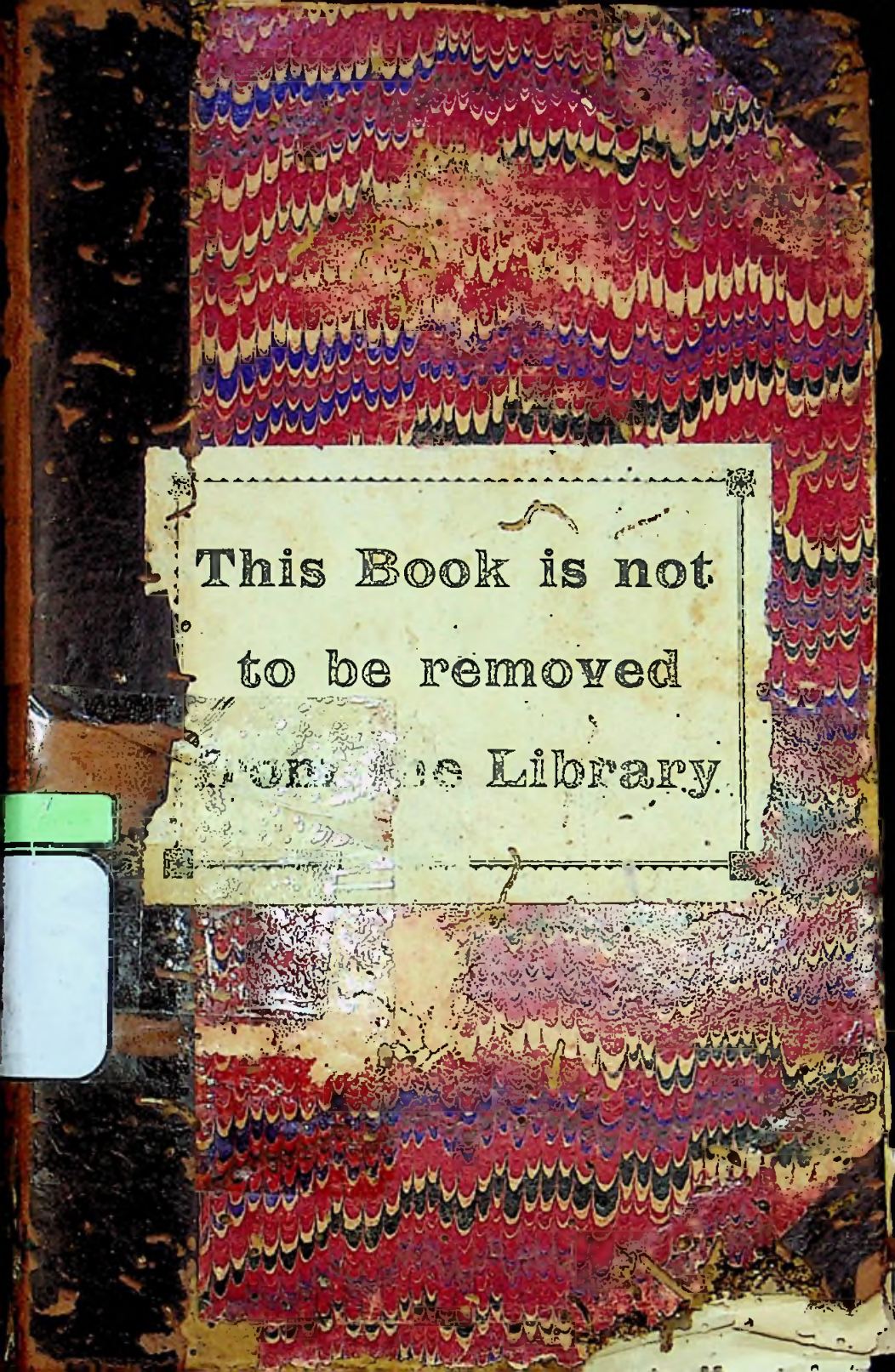




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The Reference Library shall be available to literate members of the public resident in Colombo and over the age of 14 years and shall be open daily from 8 a.m., to 6 p.m., and shall be closed on Sundays (after 11 a.m.) on Wednesdays and on Wesak day, Christmas day, New year's day and Good Friday and the following Saturday and Sunday (Easter Sunday) and at such other times as the Committee may deem necessary for stock-taking or other purposes, due notice of which shall be posted in the Library.

Persons desirous of using the Reference Library must on each occasion, before entering, inform the Librarian and obtain his permission and on such permission being granted sign the Reference Library Readers' Signature Book in which he shall enter his full name, age, occupation and address (both private and official) and such signature will be taken and considered to signify assent to these Rules and Regulations.

Readers will not be permitted to take down from the shelves the books they wish to consult but they will be handed to them on application to the Librarian. All books consulted, including those referred to in the next succeeding rule, must be returned to the Librarian.

Any book in the Lending Library, except works of Fiction, may be obtained for use in the Reference Library on application to the Librarian, but it must be given up if and when required for lending out.

RULES TO BE OBSERVED ON APPLICATION FOR LOANS.

1.—Any person desirous of obtaining a loan from the Colombo Savings' Bank must make an application by letter addressed to "The Chairman of the Superintending Committee" in which he is to state the sum required, the nature of the security he intends to offer,—whether immoveable or moveable property, the Title-deeds are to be forwarded at the same time. On superscription to be written "immediate", when it will forthwith be attended to.

2.—The Chairman of the Committee, on receiving an application for Loan, will forward the same together with the Title-deeds to the Trustees, who if satisfied as to the legality, will cause the property to be appraised, and examine the securities as to their sufficiency.

3.—On the Trustees acquainting the Committee that they are satisfied with the security tendered, the applicant will be entitled to receive as a loan one-half, and in case he gives two or more securities, two-thirds of the sum at which his property may have been appraised.

4.—The applicant must deposit with the Accountant the appraisers' fees on the sum applied for, at the time of making his application; but should a Loan of less amount than that applied for be sanctioned the surplus fees will be returned.

5.—Where moveable property is offered to be pledged the applicant will be informed when and where it is to be produced for the purpose of being appraised.

6.—The fixed allowance of the appraisers to be employed one-half per cent, on the amount lent, and where the property to be appraised is situated without the Pettah and Fort of Colombo, then each appraiser is allowed in addition one shilling per mile travelling expence.

7.—In all cases where the borrower is not subject to, or the property to be mortgaged is situate without the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, or of the District Courts of Colombo, such borrower will be required to execute, in addition to his Bond, a Warrant of Attorney to confess judgment.

RULES OF THE LOAN OFFICE.

1st—Respecting Loans.

Original rules framed in accordance with an order of the Supreme Court, dated 16th July 1824.

1. THE Titles must be produced, where real property is offered as security.

2. The Articles themselves, where gold, silver &c. is offered.

3. The property hypothecated must appear to be equal in value, if real property, to one-third more than the sum required to be borrowed; or, if it consists of gold, silver, &c., one-fourth more. But if the property offered for hypothecation by the borrower, fall short of that amount, the property of another person may be received to make up the deficiency. In such case, the person so contributing must be a party to the bond, which will state the circumstance of the case.

4. Every applicant* must, besides the property hypothecated, enter into a bond with two securities for the repayment of the principal sum borrowed, whenever the same shall be demanded, and of the interest as it becomes due.

Order of the Supreme Court dated 21st November 1833.

5. Each of the sureties will be required to give such an account of his property as may satisfy the Board that he is worth the amount of half the sum borrowed after payment of all his debts; and should the Board deem it necessary, he shall be required to make affidavit to the truth of his statement.

Original rules as above.

6. If the borrower should be unable to procure persons to become securities for him, the Board will, at its discretion, waive this condition, on the borrower pledging property to double the value of the sum required.

If either of the securities should not have property to the value of the sum borrowed, others may be added, not exceeding four in all, to make up the deficiency.

Where the securities intend to rely on landed property in proving themselves worth the sum required, they should bring with them the title by which they hold such landed property, (provided it be not mortgaged,) when they attend for the purpose of justifying.

Original rules as above.

7. A Certificate, a copy of which will be given by the Clerk of the Board, must be obtained from the Collector of the District, (Agent of the Province,) in which the applicant resides, that neither himself nor either of his securities is a Government Renter or Security for a Government Renter.

Order of Court—21st November 1833.

In all cases in which the Board may deem it necessary, the oath of the parties (principal or security) will be required, in addition to the Collector's certificate, to the effect that he is not a Government Debtor or Renter, or Security for any such persons.

Original rules as above.

8. The property offered for hypothecation must in all cases be valued at the expense of the applicant by appraisers to be appointed by the Board: and the applicant must, if required, deposit with the Clerk of the Board the per centage, to which the appraisers will be entitled, and which will be settled by the Board.

N. B. The rate allowed in ordinary circumstances is $\frac{1}{2}$ per Cent on the amount of the Loan.

9. The Interest to be paid on all Loans is 7 per Cent, which is to be paid monthly; in default of which parate execution may be taken out for the recovery of the same.

2d—Respecting Dividends of Interest.

1. The Loan Board will have one head of account with each Court; such account shall include all the sums in deposit from that Court, whether the same be Suitors' monies, Estate monies, or otherwise; but the Loan Office will only take account of the aggregate sum.

2. The accounts of the Office will be made up, and the interest divided quarterly; commencing from 1st January 1834.

3. Every pound sterling of principal, which has been for one complete quarter available for the purpose of making Loans, shall be entitled to a dividend of the Interest; such quarter is to be calculated from one dividend day to the subsequent dividend day, i. e., 1st January, 1st April, 1st July and 1st October.

4. Dividends shall not be calculated of lower fractions than one farthing on a pound sterling of principal, and any sum, the retaining of which would render such calculations necessary, shall be set over till the next dividend day.

5. The funds of the Weeskamer and Boedelkamer shall be kept separate from the accounts of the different Courts,—the interest derived therefrom being wholly paid over to Government.

6. At the end of each quarter the Board will audit the accounts of interest received, and declare the dividend to be allowed; in the first place setting over two-sixths thereof to the use of Government, towards the expenses of the establishment, as heretofore.

7. The surplus fund which has been accumulated by deductions from interest received in former years, now amounts to £720 or thereabouts, or about 8 per Cent on the capital lent out; and as it is equitable that the Cash in the District Courts, now about to receive the protection of that fund, should contribute towards it, a deduction of one-sixth of the interest received on monies from District Courts shall be made quarterly, until such deduction shall have accumulated to a similar amount per cent on the principal sums lent out on

account of those Courts; after which such deduction shall cease, and the whole shall be formed into one general fund to provide for unforeseen losses of principal lent out.

8. After the above deductions have been made, the residue of interest received shall be divided as declared in the 4th and 5th Rules; and the amount set over to the credit of each Court according to the total sums, which they may have in deposit, and entitled to interest under article 3.

N. B. The average rate of Dividends (Eighteen in number) paid over to the use of the Intestates and Suitors since the establishment of the Loan Office in 1824, amounts to six pounds two shillings per cent per annum, but as the rate of interest charged on Loans has been reduced from 9 to 7 per cent it is not expected that future dividends will average more than 5 per cent per annum.

At NELLORE and BADDAGAMA there are *Seminaries*, at KANDY a Girls' boarding school, and at COTTA a *Christian Institution*, where a number of Youths, of good promise both for piety and capacity, selected from the other schools, are boarded and educated, with a view to their becoming useful Schoolmasters, Catechists, and Assistant Missionaries. The Cotta Christian Institution contains *Thirty-two* Youths. The course of study pursued by them comprises SINGHALESE, ENGLISH, (including Grammar, Composition, History, and Geography) LATIN, GREEK, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOMETRY, and THEOLOGY: in all of which branches some of the Youths have made considerable progress, and shew as good a capacity for acquiring knowledge, and as great a thirst for it, as Youths of the same standing in England. *Eighty-two* of the Seminarists (including *Fourteen* Girls at Kandy) and Institution Youths are boarded and educated at the expense of the Society.

The whole of the Holy Scriptures, and the Book of Common Prayer, have been translated into the familiar Siaghalese, and printed at the Cotta Press; besides many elementary School Books, and a large number of Religious Tracts which have been circulated, and readily received by the Natives.

The British and Foreign Bible Society have authorized a new Edition of 2000 Copies of the Cotta Version of the Scriptures to be printed at the Cotta Press, and this work is now in progress. A new Edition of the Book of Common Prayer consisting of 1000 copies of the whole Prayer Book, and 2000 of the Psalter, is now also in the Press.

The prospects of the Mission are encouraging in all its branches of labour. The Congregations, though in some places

small, are very attentive. The School Children and Semina-
rists are making creditable progress in the acquirement of both
religious and general knowledge; and many new Schools might
be established, at the request of the Natives, if the Mission had
the means of supporting and superintending them: fresh Sta-
tions might be occupied, and additional labourers would be
welcomed by the Natives.

The fixed annual allowance made to this Mission by the
Parent Society in England is £4000. The expenditure of the
year ending June 30th has been £4,532—11—6½. The School and
Educational expenses for that period amount to £1,406—18—7½.

BAPTIST MISSION.

Established in 1812.

THREE European Missionaries superintend this establishment;
two of whom reside at Colombo, and one at Kandy. Since the
last report, a printing office and printer have arrived from
England, and are located at Kandy. The Superintendent of
the printing office not only attends to the labours of that de-
partment, but is actively engaged on Lord's days, and other
occasions in preaching the gospel. During the year, there have
been 39 free Schools attached to the Mission, containing 1,191
boys, and 264 girls, making a total of 1,455 children, some of
whom are instructed in English and Tamil, but the far greater
part in the Singhalese language. The Mission now occupies
twelve distinct stations and surrounding villages, in which four
European, and twelve native Assistants either as Missionaries
or Catechists extensively make known in different directions the
word of God. Its expenditure is about £1,700 per annum, of
which amount a small sum is contributed in this country, the
principal part is supplied from the Society in England.

Extract from the Rules for the Management of the Post Office Department, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 30th August 1837.

Receipts of Letters, &c. for dispatch by Land or Sea. Letters, Papers and Parcels shall be received wherever a Post Master or Post Office Writer is stationed, for dispatch by *Land* to every part of India or to Ceylon, and by *Sea* to every part of the World with which there is a Post Office communication; the letter unless superscribed for some particular Ship, will be sent by the first Vessel that sails direct to the country to which the letter is addressed, and if there be no Vessels so proceeding direct to the place addressed, the letter shall be forwarded by such circuitous route as shall appear to the Post Master General or Post Master to afford the means of most speedy and secure transmission.

Letters to Ceylon to be paid in advance. On Letters, Papers or Parcels, intended for delivery in Ceylon, Postage must be paid in advance to Point Calimere, except in case of letters received for Ceylon from Ship, which may be forwarded Bearing Postage. If letters for Ceylon are received from Ship under cover to residents in India, such letters, superscribed, "Ship Letters" and Bearing Postage, as such, will be received for transmission to their destination in like manner as if received direct from the Ship.

Letters from Ceylon to be charged Postage. Letters from Ceylon will be charged inland Postage from Point Calimere, or the place where the same are landed in India.

It having been found expedient to establish for the public convenience a Parcel Tappal between Colombo and the principal Outstations, Notice is hereby given that from the 1st of January next, such a Tappal shall be established under the following Rules and Conditions, with a proviso, however, that the conveyance of parcels through the Post Office will be given up as soon as any establishment of the same nature shall be set up by private persons—and with the exception of the road between Kandy and Colombo, on which a conveyance of that nature already exists.

The following Rules will be strictly abided by:

1. The Tappal will be despatched twice a week, namely, each Tuesday and Friday, from Colombo, and arrangements will be made with the Post Offices at Outstations for parcels being brought to Colombo also twice a week, on days to be fixed by the several Government Agents.

2. All private parcels, not exceeding 6 lbs. in weight, and being made up in a form which can be conveniently carried, which may be brought to the Post Office before 5 on the days above-mentioned, will be duly forwarded.

3. In order that the Parcel Tappal may not interfere with the regular post, the Post Master General, or Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent at Outstations, will be authorized to call on any person sending or receiving a parcel in which he may suspect letters to be enclosed, to open it at the Post Office in his presence.

4. No parcel can be franked; all below one pound shall be charged as if they were of that weight, and the following rates will be levied:—

Double letter postage for every parcel of a pound weight, or less than a pound, and two pence for every extra pound for each distance of 72 miles, and an additional charge of ten shillings for every single letter found in any parcel.

5. The Post Office will be answerable for no parcels containing money or jewels, but for additional security any person sending such parcels should give notice at the time to the Post Office Clerk, and take a receipt in writing, specifying the weight of the parcel.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE SALE OF CROWN LANDS.

GOVERNMENT ADVERTISEMENT.

IN pursuance of Her Majesty's Instructions, The Right Hon-
ble The Governor is pleased to direct that the following sum-
mary of the Rules, upon which it is intended that all Lands
the property of the Crown shall in future be disposed of, and
which have been substituted for the Rules published on the
11th July 1833, be published for general information.

ART. 1.—All the Lands in the Colony not hitherto granted,
and not appropriated or required for public purposes, will be
put up to sale by public auction. The price will of course
depend upon the quality of the Land and its local situation, but no
Land will be sold below the rate of five shillings per acre.

ART. 2.—All persons proposing to purchase Lands not adver-
tized for sale, must transmit a written application to the Go-
vernor, in a certain prescribed form, and upon a stamp of two
shillings and six pence, which will be delivered at the Cutcherry
to all persons applying.

ART. 3.—Those persons who are desirous
of purchasing will be allowed to select, within
certain defined limits, such portions of Land
as they may wish to acquire in that man-
ner. These portions of Land will be advertized for sale for three
calendar months, and will then be sold to the highest bidder,
provided that such bidding shall at least amount to the price
fixed by the 1st Article.

ART. 4.—A deposit of 10 per cent upon
the whole value of the purchase must be
paid down at the time of sale, and the
remainder must be paid within one month from the day of sale,
and in case of payment not being made within the prescribed
period, the sale will be considered void, and the deposit forfeited.

ART. 5.—On payment of the purchase
money the purchaser will be let into pos-
session, and a grant under the Public Seal of the Island will
be made, in fee simple, to the purchaser at the nominal quit-
rent of a pepper-corn.

ART. 6.—All grants will be enrolled in
the Supreme Court, and for the delivery
and enrolment of the same, the following
fees will be payable by the purchasers. :

To the Colonial Secretary: In all cases where the value of
the Land shall not exceed five pounds, a fee of one penny.

In all other cases a fee of one per cent on the amount of the purchase money, provided that the fee upon any one grant shall in no case exceed the sum of forty shillings.

To the Registrar of the Supreme Court: A fee of five shillings for each grant.

The above fees will be paid together with the purchase money to the Government Agent.

ART. 7.—The Crown reserves to itself the right of making and constructing such Roads and Bridges as may be necessary for public purposes in all Lands purchased as above, and also to such indigenous timber, stone and other materials, the produce of the Land, as may be required for making and keeping the said Roads and Bridges in repair, and for any other public works. The Crown further reserves to itself all mines of precious metals.

Notice is hereby given that it is the intention of Government to hold monthly Sales of the Government Cinnamon Gardens, commencing from the second Tuesday in July 1840, and to continue the same until the whole of the Gardens are disposed of, in the following order—Morottoo, Kadgrani, Ekelle, Welli-

sere and Marendahn. The Government reserves to itself however The power to dispose of Building Lots from the Marendahn Garden at any time.

The Gardens will be sub-divided into Lots of about ten Acres each, and each Lot will be surveyed at least three months prior to the Sale. The Morottoo Cinnamon Garden has been surveyed, and arrangements will be made for surveying the others, in succession, and due notice will be given of the completion of each survey.

The following are the Conditions of Sale.

1st.—The quantity to be put up at each Sale shall be Thirty Lots, of the numbers whereof with reference to the Survey notice shall be given ten days prior to the Sale, and each Lot shall be peremptorily sold to the highest bidder, subject to the following restriction. After the whole of the Lots shall have been separately put up at each Sale, if any party shall be desirous of purchasing collectively two or more contiguous Lots, and shall before the termination of the proceedings of the day make an application to that effect to the Government Agent specifying the Lots, such Lots shall be immediately put up at the sums previously bid for them; and if at the conclusion of such second Sale, an application shall be made for a larger number of contiguous Lots, even if it shall include those exposed at the second Sale, the whole of the Lots so applied for shall be put up together, at the highest prices bid for all the Lots included in the last application. And any further applications made at that Sale for a still larger number of contiguous Lots shall be disposed of in like manner.

2nd.—Ten per cent of the amount of the purchase money must be paid within ten days from the day of Sale. The remainder of the purchase money must be paid in three equal instalments, the first in four months, the second in twelve, and the third or last in eighteen months from such day of Sale.

3rd.—Where the purchase money of any Lot exceeds Two HUNDRED POUNDS, Government will be prepared to take into consideration any application to enter into a special agreement for the payment of a portion of the purchase money not exceeding one-half being deferred for three years from the date of the Sale. Provided always that mortgage of the property is given, and that the balance shall remain subject to payment of interest at nine per cent, until paid up.

4th.—In failure of any of the aforesaid payments being made, the Land will be resold at the risk of the purchaser who in such case shall be liable for any loss that may occur upon such resale, but he shall have no right or title to any advantage if the new Sale shall produce a larger proportional price; and any part of the purchase money he may have paid shall be forfeited.

5th.—After payment of the second instalment, or in those cases where the purchaser may have entered into agreement with Government, to defer the payment of such portion of the purchase money as shall have been agreed on as mentioned in article 3d upon mortgage of the property being given, the purchaser shall be put in possession of the land and be allowed to peel Cinnamon, but he shall not be allowed to root up any Cinnamon bushes until after the payment of the third or last instalment, and any purchaser so doing shall be liable to a penalty of one third value of the property, besides forfeiting all right to the lands and trees purchased and to the instalments paid.

6th.—Upon payment of the third or last instalment a title deed shall be prepared free of expence to the purchaser, after which he shall have full power and liberty to clear, cultivate, let out, or sell at any time, and in his option all or any part of the land so purchased by him, but always subject to such Regulations and Taxes as are now in force and that may hereafter be enacted relative to the tenure of landed property in general in this Colony.

7th.—The Government will pay the expense of the Surveyor proceeding once at a time appointed if required to point out the limits of the Lots; but, should his attendance be afterwards required for that or any other purpose, the purchaser must himself pay the cost of such attendance.

8th.—Each purchaser shall on payment of the third or last instalment, secure the boundaries of his land by a ditch or strong fence as may be agreed on within three months after the payment of the last instalment, in failure the same will be done by the Government Agent and the cost be charged and recovered against the purchaser by Sale of the land.

9th.—All roads and public paths and drains appearing in the survey or which shall be noted at the back of the duplicate conditions delivered to the purchaser at the time of Sale, shall be fully kept open.

Forty-first.—And whereas We have by Our said Commission appointing you Our Governor and Commander in Chief as aforesaid, given to you full power and authority in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject nevertheless to such provisions as are in that respect contained in your General Instructions to make and execute in Our name and under the Public Seal of Our said Island Grants of Waste Land to Us belonging within the same to private persons, and for the Public uses of Our subjects there resident, Now We do hereby require and authorize you from time to time as occasion may require to cause all necessary Surveys to be made of the vacant or Waste Lands to Us belonging in Our said Island, and to cause the persons making such Surveys to report to you what particular Lands it may be proper to reserve for Public Roads or other internal communications by Land or Water, or as the Sites of Towns, Villages, Churches, School Houses or Parsonage Houses, or as places for the burial of the dead, or as places for the future extension of any existing Towns or Villages, or as places fit to be set apart for the recreation or amusement of the Inhabitants of any Town or Village, or for promoting the health of such Inhabitants, or as the Sites of Quays or Landing Places or Towing Paths, which it may at any future time be expedient to erect, form, or establish on the Sea Coast, or in the neighbourhood of Navigable Streams, or as places which it may be desirable to reserve for any other purpose of Public convenience, utility, health or enjoyment, and you are specially to require persons making such Surveys to specify in their Reports, and to distinguish in the Charts or Maps to be thereunto annexed such Tracts, Pieces or Parcels of Land within Our said Island as may appear to them best adapted to answer and promote the several purposes before mentioned. And it is Our Will, and We do strictly enjoin and require you that you do not under any pretence whatsoever grant, convey, or demise to any person or persons any of the Lands which may be specified as fit to be reserved as aforesaid, nor permit or suffer any such Lands to be occupied by any private persons for any private purpose.

Forty-second.—And We do further charge and require you not to make any Grant of Land to, or in trust for, or for the use of any private person unless in consideration of payment in money for the same after such Land shall have been pre-

viously put up for sale by Public Auction at such an upset price per acre as shall from time to time by Our authority be fixed for the same, and for this purpose you shall cause such Lands as from time to time shall remain unoccupied and ungranted to be put up for sale by Public Auction from time to time as you shall judge proper and the highest bidding which shall at such Public Auction be made for any such Lands shall be accepted, provided that such bidding shall at least amount to such upset price per acre as aforesaid. Provided nevertheless that no such bidding shall be finally accepted until the person or persons making the same shall have actually paid a Deposit of ten per cent on the amount thereof, and shall have signed a Contract for the payment of the balance within one calendar month next thereafter. And it is Our Pleasure that all Grants of Land to be made by you in Our name to any person or persons in consideration of the payment of money for the same shall be made to such person or persons, and to his, her or their Heirs and Assigns to be by him, her or them held in fee and common soccage, yielding and paying to us, Our Heirs and Successors a Quil Rent of one Pepper Corn by the year for the same, and every such Grant shall pass in Our name under the Public Seal of Our said Island of Ceylon, and shall be executed and delivered to the purchaser or purchasers at the office of the Surveyor General of Our said Island on the payment of the purchase money for the same, and not before and then and not before the purchaser or purchasers shall be let in possession of the Land so bought by them and for the delivery of every such Grant, and the preparing the same, the Colonial Secretary shall be entitled to charge a fee amounting to forty shillings sterling money and no more or of such smaller amount as you from time to time with the advice of the Executive Council of Our said Island shall appoint, and every such Grant shall previously to its being so delivered be enrolled in the Court of the District where such Land may be situate, and for making every such Enrolment the Registrar of such Court shall be entitled to receive from such Grantee or Grantees a fee of five Shillings Sterling money and no more.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Rules laid down in the Royal Instructions, clauses 41 and 42, relative to the sale of Crown Lands, are to form the conditions of sale in all cases except sales under the Advertisement of the 14th December 1839, which are provided for by special Instructions.

As soon as any purchaser has made the deposit of ten per cent, Government Agents are to transmit the surveys and necessary information for the title-deeds being prepared to the Colonial Secretary with a certificate of the deposit being paid.

5th. Surveyors will provide their own stationery, instruments, &c. and will be required to furnish to the Surveyor General's Office, four figures of every survey, immediately on its completion, neatly drawn on good paper, with a full description of the land and its boundaries, describing the Province, district and village in which it is situated, its distance from the principal town, and the nearest carriage or cart road, or navigable river or canal.

6th. When copies of surveys are specially called for, one shilling will be paid for a mere outline of the boundaries with appropriate description; and 5 shillings for a map shewing minutely the interior detail, with a full description of the land &c.

7th. Surveyors employed by Government will be entitled to 15 shillings a day batta, including all charges whatsoever, when detained by the absence, or other remissness, of the parties who should be in attendance during the survey, or if the boundaries are not so cleared as to admit of the survey being proceeded with without interruption.

8th. All questions as to the land being the property of the Crown must be disposed of, before the services of a Surveyor can be placed at the disposal of an Applicant, and no application for land which may be received by any Government Agent after the date hereof, will be advertized in the Gazette till the boundaries are properly cleared, and the land surveyed. The survey however may be undertaken at the expence of Government, for the purpose of investigating claims, the cost of survey of any portion of land ultimately sold, being charged against the purchaser.

9th. On application being made for land, the Headman will be directed by the Government Agent to meet the applicant or an accredited Agent on the spot on a certain day; should the Headman pronounce the land applied for to be the property of the Crown, the Applicant or such Agent attended by a licensed Surveyor and the village Headman will proceed to clear the boundaries at his own cost, and with laborers provided by himself. The Government Agent will decide upon the remuneration that should be allowed to Headmen, according to circumstances, for their attendance, and this charge is to be paid whether the land proves to be Government or private property. If the land is pronounced to be the property of the Crown, and charges are incurred in clearing boundaries &c. a memorandum thereof must be produced to the Headman, who will certify whether they are reasonable or otherwise. If he certifies to their being reasonable, the Government Agent will on approval, sign the Memorandum, but should the Headman refuse to certify the Agent will fix the amount admissible. The Applicant or his Agent will then be required to pay the Headman his charges and to deposit the estimated amount of fees &c. for the Surveyor, and for the attendance of Headmen,

if further required during the survey, and the Government Agent will pay the Surveyor his fees and charges out of the sum deposited on presenting his bill, taxed by the Surveyor General.

10th. The day on which the Surveyor is appointed to attend will be intimated to the Applicant, and that notice shall be binding on him, and shall render him liable to the charges defined in the 7th clause, if he, or the party deputed by him, does not attend.

11th. Should either the clearing of boundaries or the progress of the survey be impeded by the absence of Headmen duly ordered to attend, Government will similarly pay the costs of detentism incurred by the Applicant and the Surveyor, and hold Headmen responsible for the same; and in like manner should any impediment or delay be occasioned by the absence of other negligence of the Surveyor, duly warned, the loss incurred by the Applicant and Headmen will be charged against him; unless by timely notice given by any one of the three parties, the day of meeting is postponed by the Government Agent.

12th. On the day of sale the Government Agent will specify, in three separate items, the upset price of the land, the cost of clearing boundaries, &c. and the charges of surveying allowed by this Minute, and stipulate that if the Applicant is not the ultimate purchaser, the two latter items must be paid down, with the 10 per cent, by the actual purchaser, and the claims of the original Applicant will be adjusted by the Government Agent out of that payment. Should the original Applicant however be the ultimate purchaser, he will pay the price bid for the land, and settle with the Agent for the other two items, paying to, or receiving from, that officer, as the case may be.

13th. Should Surveyors be paid not according to these rates, but according to a special agreement, the Surveyor General will reduce the agreement to writing, and will apprise the Government Agent thereof, and Government Agents as well as the Surveyor General, will be at liberty to accept of lower terms than those specified in the Table of Fees, should competition reduce the charge for surveying.

14th. Persons wishing to be employed by Government as Surveyors will have to undergo a strict examination in the several branches of the Art. On their being certified by the Surveyor General to be duly qualified, they will receive Licenses to survey Crown lands, notice whereof will be given in the Government Gazette, and no surveys but those made by Officers of Government, or licensed Surveyors, will hereafter be authenticated at the Surveyor General's Office.

RULES FOR THE SURVEY AND SALE OF WASTE LANDS.

1. That as soon as arrangements can be made, all lands shall be surveyed by Officers appointed by the Government, and paid either by fixed salaries or by fees. The Surveyors' fees to be added to the minimum price of the land and paid into the public chest.
2. The lands to be sold by Government are to be surveyed, as nearly as practicable, in lots not exceeding 640 acres, but under special circumstances the Government will authorize lots being put up not exceeding 1,280 acres, and parties may apply for lots of a smaller extent or to have any number of lots put up, in which case they are to deposit the usual Surveyors' fees.
3. The Government Agent, in concert with the Surveyor General, will then make arrangements to have the land surveyed, attending as far as practicable to the desire of the Applicant, but they will in all cases take care, that no party is allowed to pick out only the fertile spots leaving out the inferior land which may intersect the ground—nor to select any lot in such a manner as to injure the adjoining lots—for instance where the boundary of a lot comes near a stream, it should generally be taken as the boundary.
4. No survey of lands not applied for having yet been made, the Surveyor General is to proceed forthwith to survey such tracts of land as it may be desirable to sell immediately, selecting in the first place those in situations where applications have been most numerous.
5. The surveys, when completed, will be lodged in the Surveyor General's Office, where they are immediately to be marked off in a general map, and charts and registers shall be kept for public inspection at the office of the Surveyor General, and the respective Government Agents, in such form and manner as to exhibit to all persons applying for the same, full and authentic information of all appropriations of land and all surveyed lands not appropriated.
6. Any lots so surveyed, which the Government may deem it proper to sell, may be applied for, and will be put up to sale under the conditions published from time to time.
7. No surveys of insulated lots are to be made without special directions from Government.
8. The Surveyors are to lot off as expeditiously as they can, the tracts of land they are sent to survey, paying particular attention to the direction contained in the 41st clause of Her Majesty's Instructions; they are also carefully to note the character and description of soil of each lot, and all streams, remarkable rocks, or summits of hills by which the boundaries of the lots may be more readily identified, with such further information as may appear useful for the information of purchasers;

also any lines of road which it may appear advisable to mark off as principal roads.

9. In cases where any high road, already made or proposed to be opened, intersects the tract of country to be surveyed, it will be advisable to give the lots adjacent a frontage to the road, and the same may often be the case in regard to streams of any magnitude.

10. The Surveyors will not, without special directions from Government, leave one part of the country to commence a survey in another, so long as there are any tracts of land applied for and remaining unsurveyed, or which it may be considered desirable to survey.

11. Sales are to be made in all cases where it is practicable at the Government Agent's Office, and if necessary once a month.

12. All such sales are to be made after public notice in the Government Gazette, by Proclamation signed by the Colonial Secretary by the Governor's command.

13. The days of sale will be fixed for the different stations with the view as far as possible of the sales at one station not interfering with those at another.

14. The above are the rules under which it is intended that the survey of waste lands shall be conducted in future.

15. When any claims are made to portions of land under survey, the Government Agent will take steps to bring such claims to decision as speedily as possible, without waiting till applications are made.

16. In submitting applications, the Government Agents will be careful to state the upset price they recommend to be fixed under the Advertisement of 13th April 1839 and the 41st and the 42d Clauses of Her Majesty's Instructions, and they will not submit any offer for acceptance, nor let any purchaser into possession of the lands, until the 42nd Clause of Her Majesty's Instructions have been fully complied with.

17. The purchase money and fees for enrolment are to be paid to the Government Agent, and upon his giving notice to the Colonial Secretary, he will cause the necessary grants to be prepared and enrolled with surveys duly authenticated by the Surveyor General attached, and transmit them to the Government Agents for delivery.

18. Government Agents are directed to make every effort to procure correct returns of Government waste land in their Provinces, with reports of the nature of the soil and all other information which may be of use to Applicants for the purchase of waste land.

South or Singhalese District there are 4 Euro-
pean, 10 Assistant Missionaries, 1 Local Assistant Mis-
sionary, 10 Catechists, 74 Schools, 82 Schoolmasters and 10
School Mistresses. The Number of Children in the Sch-
ool is 2,840 boys and 474 girls.

In all places where the children cannot attend Divine Ser-
vice in a Chapel, the village school-room is used as a place
of Worship, the service being conducted in the Singhalese lan-
guage. There are 2 Chapels in Colombo, one for English ser-
vice and the other for Portuguese and Singhalese; on the
Negombo Station there are 4 Chapels, 1 for English and Por-
tuguese, and 3 for Singhalese; on the Caltura Station there
are 5 Chapels, 2 for English, 2 for Portuguese and Singhalese,
and 1 for Singhalese. On the Galle Station 1 Chapel for Portuguese and
Singhalese on Sunday, and 1 for English on Wednesday. At
Matura there are 2 Chapels, 1 for Portuguese and Singhalese
and 2 for English. At Dondra 1 Chapel with half walls
for Singhalese and 1 for Goddapitiya a similar Chapel for Sin-
ghalese. The number of persons in Church Communion is 725,
but these form but a small proportion of the Congregations.
The children in the Schools are instructed in the principles of
Christianity by Catechisms and oral instruction; and the Scrip-
tures are read in each School. The Revd. D. J. GOGGERLY is
the Chairman of the District, and the Revd. W. BRIDGELL

WESLEYAN MISSION.

THE Wesleyan Mission in Ceylon was commenced in 1814 and has continued since then in active operation. It is divided into two Districts, the Northern or Tamul District, and the Southern or Singhalese District. In the former are four Stations, which are supplied by 3 European Missionaries, 4 Assistant Missionaries, 3 Catechists and 42 School Teachers. The Revd. P. PERCIVAL is the Chairman of the District.
