons addressed shall refuse to receive shall be returned to the Office from whence they were despatched, and the persons sending the same, if in these Settlements, shall be charged with the original postage, and all Letters addressed to persons who cannot be found at the place of address shall be returned (without charge) either to the person sending them or to the Office from whence they were first despatched, and in the latter case they shall be entered in a list to be exposed in the most public part of such Office, and, from time to time the list shall be sent to the Postmaster General to be published in the Government Gazette.

22. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person opening a letter or envelope to his address shall be bound to pay the postage of the same, whatever may be the contents, but it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to remit the postage of any letter so opened, which shall appear to have been opened by mistake or sent maliciously to annoy or to have the person addressed charged with the postage thereof.

23. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the following classes of Persons may both send and receive Letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight by the Post, on their own private concerns, at a Postage of one penny for each Letter; namely,

Every Seaman employed in Her Majesty's Navy, or in the employ of the Government of these settlements, whilst such Seaman shall be actually so employed at any Port of this Colony.

Every Serjeant, Corporal, Drummer, Trumpeter, Fifer, and private Soldier in Her Majesty's Regular Forces, Artillery or Royal Marines, whilst actually employed in Her Majesty's Service in this Colony.

But the Letters of Commissioned Officers or Warrant Officers whether in the Army or Navy, or Midshipmen or Master Mates of the Navy, are not included in this Provision.

And with respect to Letters sent by any such privileged Persons the following Conditions shall be observed; that is to say, the Postage of such Letter shall be paid on being put into a Post Office, and upon such Letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the Vessel, Regiment, Corps, or Detachment to which he shall belong; and upon such Letter there shall be written in the handwriting of the Officer having at the time the command of the Vessel, or of the Regiment,

Corps. or Detachment, to which the privileged Person belongs, the name of such Officer and the name of such Vessel or of such Regiment, Corps. or Detachment.

And with respect to Letters received by the Post by any of the said privileged Persons the following conditions shall be observed; the Postage of such Letter (unless sent from parts beyond the seas) shall be paid upon putting it into a Post Office, and it shall be directed to the privileged Person specified in the superscription thereof the Vessel or the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which he shall belong and the Postmaster General or his Deputy at the place to which such Letter shall be sent, to be delivered shall not deliver such Letter to any Person except the Person to whom it shall be directed or to some Person appointed to receive the same, by writing under the hand of the Officer in command.

24. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the said Privilege shall not extend to any Letters liable to any foreign rates of Postage.

25. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any Letters received by the Post by any Commissioned Officer which may have been re-directed on account of the removal from one place to another of such Officer on public duty shall not be charged with any additional Postage on or in respect of such re-direction.

26. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person having the command of the Vessel, Regiment, Corps or Detachment and who is hereby directed to write his name and the name of the Vessel, Regiment, Corps or Detachment commanded by him, upon any single letter from any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, shall wilfully and knowingly write his name upon any such letter that is not from any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, and on his or their own private concerns only, such Commanding Officer shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person not having at the time the Command of the Ship, Vessel, Regiment, Corps or Detachment, shall write his name upon any such letter, in order that the same may be sent at a lower rate, of Postage than by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

27. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person or persons who-soever shall knowingly and designedly address a letter or letters to any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, which shall be intended for another person, or which shall be concerning the affairs of another person, with intent to evade the payment of the rate of postage by Law established every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

28. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person whosoever shall procure any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, to obtain the signature of his Commanding Officer to any letter or letters to be sent by the Post, which shall not be on the private concerns of such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier; or if any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier shall himself obtain the signature of his Commanding Officer upon any letter or letters which shall not be from such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier and upon his own private concerns

only, in order to avoid the payment of the rate of postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

29. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that no person shall be deemed incompetent to give evidence at the trial of any party for any offence created by this Ordinance by reason of any reward or benefit to which such person would be entitled upon the conviction of such offender.

30. AND to the end that the Postmaster General and his officers may not be hindered in their respective employments, IT IS FURTHER ENACTED that no Postmaster General nor any person employed by or under the Post Office shall be compelled to serve on any Jury or Inquest, any Ordinance to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

31. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person who being employed in any capacity in by or under the Post Office establishment shall secrete, steal, destroy, mutilate or break open any letter, packet or parcel, which shall have been put into the Post for transmission, whether any thing valuable be therein contained or not, or who, being so employed shall steal or take out of any such letter, packet or parcel, any draft, promissory note or any other contents whatsoever, or who shall not duly account for any money received by him on account of postage, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to transportation or imprisonment at hard labour for any period not exceeding seven years and every act committed by any person so employed as aforesaid in respect of any letter packet or parcel or any thing therein contained or of any money received by him on account of postage which by the Law of England would amount to an act of embezzlement shall be deemed and taken throughout this Colony to be an act of theft in respect of such letter packet parcel or thing contained therein or money so received as aforesaid and shall be punished as such.

32. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person employed to convey or deliver a Post letter bag or a Post letter who shall be guilty whilst so employed of any act of drunkenness, carelessness or other misconduct whereby the safety of a Post letter bag or a Post letter shall be endangered, or who shall collect or receive or convey or deliver a letter otherwise than in the ordinary course of the Post, or who shall not use proper care and diligence, safely to convey a Post letter bag or a Post letter according to the Regulations of the Post Office for the time being shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding Five Pounds.

33. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person employed by or under the Post Office who shall contrary to his duty open or procure or suffer to be opened a Post letter, or shall wilfully detain or delay or procure or suffer to be detained or delayed a Post letter shall be guilty of an offence and on conviction thereof shall be liable to any fine not exceeding Twenty Pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding twelve months. PROVIDED ALWAYS that nothing herein contained shall extend to the detaining or delaying or opening by the Postmaster General of a Post letter returned for want of a true direction or of a Post letter returned by reason that the person to whom the same shall be directed is dead or cannot be found or shall have refused the letter or shall have refused or neglected to pay the Postage thereof.

34. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person who shall fraudulently retain or shall wilfully secrete or keep or detain, or, being required to deliver up by an Officer of the Post Office, shall neglect or

refuse to deliver up a Post letter which ought to have been delivered to any other person, or a Post letter bag or Post letter which shall have been sent whether the same shall have been found by the person secreting keeping or detaining or neglecting of refusing to deliver up the same, or by any other person, shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding five Pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding twelve months.

35. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be unlawful for any person whomsoever to detain a Post Office messenger whilst carrying the mails, or on any pretence to open a packet in transit, from one Post Office to another within these Settlements, and any person so doing, whether he take any letter from such packet or not, shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding five Pounds.

36. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that in every case where an offence shall be committed in respect of a Post letter bag or a Post letter, or a chattel, money, or a valuable security, sent by the Post, the property of the Post letter bag or of the Post letter, or chattel or money or the valuable security sent by the Post, shall be laid when necessary to be laid at all in Her Majesty and it shall not be necessary in any information or complaint to allege or to prove upon the Trial or otherwise that the Post letter bag or any such Post letter or valuable security was of any value, and in any information or complaint to be preferred against any person employed under the Post Office for any offence committed against this Ordinance it shall be lawful to state and allege that such offender was employed under the Post Office at the time of the committing of such offence, without stating further the nature or particulars of his employment.

37. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that whenever any person shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance the punishment or any one of the punishments of which shall be a fine it shall be lawful for any Court which would have authority to try such offence to accept payment on behalf of Her Majesty from such offender of the amount of fine to which such offender would have been liable on conviction upon presentation to such Court of a Certificate signed by the Queen's Advocate or some Deputy Queen's Advocate that such officer is consentient to the receipt of such payment and no person having made such payment shall thereafter be triable for the same offence.

38. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Duties of Postage payable by virtue of this Ordinance shall be deemed and taken to be debts due to Her Majesty and may be sued and recovered in such and the same manner and form as any other debt of the like amount due to Her Majesty and it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies or for any person authorized in that behalf by writing under the hand of the Postmaster General or of any of his Deputies to appear and represent Her Majesty in any suit or other proceeding which shall be instituted in any Court of Requests for the recovery of any debt which shall have become due under the provisions of this Ordinance.

39. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that a share not exceeding one moiety of every fine imposed under this Ordinance and actually recovered shall be awarded to the Informer.

40. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all powers and privileges vested in and all duties required to be performed by the Postmaster General under the provisions of this Ordinance shall and may be exercised and per-

formed by any Deputy Postmaster General within such limits as he shall be appointed to act by or under the authority of the Governor.

41. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time with the advice of the Executive Council to make such rules as shall appear expedient for the transmission and payment of all Official letters and parcels and for regulating the hours, during which the several Post Offices in this Colony shall be kept open for the reception of Letters, Newspapers, and Parcels and to direct that any of all of such Post Offices shall be open for the reception thereof out of such regular hours upon payment for every such Letter Newspaper or Parcel so posted out of the regular hours of such Extra charge as to the said Governor with the advice aforesaid shall from time to time appear expedient.

42. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person sending and any Public Officer permitting to be sent by Post under colour or pretence of an official communication any letter paper writing or other enclosure of a private nature shall be guilty of an offence and be liable, on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding five pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor not exceeding three months.

43. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful, whenever any letters or parcels may have been forwarded by express from one place to another within this Colony for the Postmaster General to charge such extra rates for the conveyance of such letters or parcels by express as may be approved of by the Governor and the Executive Council.

44. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that for the purposes of this Ordinance the term Postmaster General shall mean the Postmaster General of this Island or person for the time being lawfully executing the duties thereof and that the term Letter shall include Packet and the term Packet shall include letter and the term Newspaper shall include every bona fide Supplement to a Newspaper and the term Post letter shall mean any letter or packet transmitted by the Post under the authority of the Postmaster General and a letter shall be deemed a Post letter from the time of its being delivered to a Post Office to the time of its being delivered to the person to whom it was addressed and the delivery to a letter carrier or other person authorized to receive letters for the Post shall be a delivery to the Post Office and a delivery at the house or office of the person to whom the letter is addressed or to him or to his servant or Agent or other person considered to be authorized to receive the letter according to the usual manner of delivering that person's letters shall be a delivery to the person addressed.

45. AND IT FURTHER ENACTED, that this Ordinance shall commence and take effect from and after the first day of February 1846.

ON
OVERLAND LETTERS VIA SOUTHAMPTON.

1. Instructions having been received from the Postmaster General in London that the optional payment of the British Packet Postage on Letters between Ceylon and the United Kingdom *via Southampton* should be forthwith commenced, it is hereby notified for general information that, from the 1st of December next, the several Post Offices throughout Ceylon will be prepared to receive, at the option of the sender, the British Packet Postage on Letters directed to the United Kingdom *via Southampton*, and Notice is hereby given that the system was to be carried into operation in England from the 1st of the present month.

2 The following are the British rates of Packet Postage fixed by the Lords of the Treasury, according to which all Letters received "Unpaid" from, or despatched "Paid" to the United Kingdom *via Southampton*, will be taxed, in addition to the usual Ceylon postage, *viz.*

When not exceeding half ounce..... 1 shilling

Above half ounce and not exceeding 1 ounce..... 2 do.

1 do. and not exceeding 2 do. 4 do.

2 do. and not exceeding 3 do. 6 do.

and so on, increasing two shillings for every additional ounce weight, or any fraction thereof.

3.—The public will bear in mind that this Optional Prepayment of the British rate of Postage applies only to letters despatched *via Southampton*, and that letters sent by *Marseilles* cannot be Prepaid in this Island. It applies also only to Letters to be delivered within the United Kingdom.

RED SEA POSTAGE ON LETTERS WHICH DO NOT PASS THROUGH THE
UNITED KINGDOM.

The following scale of Red-Sea Postage, as approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury in England was established to be in force from the 1st April 1841, in supercession of the rates laid down in the Advertisement of 8th December 1839 under instructions received from Her Majesty's Postmaster General in London.

On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, one shilling.

On every Letter exceeding half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two shillings.

On every Letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four shillings.

On every Letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six shillings.

And on every Letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight shillings.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of Postage or two shillings, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce.

It must be clearly understood that the above scale applies to Letters of every description, except such as may be received from, or addressed to, the United Kingdom by way of Marseilles or Southampton, and will be levied in addition to the *Island Postage* laid down in the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS AND PAPERS.

SENT BY THE

CONTRACT STEAMERS TO INDIA AND CHINA.

Notice is hereby given that, in pursuance of Instructions issued by Her Majesty's Postmaster General, London, in virtue of a Treasury Warrant dated the 11th day of September last, the following rates of British Packet Postage will be levied on all Letters, Newspapers and Prices-Current, conveyed between any port of Ceylon and any port in the East Indies, China, &c. by the Contract Steamers from Point de Galle, such rates being in addition to the usual Colonial postage that is to say:

On every Letter not exceeding half ounce weight	one shilling
not exceeding one ounce	two shillings
not exceeding two ounces	four shillings
and on every additional ounce or fractional part of an ounce	two shillings
On every Newspaper addressed to a foreign port, such as Manila, Canton, &c.	additional one penny
On every Price Current or printed Commercial list conveyed to a British port	one penny.
On the same addressed to a foreign port	two pence.

It will be optional with the senders to prepay, or not, the above rates, so far as regards Letters addressed to the Island of Hong-Kong.

HOURS FOR POSTING LETTERS.

OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

IN pursuance of the 41st Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1816, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to direct that the following Rules for the regulating of the mode of transmitting Official Correspondence through the Post be strictly attended to by all Public Officers, Civil or Military:

1. All letters sent from any Civil Public Office shall bear on the cover the signature of the Head of that Office, or, in his absence, of his Chief Assistant present, and from Military Offices, the signature of the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments; and every Officer, Civil or Military, so affixing his signature, shall be answerable that such letters are strictly on Her Majesty's Service; and all letters to a Civil Public Office shall be opened only by the Head of that Office, and in his absence by his Chief Assistant present; and all Military communications must be sent unsealed under cover to the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments, and all Officers Civil and Military are hereby strictly enjoined to return to the Post Office any private communication found therein, with the name of the party by whom the letter or packet was sent, that the 42d Clause of the Ordinance may be carried into effect. This Rule is to be held binding on Officers at outstations, with regard to the correspondence passing between them, as well as on Officers at the Head-Quarters.
2. The Postmaster-General is hereby strictly enjoined to send to the Colonial Secretary all letters whether received for transmission from, or delivery at, the General Post Office, which he may suspect to contain private communications, that they may be opened by the Colonial Secretary, and dealt with according to the nature of their contents.
3. The only address henceforth required on letters to be sent by the Post, will be that of the Officer for whom they are intended, and the signature of the party by whom they are sent, and the words "On Her Majesty's Service." The stamp of the Colonial Secretary's Office will no longer be necessary, nor the signature of the Assistant Military Secretary.
4. No Official Packet, to be sent by the Post on any road where there are other means of transmission, shall exceed the weight of 16 ounces.*
5. It is hereby explained that Official correspondence will only be held to be communications strictly on Her Majesty's Service. Letters addressed to a Public Officer on the concerns of the sender will have to be paid on being sent, and letters from a Public Officer on the concerns of the party addressed, will have to be paid on delivery; and all privileges of sending Parcels or letters free of postage hitherto granted to private offices or persons are hereby cancelled.

TRANSMISSION OF PARCELS.

IN pursuance of the 11th Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, the Governor is pleased to direct that the following Rules for transmission of Parcels by the Post, be published for general information :

1. Parcels are only to be forwarded by the Post on lines of Road on which there are no private Establishments by which they can be conveyed.
2. Parcels are not to be forwarded on days when the weight of the mail would thereby increased beyond the limit of 14lbs.; and the Postmaster General in Colombo, or any person authorised to act for him at any Outstation, is permitted to detain any Parcel till a day on which the smaller weight of the mail will allow it to be sent.
3. No private Parcel is to exceed 15bs. in weight, and every Parcel is to be made up in a form which can be conveniently carried by a Post Office runner.
4. No Glass or Glass bottle or other Vessel containing liquid, or any article or thing which might by pressure or otherwise be rendered injurious to the contents of the mail, nor any vegetables, fruit or other perishable substance, is to be carried by the Post.
5. The Post Office is not to be held answerable for Parcels containing money or jewels or any other article of value. Persons sending the same by Post will do so at their own risk.
6. In order that the conveyance of Parcels may not interfere with the revenue of the regular Post, all Parcels must be certified on the direction by the parties sending the same by Post to contain no letters, and every single letter found in any Parcel so certified will be liable to a charge of five Shillings, to be paid by the person sending the Parcel, if it be refused by the person to whom it is addressed; and the Postmaster General or any person acting in his behalf may call on any person receiving a Parcel which is suspected to contain a letter to open it in his presence.
7. No Parcel is to be franked; all Parcels below one pound in weight shall be charged as a double letter and an additional half rate of letter-postage, according to the distance is to be charged for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.
8. And to avoid all misunderstanding as to the nature of a Parcel, it is hereby explained that no parcel is to contain any written Papers whatsoever, or printed Papers partly filled up in writing, excepting legal documents unaccompanied by any letter, and superscribed as such.

EXPRESSES.

UNDER clause 43d of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846 the Governor and the Executive Council are pleased to direct that no charge for expresses shall be made on letters sent in mails by the Post, when the amount of the postage to be levied on such letters shall fully cover the expense incurred in transmitting the same.

2. When the amount of the postage levied on such letters shall not equal the expense incurred in transmitting them, an extra charge shall be levied sufficient to render the postage equal to such expense.
3. Expresses may be sent at the instance of any private party, when considered practicable by the Postmaster General or his Deputies, at a charge of 6d. per mile.

POSTAGE BY THE "SEAFORTH."

UNDER the 43d Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846 regarding Expresses, the Governor and the Executive Council are pleased to fix the postage on Letters brought from any place in India by the SEAFORTH at the following rates, viz.

- One Shilling—for every Letter not exceeding half ounce weight
Two Shillings—for every Letter not exceeding one ounce "
Four Shillings—for every Letter not exceeding two ounces "
and two Shillings for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

GENERAL ORDER.

Head Quarters, Colombo, 26th February, 1846.

No. 1.—With reference to the Ordinance No. 1 enacted by the Governor of Ceylon with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, under date 5th January 1846, the following Rules respecting Military Correspondence are published for the information and guidance of the Army.

All former orders relative to the transmission of Letters through the Post Office Department within this Island are hereby cancelled.

Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers in Her Majesty's Forces whilst actually employed in Her Majesty's Service in this Colony may both send and receive Letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight by the Post on their own private concerns, at a postage of one penny for each Letter on the following conditions;

With respect to Letters sent by any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier the postage of such Letter shall be paid on being put into a Post Office; and upon such Letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which he shall belong, and upon such Letter there shall be written in the handwriting of the Officer having at the time the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which the privileged Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier belongs, the name of such Officer and the name of such Regiment, Corps or Detachment.

And with respect to Letters received by the Post by any of the said privileged persons the Postage of such Letter (unless sent from parts beyond the seas) shall be paid upon putting it into a Post Office, and it shall be directed to such privileged person specifying on the superscription thereof the Regiment Corps or Detachment to which he may belong.

The Postmaster General or his Deputy at the place to which such Letters shall be sent to be delivered is not authorized to deliver such Letter to any person except the person to whom it shall be directed or to some person appointed to receive the same, by writing, under the hand of the Officer in Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which such privileged person shall belong.

But the Letters of Commissioned or Warrant Officers are not included in the above provision.

The said privilege shall not extend to any Letters liable to any foreign rates of postage.

Any Letters received by the Post by any Commissioned Officers which may have been re-directed on account of the removal from one place to another of such Officer on Public duty shall not be charged any additional postage on or in respect of such re-direction.

If any person having the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment, and who is hereby directed to write his name and the name of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment commanded by him upon any single Letter from any such privileged Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, shall wilfully and knowingly write his name upon any such Letter that is not from any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier and on his own private concerns only, such Commanding Officer shall be Guilty of an Offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds; and if any person not having at the time the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment, shall write his name upon any such Letter in order that the same may be sent at a lower rate of postage than by Law established, every such person shall be Guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

If any person or persons whosoever shall knowingly and designedly address a Letter or Letters to any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, which shall be intended for another person, or which shall be concerning the affairs of another person, with intent to evade the payment of the rate of Postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

If any person whosoever shall procure any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier to obtain the Signature of his Commanding Officer upon any Letter or Letters to be sent by the Post, which shall not be on the private concerns of such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, or if any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, shall himself obtain the Signature of his Commanding Officer upon any Letter or Letters which shall not be from such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, and upon his own private concerns only, in order to avoid the payment of the rate of postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

Copies of the Ordinance No. 1 of the 5th January 1846 will be kept on record and for reference in the Offices of the Deputy Adjutant General, Deputy Quartermaster General, Respective Officers of Ordnance, Inspector General of Hospitals and Staff Officers of Colombo, Trincomalee, Galle and Kandy.

The following rules extracted from the *Ceylon Government Gazette* of the 31st January 1846 having reference to the Ordinance above alluded to are also published for the information and guidance of the army:

OPTIONAL PAYMENT OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS.

SENT BY THE CONTRACT-STEAMERS TO INDIA AND CHINA.

WITH reference to the 11th Clause of the Post Office Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, Notice is hereby given that, under instructions received from Her Majesty's General Post Office in London, it will in future be optional with parties writing by the Contract Steamers from Point de Galle to the Presidencies of India or to Hong Kong, to prepay, or not, the British Packet Postage directed to be levied under the Treasury Warrant dated the 11th day of September last; but that postage must always be paid in advance on letters sent to any foreign country or possession.

The British Packet rate will be levied here on letters on which it shall not have been prepaid in the Presidencies of India or in Hong Kong.

The Colonial Ship-postage, charged under the 15th Clause of the abovementioned Ordinance, will not in future be levied on letters sent by the Contract-Packets from Galle but only inland postage in addition to the British rate.

"SIR,—Much inconvenience and delay being frequently experienced, consequence of parties residing in the British Colonies and other parts abroad (who may have occasion to complain of undue detention their letters, or of such letters, being charged with a higher amount postage than that to which they are liable, omitting to forward to the office, with their complaints, the covers of the letters so delayed or overcharged; the Postmaster General is pleased to request that whenever application is previously made to you on the subject, (and in all cases when you have an opportunity of recommending the proper course to be pursued,) you will point out how important it is that the covers should invariably be transmitted: as much time will then be saved in investigating the complaint, and material assistance will be afforded to this department in ascertaining where the error has occurred."

HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONBLE THE GOVERNOR has directed the following Extract from Her Majesty's Instructions to be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

Colonial Secretary's Office,
Colombo, 14th June, 1847.

Col. Secretary.

Forty-first.—And whereas We have by Our said Commission appointing you Our Governor and Commander in Chief as aforesaid, given to you full power and authority in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject nevertheless to such provisions as are in that respect contained in your General Instructions to make and execute in Our name and under the Public Seal of Our said Island Grants of Waste Land to Us belonging within the same to private persons, and for the Public uses of Our subjects there resident, Now We do hereby require and authorize you from time to time as occasion may require to cause all necessary Surveys to be made of the vacant or Waste Lands to Us belonging in Our said Island, and to cause the persons making such Surveys to report to you what particular Lands it may be proper to reserve for Public Roads or other internal communications by Land or Water, or as the Sites of Towns, Villages, Churches, School Houses or Parsonage Houses, or as places for the burial of the dead, or as places for the future extension of any existing Towns, or Villages, or as places fit to be set apart for the recreation or amusement of the Inhabitants of any Town or Village, or for promoting the health of such Inhabitants, or as the Sites of Quays or Landing Places or Towing Paths, which it may at any future time be expedient to erect, form, or establish on the Sea Coast or in the neighbourhood of Navigable Streams, or as places which it may be desirable to reserve for any other purpose of Public convenience, utility health or enjoyment, and you are specially to require persons making such Surveys to specify in their Reports, and to distinguish in the Charts or Maps to be thereunto annexed such Tracts, Pieces or Parcels of Land within Our said Island as may appear to them best adapted to answer and promote the several purposes before mentioned. And it is Our Will, and We do strictly enjoin and require you that you do not under any pretence whatsoever grant convey, or demise to any person or persons any of the Lands which may be specified as fit to be reserved as aforesaid, nor permit or suffer any such Lands to be occupied by any private persons for any private purpose.

Forty-second.—And We do further charge and require you not to make any Grant of Land to, or in trust for, or for the use of any private person unless in consideration of payment in money for the same after such Land shall have been previously put up for sale by Public Auction at such an upset price per acre as shall from time to time by Our authority be fixed for the same, and for this purpose you shall cause such Lands as from time to time shall remain unoccupied and ungranted to be put up for sale by Public Auction from time to time as you shall judge proper and the highest bidding which shall at such Public Auction be made for any such Lands shall be accepted, provided that such bidding shall at least amount to such upset price per acre as aforesaid. Provided nevertheless that no such bidding shall be finally accepted until the person or persons making the same shall have actually paid a Deposit of Ten per cent on the amount thereof, and shall have signed a Contract for the payment of the balance within one calendar month next thereafter. And it is Our Pleasure that all Grants of Land to be made by you in Our name to any person or persons in

consideration of the payment of money for the same shall be made to such person or persons, and to his, her or their Heirs and Assigns to be by him, her or them held in fee and common soccage, yielding and paying to us, Our Heirs and Successors a Quit Rent of one Pepper Corn by the year for the same, and every such Grant shall pass in Our name under the Public Seal of Our said Island of Ceylon, and shall be executed and delivered to the purchaser or purchasers, at the office of the Surveyor General of Our said Island on the payment of the purchase money for the same, and not before and then and not before the purchaser or purchasers shall be let in possession of the Land so bought by them and for the delivery of every such Grant, and the preparing the same, the said purchaser or purchasers shall pay into the Colonial Treasury a fee amounting to forty shillings sterling money and no more or of such smaller amount as you from time to time with the advice of the Executive Council of Our said Island shall appoint, and every such Grant shall previously to its being so delivered be enrolled in the Court of the District where such Land may be situate, and for making every such Enrolment the Registrar of such Court shall be entitled to receive from such Grantee or Grantees a fee of five Shillings Sterling money and no more.

MINUTE

BY THE GOVERNOR.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the Government Advertisement of the 13th April 1839, the Notice of the 29th May 1841, the Minute of 3d August 1841 and the Minute of the 29th June 1844 be cancelled, and that in lieu thereof the following Rules be observed in respect to the Survey and Sale of Crown Lands.

1.—All Crown Land will be Sold by Auction, and no Waste Land will be exposed for Sale at a price below Twenty Shillings per acre.

2.—The Government Agents, in conjunction with the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, will make arrangements for bringing forward for Sale, from time to time, such portions of Waste Land as they may consider expedient.

3.—The preceding Rules shall not be held to preclude parties desirous of purchasing any particular tracts of Land, from applying to the Government Agent for the Sale of them accordingly. But the Government Agent will exercise his own discretion, in respect to complying with any such application,—and the applicant will not be at liberty to enter upon the Land for any purpose without his permission. It will also be distinctly understood that the making such application will give the applicant no claim whatever to the Land, if put up to Sale, in preference to any other person.

4.—The boundaries of all Crown Land will be cleared by Officers employed by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department—and the expenses attending the same will be recovered as hereafter mentioned.

5.—The following Fees will be recovered by Government for Surveys executed under the directions of the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department.

In cases where one or more contiguous lots are surveyed the purchaser will be required to pay the *Fees for surveying* in proportion only to the extent of boundary actually measured, but the *Fees for preparation of Plans, &c.* will be payable in full.

6.—For Surveys of Roads, Rivers, Canals, &c. and appraisements special terms will be made.

7.—Parties making application for the sale of any Land under the 3d Rule hereof, will be required to make a deposit, to the satisfaction of the Government Agent, of the probable cost of boundary clearing and the Fees for Survey.

8.—The Surveys when completed will be lodged in the Office of the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, where they will be marked off in a general Map which with a Register will be kept for public inspection—and Registers will also be kept for the same purpose at the Offices of the Government Agents of the Lands for Sale in their respective Provinces.

9.—The Sales will be held when practicable at the Government Agent's Office once a month, after public Notice by Proclamation in the Government Gazette—and care will be taken to prevent the days of Sale in the several Provinces from interfering with each other.

10.—On the day of Sale the Government Agent will specify, in three separate items, the upset price of the Lands, the expense of clearing the boundaries, and the Fees for Survey recoverable under this Minute—and will stipulate that the two latter must be paid in full by the purchaser on the day of Sale, together with 10 per cent on the amount actually bid for the Land.

11.—The balance of the purchase money must be paid within one month from the day of Sale, and in default of such payment the sale will be considered void, the 10 per cent will be forfeited and the Government will be at liberty to re-sell the Land.

12.—The Colonial Secretary will be entitled to the following Fees for the preparation of the Title Deeds*

* See Minute of 2d July 1847.

On all grants of Land Sold for a sum not exceeding £5—one shilling.

On all grant of Land sold for more than £5 four per cent.

But he is in no case to receive more than forty shillings for any one grant.

And the Secretary of the District Court of the District in which the Land granted shall be situate, will be entitled to a fee of five shillings for enrolling the grant.

13.—On the receipt of the purchase money in full and of the Fees allowed by the preceding Rule, the Government Agent will apply to the Colonial Secretary for a grant in Duplicate, One Copy shall be delivered to the purchaser, who shall forthwith be put in possession of the Land, and the other enrolled in the District Court.

14.—The Crown reserves to itself the right of making and constructing such Roads and Bridges as may be necessary for public purposes in all Lands purchased as above and also to such indigenous timber stone and other materials, the produce of the Land as may be required for making and keeping the said Roads and Bridges in repair and for any other public works. The Crown further reserves to itself all mines of precious metals.

MINUTE.

BY THE GOVERNOR.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the following rules for the payment and adjustment of Costs attending the Survey of Lands intended to be brought to sale, be substituted for those laid down in the Minute of the 7th October 1844.

The Treasurer will, on his application, furnish the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department with the necessary funds to meet the expenses of Survey; and he will debit these sums as Advances, for the settlement of which the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department will be responsible.

The recovery of these sums from the purchasers of Land will be made by the Government Agents and remitted to the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, and by him forwarded to the Treasurer in liquidation of the Advances outstanding.

If any Land is not sold within one year from the date of its being advertised for sale, the expense of Survey on account of such Land is to be brought to account as a charge by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department—in order to which it will be necessary in all cases, that proper Vouchers should be obtained for every payment as incurred.

Should any such Land be afterwards sold, the costs of Survey recovered are to be paid by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department to the Treasurer to be accounted for as an Incidental Receipt.

The Principal Office in charge of the Survey Department will transmit to this Office quarterly a Return of all unsold Lands, the expenses of surveying which shall have been charged as an expenditure—making a note of such as may have been subsequently sold.

He will also furnish the Auditor General with a quarterly Account of all payments made by him out of the Advances received from the Treasurer, and of the recoveries on account—accompanied by a separate Account of the payments finally brought to account, and of the recoveries since made.

These rules are not however to apply to the Advances already made to Government Agents by the Treasurer, which they will settle in terms of the Minute of the 7th October 1844—returning to him any Balance that may be now in their hands.

Additional Instructions to our Right Trusty and Wellbeloved Cousin GEORGE VISCOUNT TORRINGTON, our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over our Island of Ceylon, and its Dependencies, or in his absence to our Lieutenant Governor, or the Officer Administering the Government of our said Island and its Dependencies. Given at our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this Twenty-eighth day of April 1848 in the Eleventh year of our Reign.

Whereas by our Instructions under our Royal Sign Manual and Signet bearing date at Buckingham Palace the Twenty-seventh day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven in the tenth year of our Reign, which accompanied our Commission constituting and appointing you to be our Governor and Commander in Chief in and over our Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies.

We have amongst other things directed that all Grants of Land to be made by you in our name to any person or persons in consideration of the payment of money for the same shall be executed and delivered to the purchaser or purchasers at the Office of the Surveyor General of our said Island on the payment of the purchase money for the same. And whereas we deem it expedient to revoke so much of our Instructions aforesaid as directs that such Grants of Land shall be delivered at the Office of the Surveyor General of our said Island. Now therefore by these our Instructions under our Royal Sign Manual and Signet, We do hereby revoke so much of our Instructions aforesaid; And we do further declare our pleasure to be, that all Grants of Land made by you by virtue of our Instructions aforesaid shall be delivered to the purchaser or purchasers of such Land, in such manner as has been customary or as you shall judge fitting.

Original rules as above. 6. If the borrower should be unable to procure persons to become securities for him, the Board will at its discretion waive this condition on the borrower

If either of the securities should not have property to the value of the sum borrowed, others may be added not exceeding four in all to make up the deficiency.

Where the securities intend to rely on landed property in procuring themselves worth the sum required, they should bring with them the title by which they hold such landed property, (provided it be not mortgaged) when they attend for the purpose of justifying.

Original rules as above. 7. A certificate, a copy of which will be given by the Clerk of the Board, must be obtained from the Collector of the District, (Agent of the

Province) in which the applicant resides, that neither himself nor either of his securities is a Government Renter or security for a Government Renter.

Order of Court 21st November 1833. In all cases in which the Board may deem it necessary, the oath of the parties (principal or security) will be required in addition to the Collector's certificate to the effect that he is not a Government Debtor or Renter or Security for any such person.

2. The accounts of the office will be made up and the interest divided quarterly commencing from 1st January 1834.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. That the object of the Colombo General Dispensary be the gratuitous Medical and Surgical relief of the poor; and of those who from any temporary difficulties are unable to procure the same elsewhere.

2. That the Dispensary be opened for the attendance of the sick poor every morning—Sundays excepted, from 7 to 8 o'clock when a Medical Officer shall be in attendance.
3. That every person requiring the aid of the Institution do make application to some Member of the Committee, of the Friend in Need Society, or any Subscriber to the Dispensary, who, if he see fit, shall recommend him, to the attention of the Medical Officer in attendance.
4. That on the Ticket being received from the said Member, and duly signed by him—the applicant be required to attend; at the hour prescribed, at the Dispensary, and present himself or herself to the Medical Officer in attendance; and that the applicant shall on no account transfer his or her ticket to any other person.
5. That the Patients, do attend regularly and punctually at the Dispensary, as they may be desired by the Medical Officers; and that they be required at all times, to bring their cards or tickets or recommendation with them.
6. That, no person shall be allowed Medical relief or attention, if he or she neglect to bring to the Dispensary some sort of bottle, or other convenient vessel to contain the Medicine prescribed.
7. That no patient be allowed to neglect the instructions given for his or her cure or relief; or to be guilty of irregular attendance on the Medical Officers, without pain of dismissal.
8. That a Dispenser of Medicines shall be appointed who shall be held responsible to the Medical Officers for the correct compounding of all prescriptions and for the proper discharge of his duties. That the care of all Medicines and equipment be entrusted to him, and that he shall attend at the Dispensary at the hours appointed by the Medical Officers.
9. That the strictest economy and discrimination be exercised, in the purchase of Drugs and equipment, and that and every other responsibility as concerns expenditure be vested in the Committee of Management.
10. That the formula of recommendation be kept clean, and returned into the hands of the Medical Officer, when the Patient from any cause shall discontinue his or her attendance at the Dispensary.
11. That an annual report of the Dispensary be presented to the Friend in Need Society, to be contained in the General Report of the said Society, and submitted at its General Meeting.

The Society is supported by voluntary monthly contributions and occasional donations. Its design is to relieve by pension or otherwise cases, which upon the personal investigation, are considered deserving of charity. Strangers in distress have also received its aid, many of them having had the means afforded them to return to their native country. The circumstances of the society, continuing prosperous enable it to meet all claims within the sphere of its operations. The society has now on its list 18 fixed and 2 provisional pensioners. A revision of the pensioners is made half-yearly to ascertain the circumstance of each individual.

Sick paupers are admitted and treated in the society's hospital, a commodious and ventilated building, with separate wards for the accommodation of patients of different sexes, according to the character of their diseases. The patients are regularly attended by the resident medical attendant, and have also the benefit of the advice of the consulting surgeon. They are dieted under the immediate supervision of one of the members of the hospital sub-committee clothed at the expense of the society and allowed every comfort they may require. Medicine is also afforded gratuitously in particular cases, to out-door patients. The number of patients treated in the hospital during the year ending 31st March 1848 amounted to 62 of these 48 were discharged 9 died and 5 removed.

The Committee in 1846 established at Trincomalie a General Dispensary under the auspices of the Friend in-Need Society, on the same principle as that of the Colombo General Dispensary, and receive a regular supply of medicines from England for its purposes.

INCORPORATED BY THE ROYAL CHARTER A. D. 1701.

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts was incorporated by Royal Charter, in the reign of King WILLIAM III, A. D. 1701, for receiving, managing and disposing of such funds as might be contributed for the religious instruction of His Majesty's Christian subjects beyond the seas, for maintaining Clergymen in the British Colonies, Plantations and Factories, and for the general propagation of the Gospel. It has been engaged in its appointed sphere of duty for upwards of 141 years; and during a whole century, it was the only Missionary Society in connexion with the Church of England. In regard to its constitution, it is under the immediate controul of the Bishops of the United Church and is uniformly conducted on Church principles.

The Society has at present in its employment, Missionaries in the four grand divisions of the British Empire, viz., North America, West Indies, East India and Australia, and the whole number on its List amounts to 302, beside 230 Catechists and Schoolmasters; independently of all which its funds are made available for supporting Colleges and building Churches and Schools. It was in 1818 that the Society extended its operations to the East. Here it has more than 32 Missionaries in its service. It has moreover established a College at Calcutta, called **BISHOP'S COLLEGE**, for the education of an indigenous Clergy, and the diffusion of sound and useful knowledge; and Grammar Schools at Madras for the instruction of the middle and lower classes.

At Cotta there is an Institution, called the *Christian Institution*, where a number of Youths, of good promise, selected from the other schools, are boarded and educated, with a view to their becoming useful School-masters, Catechists, and Assistant Missionaries. This Institution contains *Twenty-two* Youths. The course of study pursued by them comprises Singhalese, English, (including Grammar, Composition, History, and Geography) Latin, Greek, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, and Theology. There is also a Preparatory class, connected with this *Institution*, containing *five* Boys.

At Chundicully there is a *Seminary*, containing *Twenty* Youths, and another at Baddagama, containing *Fifteen* Youths. From these Seminaries, Youths are selected for the *Cotta Christian Institution*.

The Youths in the *Christian Institution* and Preparatory Class at Cotta, and in the *Seminaries* at Chundicully and Baddagama, amounting to *Sixty-two*, are boarded and educated at the expense of the Society, with the exception of a few who pay a monthly sum towards defraying the expense of their board.

At Kandy and at Nellore there are *Female Boarding Schools*, the former containing *fourteen*, and the latter *Thirty* Girls. The expense of these two Schools is borne, partly by the Society, and partly by Subscriptions and Donations.

The Holy Scriptures, and the Book of Common Prayer have been translated into the familiar Singhalese, and printed at the Cotta Press; besides many elementary School Books and a large number of Religious books and Tracts, which have been gratuitously circulated among the Natives.

The Jaffna Boarding Institution is intended for the benefit not only of the youths of Jaffna, but also of the children of parents residing in other parts of the Island.

The course of study adopted in the day and Boarding Schools includes, in addition to the ordinary branches of a plain education Ancient and Modern History, Algebra, Geometry, Mensuration, Natural Philosophy, and the Elements of Mental and Moral Science.

THE BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

(Commenced its operations in Ceylon in the year 1812.)

THE three principal Stations are Colombo, Kandy and Matara. Connected with these are 16 Sub-stations and 143 Villages which are visited by the European and Native Missionaries. In the three Chief Stations there are services in the English Language, and at Colombo there is an English School. On some of the Coffee Estates around Kandy the coolies are preached to in the Tamil language, and in the Chapel at Matellethere is a weekly service in Portuguese. All other the operations of the Mission are in *Singhalese*. At the Mission Printing Office in Kandy about 40,000 Singhalese Tracts and School Books are printed every year. In the earlier part of this year there were 49 Schools connected with the Mission, containing 1,288 Children, but some reduction has recently been made in consequence of the depressed state of the Society's Funds. There is at Colombo a Native Female Boarding School in which 12 Girls are educated in English and Singhalese. This Mission is entirely dependent on the voluntary contributions of friends here and in England for support. The total expenditure for 1847 was £2,171 1 6½. This year it will be considerably less. The amount collected in the Island is about one-sixth of the sum expended. The Parent Society supplies the remainder. MISCELLANEOUS.

A CHRONOLOGICAL TABLE OF EVENTS.

CONNECTED WITH CEYLON.

A. D.

- 1505.—The Portuguese, under Don Lorenzo de Almeida, first visit Ceylon, and are permitted to trade.
- 1518.—Lopez Suar Alverenga arrives in Ceylon with a fleet of nineteen ships, and after some ineffectual opposition from the Singhalese, erects a Fort at Colombo, and forces the King Dharma Prakrama Bahoo 9th, then reigning at Cotta, to acknowledge himself tributary to the Crown of Portugal.
- 1520.—The Singhalese, exasperated by the cruelties of the Portuguese, invest the Fort at Colombo, and keep it besieged for seven months.
- 1524.—By order of Emanuel, King of Portugal, the Portuguese demolish the Fort at Colombo.
An Arab Chieftain endeavours by stratagem to get the Portuguese, who were left at Colombo, into his power.
- 1527.—Dharma Prakrama Bahoo 9th dies, and is succeeded by his brother Wijaya Bahoo 7th.
- 1534.—Wijaya Bahoo 7th is murdered, and his eldest son Bhuwaneka Bahoo 7th succeeds him.
- 1536.—Bhuwaneka Bahoo 7th places his grandson Dharma Paala under the protection of the King of Portugal, and sends an Embassy to that Court, with an image of the young Prince, and a Crown of gold.
- Juaz Monteiro, the first Bishop of Ceylon dies at Colombo.
- 1541.—The image of Dharma Paala ceremoniously crowned by John III in the Great Hall of his Palace at Lisbon.
Bhuwaneka Bahoo 7th is accidentally killed, being shot through the heart by a Portuguese gentleman, while accompanying a party of European friends on the Kullania.
- 1542.—The Portuguese raise Dharma Paala to the throne, after baptizing him by the name of Don John. He is vigorously opposed by Raja Singha 1st, and forced to fly from Cotta and take refuge at Colombo.
- 1544.—The Roman Catholic religion first preached at Manar by Xavier, or some of his colleagues; and 600 of the inhabitants, who had embraced it, are massacred by the King of Jaffna.
- 1545.—A Portuguese fleet attempts to wrest Manar from the King of Jaffna.
- 1548.—Xavier visits Jaffna, and persuades the King to form an alliance with the Portuguese.
- 1580.—Dharma Paala bequeathes the whole Island to the Crown of Portugal.

A. D.

- 1580.—The Portuguese are permitted by the King of Jaffna to build a Franciscan Church in his capital.
- 1581.—Raja Singha 1st proclaims himself King of Ceylon, and afterwards lays siege to Colombo, but is soon obliged to raise it, in consequence of the Portuguese sending Konaapoo Bandar with an army to Kandy, to make a diversion in their favour.
- 1591.—The Portuguese obtain possession of Kandy, where they raise Don Philip to the throne in violation of their engagement to Konaapoo Bandar.
- 1592.—Konaapoo Bandar poisons his rival, and after expelling the Portuguese troops from Kandy, turns his arms against Raja Singha 1st, whom he defeats in a battle at Kokulbittawella.
- Raja Singha 1st dies, aged 120 year; and Konaapoo Bandar proclaims himself King in his stead under the title of Wimala Dharma.
- Don Pedro de Sousa is sent from Goa in command of a strong force. He makes himself master of Kandy, and in order to favor the desire of the Singhalese, proclaims as Queen, Donna Catharina daughter of a former King of Kandy, who had been placed under the guardianship of the Portuguese at Manar, and educated as a Christian.
- 1593.—Wimala Dharma defeats De Sousa and captures Dona Catharina, whom he afterwards marries.
- 1596.—The Portuguese, under Don Jeronimo de Azevedo, march to Kandy, but are met by Wimala Dharma at Wellane, and suffer a severe defeat.
- Dominicus Correa goes over to Wimala Dharma, who sends him with an army against Galle, where he is routed, made prisoner, and put to death by the Portuguese.
- 1597, 26th or 28th May.—Dharma Paula dies at Colombo, and is buried in the Franciscan Convent in the Fort.
- 1602.—The Dutch visit Ceylon: Admiral Joris Spilbergen offers to the King the friendship and alliance of the Prince of Orange and the States General of Holland, which are accepted.
- 1603.—Admiral Sebalt de Weerd, in a fit of intoxication, insults the King and is killed, together with many of his attendants.
- 1604.—Wimala Dharma dies, and is succeeded by his brother Senerat.
- 1612, 11th May.—Marcellus de Boschouder arrives from Amboyna, and enters into a treaty with the King.
- The Dutch commence erecting a fort at Cottiar, but are surprised and massacred by the Portuguese.
- 1613.—Boschouder quells a rebellion at Panoa, and defeats a Portuguese fleet between Cape Comorin and Ceylon.
- 20th July.—The Queen Dona Catharina dies.
- 1614, 4th March.—Don Munro de Fereira arrived at Colombo in the quality of Viceroy of Goa, to relieve Don Jeronimus de Azevedo.
- 3d June.—He sends Don Francisco de Menezes as his Envoy at Kandy to propose a Treaty of Peace, which is refused.
- 1615.—Boschouder is sent to Holland to procure succour against the Portuguese; but in consequence of the very cold reception he met with from the Directors of the Dutch East India Company, he proceeds to Copenhagen.
- 1618.—Boschouder on the part of his Kandyan Majesty concludes a treaty with Christian IV. King of Denmark, and sets out with some ships for Ceylon, but dies upon his passage.
- 1620.—The Danish ships reach Ceylon, but, being rejected by the King, they sail back to Denmark.

A. D.

- 1624.—The Portuguese commenced erecting a fort at Jaffnapatam.
- 1627.—The Portuguese erect a Fort at Trincomalie, and another at Batticaloa.
- 1630.—General Constantine de Saa takes the field with a large army against the Prince of Ouwa, is defeated and killed.
- 1632.—The fort at Jaffnapatam completed.
- 1633.—Sencgat dies, and is succeeded by his son Raja Singha 2d.
Matale and the adjacent provinces formed into a separate Kingdom for Wijaya Paala, the King's brother who resided at Godapola.
- 1637, 26th Oct.—The Dutch Deputies John Theyzen and Adrian Helmond arrived at Batticaloa.
- March.—The Portuguese army, amounting to 2,300 Europeans and Mistizos and 6,000 Caffres, under the command of Diego de Melho and Damian Bottado, again penetrate into the interior, and after ransacking Kandy, retire to Gannauwa; but Raja Singha 2d surrounds them with his forces, puts them all to the swords and has their heads cut off, and piled up in the form of a pyramid.
- 1638, 23rd May.—Admiral Westerwold wrests Batticaloa from the Portuguese; and concludes a treaty with the King, highly advantageous to the Dutch.
- The King sends two Ambassadors to Batavia with presents to the General and Council of the Indies.
- 1639.—Trincomalie taken by the Dutch.
- 1640, 9th Feb.—The Dutch take Negombo.
13th March.—Point de Galie stormed and taken by the Dutch, under Commodore Koster.
Koster murdered on the road from Kandy to Batticaloa.
8th Nov.—The Portuguese re-captured Negombo.
- 1644.—Negombo again taken by the Dutch.
- 1645.—Wijaya Paala makes war with Raja Singha 2d. and being defeated, repairs to Colombo and embarks for Goa, where he embraces Christianity.
- 1646.—A temporary pacification ensues between the Dutch and the Portuguese.
The Dutch authorities at Negombo having carried off some of the King's tame Elephants, he surrounds their troops in the Seven Corles, and after slaying the Commander, Adrian Vander Stell, cuts off his head, and sends it in a silken bag to his countrymen on the sea Coast.
- 1652.—A mutiny among the Portuguese Soldiers and principal inhabitants of Colombo is raised against the Governor Manuel Mascarenhas Homen, whom they take into custody.
- 1655, 15th Oct.—Caltura taken by the Dutch, under General Hulst.
10th Dec.—Antonio Admiral de Meneyes Governor of Jaffnapatam, taken prisoner by the Dutch at Mutwal on his way from Manar to Colombo.
- 1656, 10th April.—General Gerard Hulst, who commanded the Dutch Forces at the siege of Colombo killed by a Musket Bullet.
May 12th.—The Dutch lay siege to Colombo; and the Portuguese after an obstinate resistance of seven months, surrender it by capitulation.
- 1658, 22d Feb.—Manar taken by the Dutch.
16th April.—Fort Hammenheil taken by the Dutch.
22d June.—Jaffna surrendered to the Dutch after a siege of 3½ months.
August.—The Reformed Religion first introduced into Jaffna by the Rev. Dr. Baldeus.

- 1685, Sept.—A conspiracy formed against the Dutch at Jaffna by Don^e Louis Pooda Tamby and some Portuguese are discovered by Don Manuel de Andrado. Modliar, and the conspirators executed.
A dreadful inundation at Kaits, by which a considerable number of the inhabitants and cattle perish.
- 1659.—Captain Robert Knox, his son and several of the crew of the *Ann* Frigate are taken prisoners at Batticaloa, and removed to Kandy.
- 1661.—A Pearl Fishery.
- 1663.—A Pearl Fishery.
- 1664.—A serious insurrection breaks out at Kandy, and the King narrowly escapes being murdered.
- 1666.—The Dutch erect a fort at Arrandorre.
- 1672.—Monsieur De La Haye, the Commander of a French squadron, arrives at Cottiar, and opens a correspondence with the King, who permits the French to erect a fort near the bay of Trincomalie; but being attacked and defeated by the Dutch Admiral, Van Goens, he, sails for the coast of Coromandel.
- 1679, Governor Van Goens sends an Embassy to Kandy.
Oct. 18th.—Knox effects his escape from Kandy and reaches Arripo.
- 1685.—Raja Singha 2d dies, and is succeeded by his son Wimala Dharma Surya.
- 1687.—The Venerable Father Jose Vaz arrives from Goa.
- 1692.—He penetrates into Kandy and endeavours to re-establish the Roman Catholic religion in that city.
- 1707.—Wimala Dharma Surya dies, and is succeeded by his son Narendra Singha.
- 1709.—Susuna Mangkurat Mas, Ex King of Java is banished to Ceylon by the Dutch.
- 1711, 7th January.—The Venerable Father Joze Vaz dies at Kandy.
- 1721.—An Embassy of Condolence sent to Kandy by Governor Rumph upon the death of the Queen.
June 11th.—Fiscal Barent Vander Swaan and his wife murdered at Colombo, in an insurrection of their slaves.
- 1723.—The Javanese Princes and Chiefs, in revolt against the Dutch, surrender themselves at Batavia to the number of forty-four persons, and are banished to Ceylon.
- 1729.—Governor Vuyst makes an attempt to render himself an independent sovereign; and, in the prosecution of that attempt, has recourse to the most atrocious cruelties. He is arrested and sent to Batavia, where he is sentenced to be broken alive upon the wheel, his body to be quartered, and those quarters to be burnt upon a pile of wood, when his ashes were to be collected and thrown into the sea.
- 1732.—A pearl Fishery.
- 1734.—Danurajo, first Minister in the Court of Java, having thwarted the ambitious designs of the Dutch, incurs their displeasure, is given over to them, and banished to Ceylon.
- 1736.—Taxes upon Imports and Exports first established in Ceylon.
- 1737.—Susunan Mangkurat Mas dies at Colombo, and his family, with the regalia are sent back to Java.
- 1739.—Narendia Singha dies, and is succeeded by his brother in law Sreewijaya Raja Singha.
- 1740.—The Rev. Messrs. Eller and Nitschman, Moravian Missionaries, visit Ceylon.
- 1745.—Sreewijaya Raja Singha sends a deputation of Chiefs to Siam, to bring over priests to restore the neglected ordinances of Buddha.

A. D.

- 1745.—Susunan Kuning, King of Java surrenders himself to the Dutch, and is banished to Ceylon.
- 1746.—A Pearl Fishery—yielded £4,766 13 4.
- 1747.—Sreewijaya Raja Singha dies, and is succeeded by his brother in law Kirtisree Raja Singha.

A new Iron Light House at Galle completed.

May 20th—The South-west monsoon set in with considerable violence.

The Hambantotte Treasury robbed of £1800 in silver and Notes.

The Kalany Ganga rose to a great height so as to prevent carriages from passing the Bridge of Boats.

24th May—A Levée and in the evening a Ball, at Queen's House in commemoration of Her Majesty's Birth-day.

July 6th—Considerable excitement prevailed in the town of Kandy in consequence of large numbers of Natives assembling in a riotous manner around the Cutcherry and protesting against the Gun Tax. Mr. J. Staples District Judge addressed them but with small effect.

8th July—Sir J. Emerson Tennent arrived at Kandy and addressed a large concourse of Kandyan Chiefs and Headmen relative to the new Taxes after which they quietly dispersed to their homes.

26th—A meeting of some thousand of Cingalese chiefly from the Galle side took place at Borelle within two miles of the Fort of Colombo: the Police in cautioning them to disperse quietly were violently assaulted: the Military were then called out and His Excellency himself repaired to the spot and the meeting finally dispersed.

28th July—A Rising of disaffected Kandyans took place at Matelle when after driving out the European officials and burning and sacking some houses, the rebels proclaimed a King of Kandy in the person of one David Appoo a low country man.

29th July—A Company of the 15th Regiment and one of the Ceylon Rifles under Captain Lillie march from Kandy to Matelle near which place they encountered and immediately dispersed a considerable body of the insurgents being 40 of them dead on the ground with but one man of the Troops slightly wounded.

The Kandy and Kornegalle Districts placed under Martial Law, by Proclamation.

7th August—Public Meeting in Colombo expressive of confidence in the measures adopted by Government to restore tranquillity.

9th August—Porang Appoo a noted robber and a Budhist Priest tried by Court Martial and condemned to be shot.

14th August—A public meeting held at Kandy to express the great confidence felt by all classes in the prompt measures adopted by the authorities for the suppression of the late rising.

Addresses received by His Excellency from the Roman Catholic Bishop and Clergy expressive of confidence and loyalty.

27th August—The Steamer *Inflexible*, left Colombo for Singapore with a number of Rebels.

4th September—A special Sessions of the Supreme Court held at Kandy for the trial of the rebel prisoners.

16th September—The special Sessions at Kandy terminated in the conviction of fourteen prisoners and the acquittal of seventeen. The pretender David Appoo taken prisoner in a house at Matelle and brought into Kandy to wait his trial.

A public meeting held in Colombo to raise subscriptions for the purpose of providing free passages to Australia for young men and others out of employ.

2d October—His Excellency opened the Sessions of the Legislative Council by a Speech of more than ordinary length and interest.

10th October—Martial Law abolished in the Kandyan District, by Proclamation

15th October—The Brig *Torrington*, sailed for Australia with forty seven Emigrant from Ceylon.

1st November—The Church Missionary Jubilee celebrated at Cotta when a large concourse of native Christians assembled at prayer.

MINUTE

FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE.

1. UNDER instructions from The Right Hon'ble The Secretary of State, His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct that the following Rules by which it is proposed that the Civil Service of this Colony shall in future be regulated in respect to Classification, Salaries and Pensions, be published for general information.

2. The Service will be divided into two Branches, to be termed the Senior Branch and the Junior Branch, and the latter will consist of five Classes.

3. A list of the Offices comprised in the several Branches and Classes, and of the Salaries attached to them is annexed to this Minute.*

4. These Salaries will commence from the 1st July 1845, from which date also will be computed the service entitling the newly added Officers to the periodical increase of Salary incident to their respective Classes.

5. The Pensions of the Civil Servants appointed prior to 1832 will be regulated by the Rules hitherto in force, which will remain unaltered.

6. A Civil Servant appointed subsequently to 1832 will be entitled to Pension at the following rates and under the restrictions, founded upon the Provisions of the Act 4 & 5. William 4. Cap. 24, hereinafter specified.

For 15 years service and less than 20 a Pension equal to four-twelfths of the Salary of his Office.

For 20 years and less than 25, five-twelfths.

For 25 years and less than 30, six-twelfths.

For 30 years and less than 35, seven-twelfths.

For 35 years and upwards, eight-twelfths.

These rates are to be the maximum rates in respect of each period of Service, and may be subject to diminution.

7. No pension will be granted without the authority of Her Majesty's Government, in order to obtain which Certificates of Service, Age, good Conduct and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Secretary of State.

8. No pension will be granted to any Civil Servant who shall be under fifty five years of age, unless upon Certificate from the Head of the Department to which he may belong and from two Medical Practitioners, that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body to discharge the duties of his situation; nor unless he shall have discharged those duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Head of his Department. And in case the Civil Servant claiming such Pension shall be himself the Head of a Department, then such Pension shall not be granted unless he shall have discharged the duties of his situation with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Governor, by whom the same shall be certified to the Secretary of State.

9. The Pension shall be computed upon the amount of the Salary enjoyed by a Civil Servant at the time of his retirement, provided he shall have been in the receipt of the same or in the same Branch and Class for at least three years; otherwise the Pension shall be calculated upon the average amount of Salary received by such person for three years next preceding the commencement of such Pension.

10. It will be competent to Her Majesty's Government in cases of peculiar and extraordinary merit, to grant special and higher rates of Pensions than those laid down in the preceding Regulations.

11. No Civil Servant will be held to have an absolute right to compensation for past Services or to any Pension under this Minute, and Her Majesty's Government will retain their power and authority to dismiss any Civil Servant from the Service without compensation.

12. In consideration of the claim to Pension hereby established, an abatement at the rate of five per cent will be made from the Salary of every Civil Servant appointed since 1832, to commence from the 14th February last.

13. The claim of a Civil Servant to Pension will be considered to have commenced from his first permanent appointment to any of the Offices in the List annexed to this Minute.

MINUTE

FOR THE CLERGY AND TEACHERS.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to announce that the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State has authorised the benefits of the Pension Scheme for the Civil Service of this Colony, laid down in the Minute of the 3d July 1845, to be extended to all the Clergy and Ministers of the Christian Religion in Ceylon receiving stipends from the Public Treasury, and to the Masters of the Superior Schools; with the following modification however in regard to the period at which the claim to Pension should commence.

By the Minute above referred to, the Pension scale in the case of the Civil Servants is fixed to begin at 15 years' service. But as the considerations which led to that regulation do not apply to Clergymen and Schoolmasters, who must necessarily be of mature age before they are appointed, and would enter, immediately on their arrival in the Colony, on the efficient discharge of their respective duties, Her Majesty's Government has decided that any Clergyman or Schoolmaster who may be compelled to retire after Ten years' service, but under Fifteen, shall be entitled, under the same conditions as are laid down for the Civil Service Pensions, to a Pension not exceeding Three-twelfths of his Salary. After 15 years' service, they will follow in all respects the rules laid down in regard to Pensions to the Civil Service.

His Excellency has further to announce that the following Schoolmasters come within the scope of the regulation hereby established

Principal of the Colombo Academy.

Mathematical Teacher of do.

Classical Teacher of do.

Teacher of Drawing and Design of do.

Head Master of the Model School of do.

Rector of the Native Normal Seminary.

FOR THE JUDGES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to announce that the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State has authorised the establishment of a Scheme of Pensions for the Judges of the Supreme Court of this Island, under the following regulations.

A Judge who is unable, after 15 years' service as such, to continue efficiently to discharge the duties of his Office, will be entitled to a Pension not exceeding one-half of his Salary; such Pension will not however be increased in consequence of prolonged service beyond 15 years.

In the event of a Judge being compelled by ill health to retire after a service of 7 years, but less than 15 years, he will be permitted, on producing a Medical Certificate of incapacity to continue in the discharge of his duties, to retire on a Pension not exceeding one-fourth of his Salary.

To a Judge who should retire before completing 7 years' service, no Pension will be granted.

No Judge will be held to have an absolute right to compensation for past services, or to a Pension under this Minute: and no Pension will be granted without the authority of Her Majesty's Government; in order to obtain which, Certificate of service, age and the grounds of retirement will be submitted to the Secretary of State.

In consideration of the claim to Pension hereby established, an abatement at the rate of 5 per cent will be made from the Salaries of the Judges of the Supreme Court; to commence from the 14th September last.

FOR THE GOVERNMENT CLERKS.

1. HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the publication, for general information, of the following Rules, by which it is proposed that the Pensions of all Persons employed, or who may hereafter be employed on the Fixed Establishment, and Provisional Establishment sanctioned by Her Majesty's Government, of the several Offices and Departments specified in the List annexed to this Minute, and not within the exceptions thereof, and not receiving a Salary less than Twenty-five pounds per annum, shall hereafter be regulated.

2. Every person so borne on the Fixed and Provisional Establishments as aforesaid, will be entitled to Pension at the following rates, and under the restrictions founded upon the provisions of the Act 4 and 5 Wm. 4, Cap. 24. hereinafter specified :

For 15 years' service and less than 20, a Pension equal to four-twelfths of the Salary of his office.

For 20 years' and less than 25,—five-twelfths.

For 25 years' and less than 30,—six-twelfths.

For 30 years' and less than 35—seven-twelfths.

For 35 years' and upwards,—eight-twelfths.

These rates are to be the maximum rates in respect of each period of service, and may be subject to diminution.

3. No Pension will be granted without the authority of Her Majesty's Government, in order to obtain which Certificates of service, age, good conduct and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Secretary of State.

4. No Pension will be granted to any Person who shall be under fifty-five years of age, unless upon Certificate from the Head of the Department to which he may belong, and from two Medical Practitioners, that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body to discharge the duties of his situation; nor unless he shall have discharged those duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Head of his Department.

5. The Pension shall be computed upon the amount of Salary enjoyed at the time of retirement, provided the claimant shall have been in the receipt of the same for at least three years; otherwise the Pension shall be calculated upon the average amount of Salary received for three years next preceding the commencement of such Pension.

6. It will be competent to Her Majesty's Government, in cases of peculiar and extraordinary merit, to grant special and higher rates of Pension than those laid down in the preceding regulations.

7. No claimant for a Pension will be held to have an absolute right to compensation for past services, or to any Pension under this Minute; and His Excellency the Governor will retain his power and authority to dismiss any Clerk or other Public Servant from the Service without compensation.

8. In consideration of the claim to Pension hereby established, an abatement shall be made from the 1st instant, according to the respective rates following; (that is to say.)

From Salaries not exceeding the sum of One hundred Pounds, an abatement after the rate of Two Pounds ten Shillings per Centum;

And from Salaries exceeding One Hundred Pounds, Five Pounds per Centum;

9. These abatements (which are only applicable to Salaries drawn on the Fixed Abstracts, and Provisional Abstracts sanctioned by Her Majesty's Government) will be made by the respective Heads of Departments, and by them remitted monthly to the Treasurer, accompanied by a Statement in duplicate, in the annexed form, to be attached to the Accounts of that Officer.

10. The claim of a Public Servant to Pension will be considered to have commenced from the period of his first permanent appointment on the Fixed Establishment, or Provisional Establishment sanctioned by Her Majesty's Government, comprised in the Schedule annexed to this Minute.
